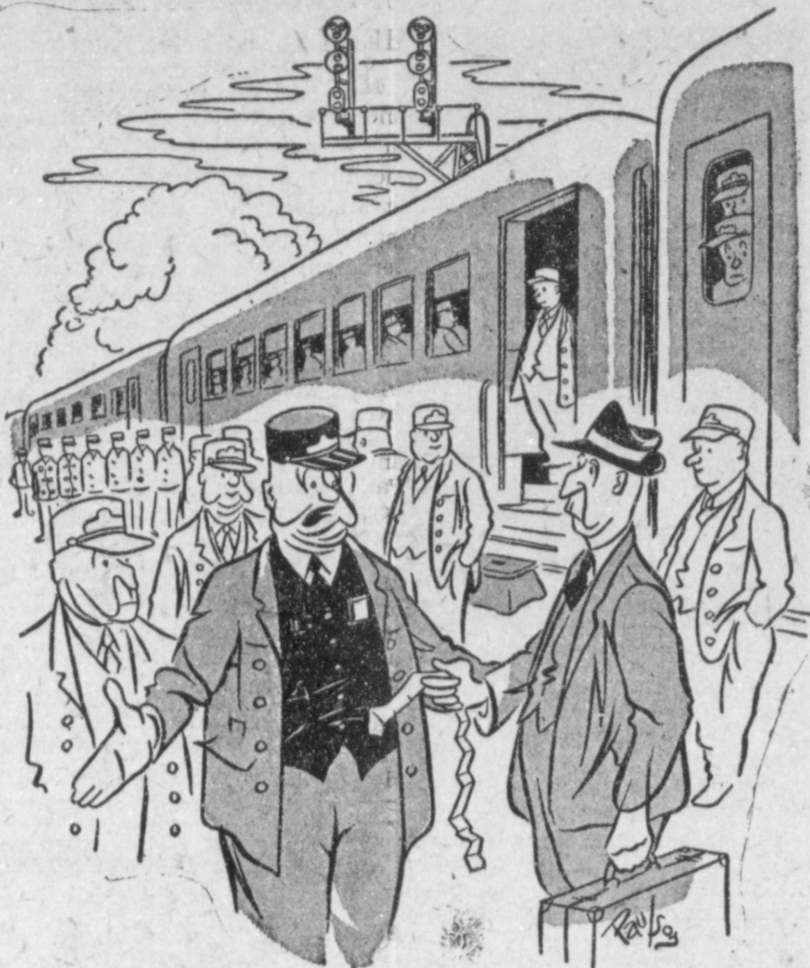

Tops in the happy hunting grounds for husbands is Alaska where it would be awfully difficult for a girl to miss catching a husband as there are 45 men to every girl.

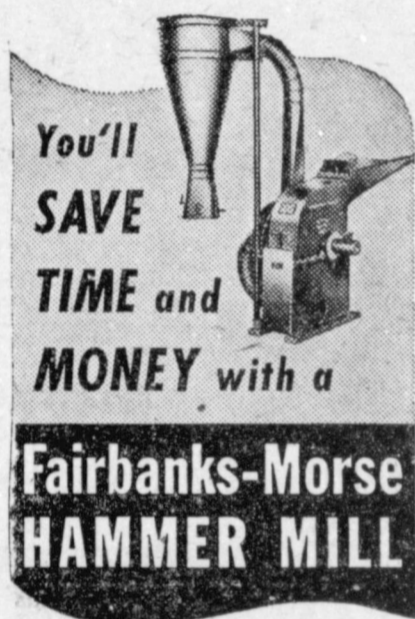
Next most lush spots are Nevada, Wyoming, Idaho, California, Arizona, Montana, Washington and Oregon.

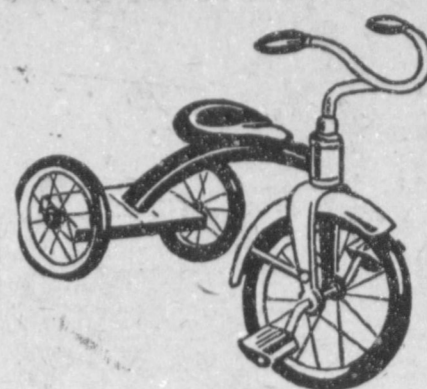

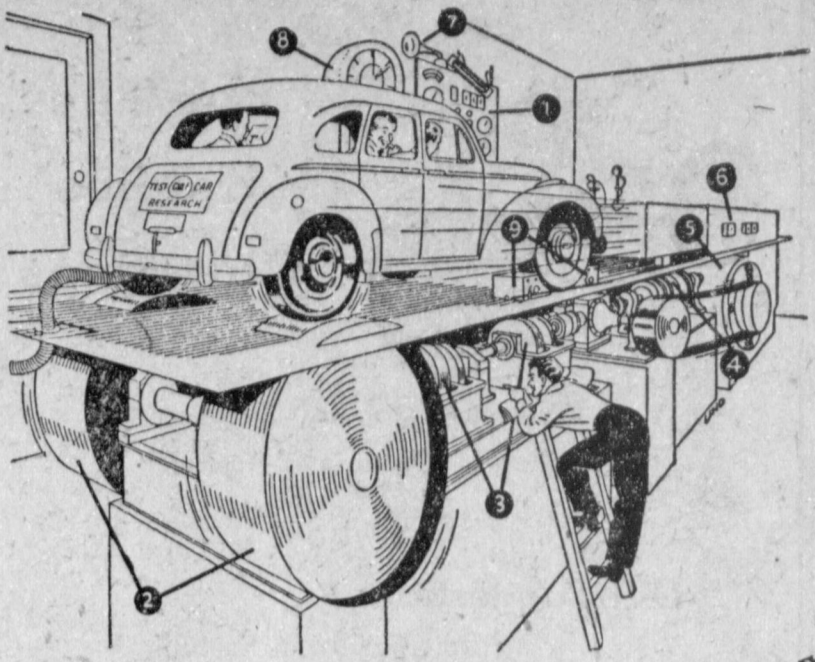

Off To Nowhere—At 70 Miles Per Hour



PITTSBURGH, PA. — This fantastic looking device resulted when scientists built a highway inside a laboratory. A motorist's dream, it artificially creates all basic driving conditions, but eliminates annoyances like traffic, chickens, slippery pavements and red lights. Better motor fuels are expected from the faster, more accurate testing of gasolines, possible with this Gulf research development.

Sketched from life, a test crew here accelerates to 70 m.p.h., the driver not bothering to watch the road. Mileage and test data are recorded on huge instrument board (1) outside car. Rear wheels rotate heavy drums (2) which gear into flywheels (3) electrically manipulated to simulate various vehicle and passenger loads. A combination electrical motor and absorbing unit (4) creates artificial uphill and downhill grades by speeding or retarding drums. A fan (5) delivers air at velocity proportionate to speed against car, and air conditioner (6) supplies artificial temperatures. Siren (7) warns of mechanical failure. Scale (8) indicates torque; chocks (9) hold front car wheels motionless.

FALL SEASON BRINGS INCREASE IN NUMBER OF STATE FLU CASES

Austin, Texas. — Reports coming in from various sections of the State indicate that the number of influenza cases appears to be increasing with the advance of the fall season, and during the past week 930 cases were reported in Texas.

Commenting on this situation today, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, said that most of these are mild and lend themselves to treatment readily. He pointed out that two cooperative factors are essential to victims of this

disease; first, to call the family physician promptly when suspicious symptoms appear; and second, to take it easy for a reasonable length of time after the acute stage has subsided.

"It is essential to realize that influenza, no matter how mild the attack, calls for a period of convalescence, because serious complications can occur if this important fact is ignored," Dr. Cox said. "Influenza is not mass-controllable. However, those persons who maintain the highest possible health level at all times, increasing their resistance to communicable disease germs, will have a protective advantage over those more careless persons who continually abuse their health."

The State Health Officer declared that living by the laws of nature, getting plenty of sleep, daily exercise in the open, nourishing foods and good personal hygiene offers the best know bulwark against all respiratory diseases and added that avoiding habits of any kinds detrimental to maximum well being is a wise course to take in the pursuit of good health.

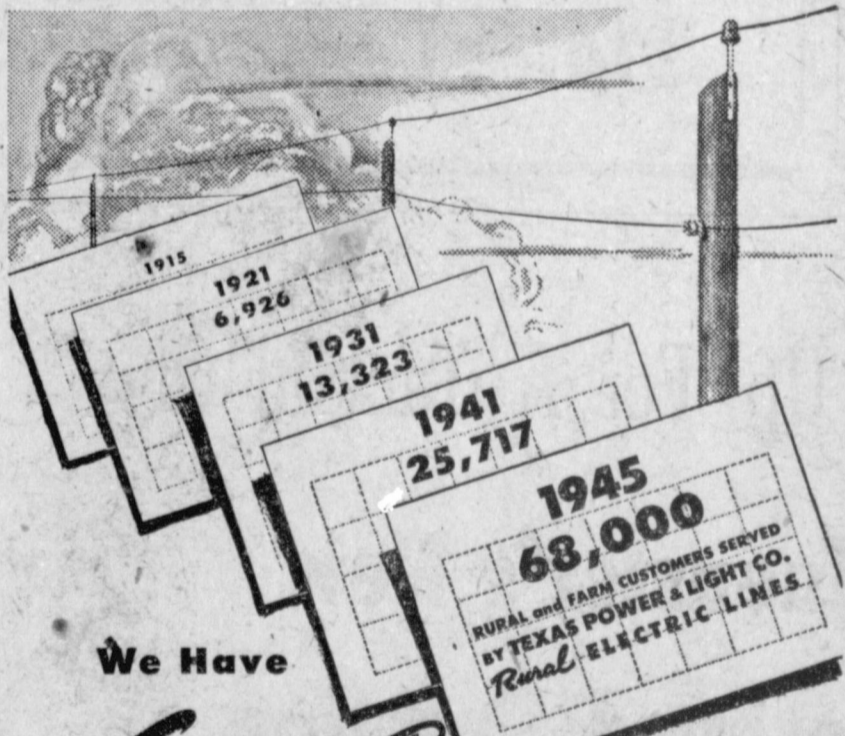

STEADY INCREASE YEAR AFTER YEAR

Constant addition of rural electric lines is no new activity with the Texas Power & Light Company, pioneer of rural electrification service in Texas. KATE SMITH HEADS NATIONAL POLIO DRIVE



Kate Smith, famous radio star, is national chairman of the 1946 Sister Elizabeth Kenny campaign for Infantile Paralysis, which campaign will be conducted throughout the nation, November 18 through December 7.

The Texas quota has been set at \$150,000. George C. Francisco, Jr., of Houston, chairman of the Texas Executive Committee, announced, and funds will be used to send graduate nurses to the Kenny Institute in Minneapolis for two year training as technicians, so that there will be available trained Kenny Technicians wherever polio breaks out in epidemic stage and to eventually build Kenny clinics in the state.

AMERICAN INDUSTRY MOVING SOUTHWARD

St. Louis, Mo. — American industry, hearing the gospel according to the Southwest, is converging on Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas in ever-increasing numbers, Donald V. Fraser, President of the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad, declared

today. In a report covering the first nine months of 1946, issued by H. Gifford Till, the Katy's director of industrial research and development, there are listed 190 new or expanded industries located on the railroad's line alone. These represent a total investment of \$17,039,900 and when all are completed and in operation will employ 5,150 persons, the report shows.

Of the 190 new projects, 106 are located in Texas, 55 in Oklahoma, 15 in Kansas and 13 in Missouri.

Director Till's report shows that the new industries vary from small warehouses representing a nominal investment to plants with an initial investment in the millions of dollars. Some plants will employ only a dozen people while others will employ hundreds.

SLOT MACHINES ARE NOT BUILT TO PAY OFF

Next time you walk away from your favorite slot machine muttering "I can't beat that thing," don't change your mind — you can't.

Slot machines are not built to pay the player. In fact, long before you try your luck on one of these one-armed bandits it has been fixed twice to trim your chances to win.

First the machine is "factory set" by the manufacturer to pay the syndicate gambling house or private club 25 to 90 percent of all money played. Then before the owner sets up his slot machine he regulates the number of times the jackpot will hit — perhaps once in every 500 or 1,000 plays. Perhaps never.

Crooked or not, they are outlawed in all states but Nevada and Idaho. But despite the ban, 170,000 slot machines last year paid 17 million dollars in taxes to the U.S. Treasury.

The Treasury Department isn't worried about the legality of slot machines, so it carefully collects \$100 tax a year on each one, no matter where the machine is located.

Making Cry-Babies

The government at Washington has encouraged everybody in recent years to run crying to it with every little trouble.

They have come awfully close to turning us into a whole nation of mamma-babies, sissies and softies.

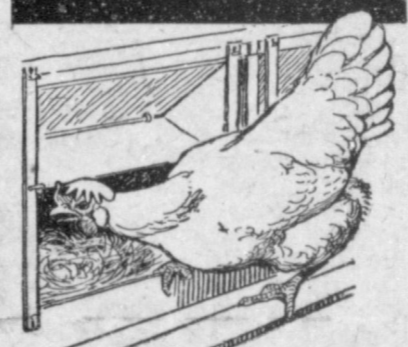

expense. For the sake of peace and our pocketbooks we hope the plan will be incorporated in the peace treaty.

Last Sunday's edition of the Sunday Visitor urges working people when they make their next raise demands, to insure future security by stepping up their production. Increased production to offset the increased wage the article explains, will permit prices to remain constant. Otherwise we will have only another price increase and a week's pay will go no farther than it does now.

Since the Sunday Visitor admits that loafing is the cause of run-away prices we wonder why it advocates waiting for the next pay raise before increasing production. Why not start increasing production right now and give prices a chance to come down accordingly?

We feel quite certain that if sincere union leaders backed by sincere workers were to offer more work at the same wage scale in exchange for price reductions, industrial managers all over the country would agree enthusiastically. At least they ought to inquire about it, because they stand to gain more by reducing prices and holding present wage levels than by increasing wages and holding the price level. The reason is that savings are involved. If labor, by increased production, will force prices down every dollar of every person's saving will increase in purchasing value. People who have war bonds, insurance or savings of any other denomination would do well to think of that.

Anyway, since it is admitted that lack of production is the real cause of economic grief, there seems to be only one solution. Let's correct the trouble by increased production. More juggling of wage scales will only complicate the job.
