

## A PROPER THANKSGIVING

On this Thanksgiving Day, in a year of sophistication and cynicism, the Muenster community can be proud that it still remembers how to celebrate Thanksgiving properly. Early Thursday morning, before the day's festivities began, the parish had its traditional Thanksgiving Mass to thank Almighty God for favors and blessings of the past year.

The Pilgrims were right in originating the feast. There should be a day set aside for all people to express public gratitude to their One Great Benefactor. It's only a matter of normal appreciation and politeness. Failure to do so is like a child refusing to say thanks after accepting a piece of candy.

When we take time to think about it we have to admit that we in Muenster have plenty reason to be thankful this year. We have been blessed with a bountiful harvest at a time when prices are high. On an average our people made substantial material progress.

The non-union clerk who waited on me said he was getting \$10 a day. He seemed like a nice fellow. He needed the job. I thought he had a right to take it.

I imagined the men outside maybe needed more pay. But I was told they get \$55 plus commissions which runs it up about \$90 weekly. Not so bad, if true.

The pickets were yelling and making quite a nuisance of themselves, I thought. I liked the strikers as men, but did not quite like the way they were conducting their argument with their boss. I don't get out and bother the public when I want more pay.

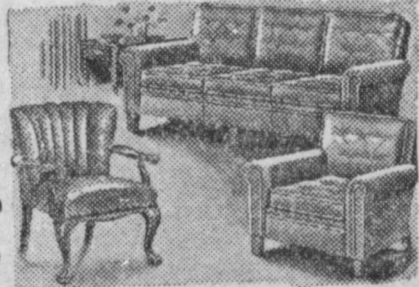

**EARLY SETTLERS WERE THANKFUL FOR HEALTH AS WELL AS HARVEST**

Austin, Texas — The first Thanksgiving Day in this country was proclaimed for the purpose of expressing thanks not only for the bountiful harvest which the colonists had reaped but for the sturdy health and endurance that had permitted them to survive the hardships and exposure, that first rigorous year in America. On the occasion of this Thanksgiving Day the State Health Officer, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, is appealing to every citizen of Texas to give serious thought to the preservation of his own health and that of his community. "We have to be thankful for in that our national health level has

remained high despite the nervous tension, the sacrifices, the deprivations of a post-war period," Dr. Cox stated. "Our people have maintained a remarkable high health level and even under existing conditions, Texas has shown a continued decline in maternal and infant deaths.

"The people of Texas have reason to be thankful for the steadily increasing interest and cooperation being shown in matters pertaining to general sanitation and the control of communicable diseases," Dr. Cox asserted. Responsibility for advancement of the public health program lies not with the State Health Department primarily but with the people who support and encourage the local community efforts exerted and who apply in their own individual lives the health rules with which they have become acquainted through public health education."

Dr. Cox pointed out that one direct result of public health efforts in this nation has been the lengthening of the normal life span by more than 15 years.

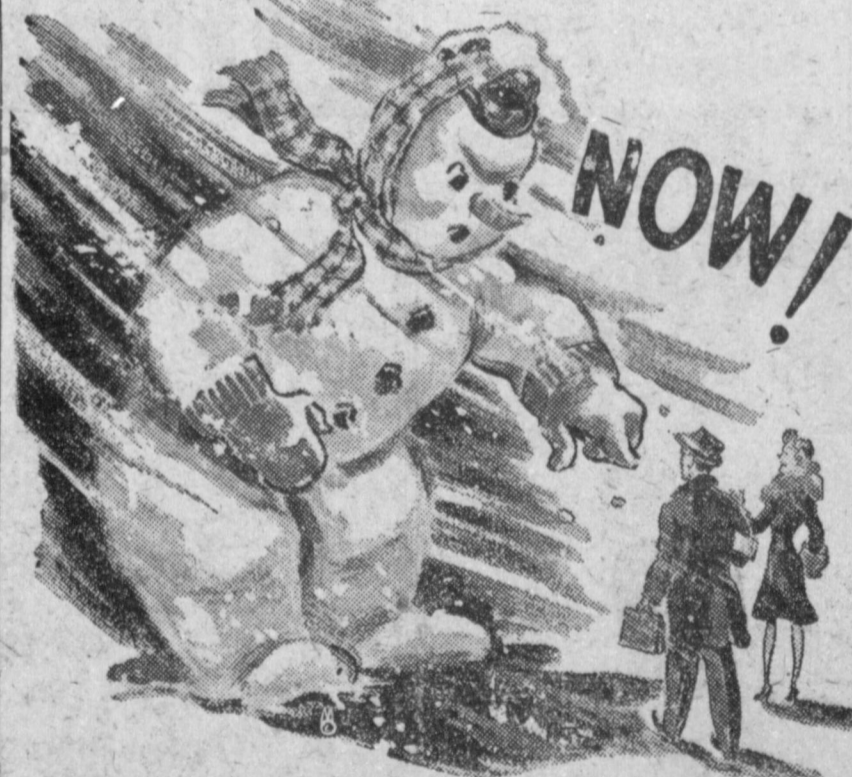

**DAIRY COWS WILL DO THEIR PART IF THE DAIRYMAN DOES HIS**

Dairy cows will do their part if the dairyman does his.

That's the slogan of high dairy production, says G.G. Gibson, dairy husbandman of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service. Regardless of how "good-

natured" a milk cow might be, her production level still depends upon two things — natural ability to produce and opportunity to produce. Inherited ability is fixed and there's not much to be done on that score. But every good dairyman realizes that it is his job to make conditions favorable for his cows to produce to the best of their ability. After he does it right, the milk cow will meet him more than half way.

In making production conditions favorable, feeding is the number one job. Following are some good feeding rules and practices as summed up by the Extension dairy husbandman:

An adequate ration must contain the right balance of feed nutrients in amounts great enough to meet the total nutrient requirements of the cow.

Roughages are the backbone of any dairy ration. All rules for feeding dairy cows will fall when the roughage supply is limited and the quality is poor. An average size Jersey cow producing three gallons of milk a day needs 18 pounds of good hay, and nine pounds of suitable concentrates. It makes no difference to the cow whether this feed is mixed together or the roughage and concentrates fed separately as long as it is in a pleasing, palatable form and she actually gets the required nutrients. If the roughage is chopped and mixed with the concentrates, the same total pounds will have to be fed in order for the cow to meet her requirements. Chopping roughages does not change the chemical analysis.

For best results, however, roughages and concentrates should be fed separately. High producing cows need more feed than low producers. By feeding concentrates according to each cow's production, the best use is made of each pound of grain.

For Jerseys, one pound of grain to three pounds of milk produced daily is sufficient when the cow is eating plenty of good roughage. Holsteins require about one pound of grain to four pounds of milk. When it takes more grain than this in order to maintain good production it means that the cow is not getting as much value from the roughage part of the ration as the dairyman estimates.

**MEN BEAT WOMEN IN SAFE DRIVING TESTS**

Columbus, Ohio. — Here's new evidence in the argument as to whether men are better drivers than women:

Tests conducted by highway safety engineers at the recent Ohio State Fair showed that the men have a quicker reaction time. That is the time it takes after seeing a hazard to apply the brakes.

In tests of more than 1000 drivers, the engineers found that men had an average reaction time of 57 hundredths of a second, compared with 62 hundredths of a second for women.

Your reaction time increases with age the tests revealed, but persons under the age of 20 are slower in applying the brake than those in the 20-29 group. Above the age of 29, the time increased.

**PAPERS JUST GOTTA PRINT THAT STUFF ABOUT BRIDE'S DRESS**

A generation of newspaper editors has looked sourly on one of

the standard parts of the conventional wedding story — the elaborate description of the bride's costume and less-detailed references of what was worn by the bridesmaids. According to the practical editorial mind, the real news is who is getting married to whom. Some editors have even timidly thought about reforming the society news by leaving out any mention of the bridal grab.

Well, for the benefit of those who may have considered such a reform, it has been tried and it won't work. In a recent issue of the Pierce County Tribune of Rugby, N.D., Editor Frank Hornstein makes the following admission and surrender:

"Some time ago our society editor talked me into the idea that we should have wedding accounts without all the falderal of who wore what. With some misgivings, I consented. But beginning this week we are again doing them a of old. My sincere apologies to all the gals who got married during the blackout. Clothes are important to women, and certainly what they wear on their wedding day is doubly so."

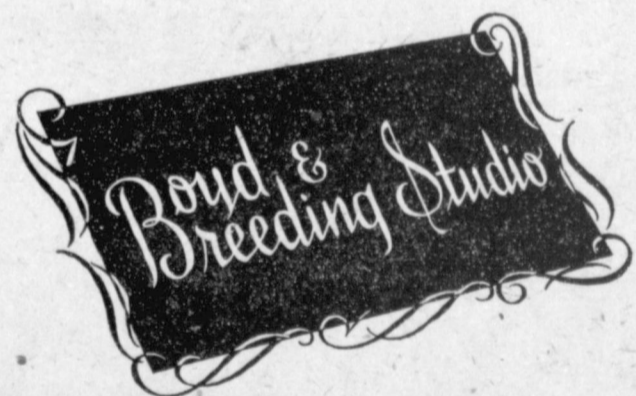

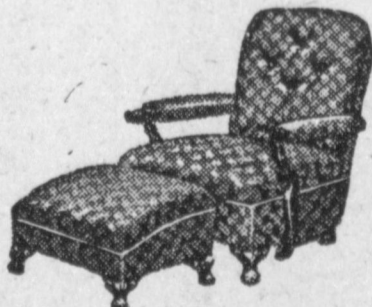

### WONDER WHERE YOUR TAX DOLLAR IS GOING?

Wonder where your tax dollars go?

Well, for one thing (and a great big thing, it is, too!), the government in Washington is issuing pay checks to almost 20,000,000 people.

In other words, although we are well into the second year of peace, one of every seven Americans is on the Federal government's direct payroll. Direct payments, either from Washington or through state channels, go to 19,484,803 persons at a yearly cost of \$20,400,000,000 — or about half the annual Federal budget.

The amount doubles the entire government expenditures of the largest New Deal peacetime spending year, and tops the peak World War I outlay of 1919.

Of the total number of people on the government payroll, the military establishment accounts for a mere 2,454,056 officers and men and women of the Army, Navy, Marines and Coast Guard. In addition to the \$1,701,000,000 a month paid out by the government directly to individuals, other Federal funds are expended in such indirect routes as government contracts, subsidies, school lunches, farm loans, business and power loans, maternity-care programs, and Indian benefits.

people in spite of their better  
judgment, another was the belief  
that conditions would improve,  
another was a stubborn  
refusal to give up — It's  
characteristic of human nature  
to take an awful lot before ad-  
mitting a mistake.

The rest of the story is self  
evident. Conditions improved,  
public support continued to in-  
crease and the Enterprise devel-  
oped into a full fledged institu-  
tion aiding and sharing in the  
progress of the community.

During our first ten years we  
have had the pleasure of report-  
ing a great deal of community  
progress. We've told about dozens  
and dozens of new homes. We've  
told about business and civic im-  
provements such as new business  
houses, street paving, sewer in-  
stallation, highway and overpass  
construction, rural electrification,  
soil conservation, continued oil  
development, school consolida-  
tions, new businesses and expan-  
sion of previously existing busi-  
nesses.

During the next ten years we  
hope to mention even more de-  
velopments, a few of them being  
construction of the new church,  
getting the hospital in operation,  
improvement of facilities at both  
schools, creating a good commu-  
nity recreation center, acquiring

more industry and more business,  
building new business houses and  
new homes.

We on the Enterprise staff firmly  
believe that this paper's next

ten years will be better than the  
past ten because we are confident  
that the community's next ten  
years will be better than its past  
ten.
