A local option election to determine whether the sale of alcoholic drinks shall be legal in Muenster can be expected in the near future.

Now being circulated is a petition requesting the Cooke County Commissioners Court to order an election for that purpose. The law requires 25 percent of the number voting for governor in the 1956 general election as the number of signatures needed to complete the petition. Since was 685, so the goal for this petiton is 171 signatures . . . plus several extras in case some

of the signatures are not in order. Each name must be checked against the current poll tax list. If it is not found there exactly as shown on the petition it must be crossed off.

If the petition is found to be in order the commissioners are required to order an election within 20 to 30 days. After the election a period of 30 days is required in case anyone wishes to contest the outcome.



There has probably been more discussion of the inflation problem than of anything else ex-Much of the discussion has been informed and wise. But almost all of it suffers from a big weakness. It is carried on in statistical terms-billions, tens of billions, and hundreds of billions of dollars-that only a tiny, specially educated minority of the people can even begin to comprehend. In other words, it just doesn't come down to life and living as poverty. we understand it.



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
