FMA Plant Change Seen As Solution Of Traffic Problem

A partial if not complete solution to Muenster's early mornng traffic problem is practically assured by the cheese factory's

The change will be made as receiving much better pay than 2 patrols with Niel Fisher & Roger soon as the plant receives its new power conveyor, which was ordered almost a year ago. When member is eligible for two tickets, installing the new unit the plant will reverse the present arrangement of receiving and delivering conveyors, permitting trucks to unload at the west end of the building and pick up empties at the south side. That will move the waiting line of loaded trucks to the now vacant area west of the plant and permit empty brucks to move out of the way immediately.

The situation will be further improved by a new routing system. All trucks except those coming across the overpass will be routed away from the Mainsouth they will turn left at the depot and drive under the overpass to the back of the cheese plant. From the north they will turn right at the bank to reach from Paul Nieball's. the same place. Trucks coming down the highway from the east will be instructed to make their right turn before reaching Main Trip to Eastern States and cross Main at the bank intersection.

The combination of changes is expected to eliminate all parking and most of the moving milk truck traffic at the busy highway intersection.

LOADING HAZARDS AT SCHOOL ELIMINATED BY NEW PARKING SYSTEM

A new parking system at the parochial school was instituted this week as a safety measure. It consists of a designated spot for each bus marked at the curb and is intended to eliminate the confusion that prevailed every day at loading time.

According to Public School Principal John Hoffman, who introduced the change, the new method will result in more orderly loading and, most important, will keep small children from crossing in front of or behind moving vehicles. Instead of scrambling about to get into their busses they will wait at the curb until the bus arrives, then step in without getting in the traffic

Formerly cars and busses parked where they found space and none had a definite place. Bus drivers stopped where con-venient and waited for the swarming youngsters to climb aboard. Often as a car or bus driver started to back out or drive away a child would dash in his way. "It's a wonder someone hasn't been run over", Hoffman said.

A painted portion of the curb, directly in front of the school, marks the space reserved for busses. Cars must park on either side of that zone.



DON'T SUBSIDIZE 'EM

Seventy-nine thousand persons are drawing unemployment com-pensation in Detroit. Yet the b automobile companies say they can't get enough workers and the city's newspapers print many columns of help-wanted ads daily.

This situation, described yesterday by Reporter Charles L. Lucey, exists to some extent in many other cities. It is bound to result heard in Detroit, that unemployment compensation has become a racket for great numbers of people who don't really want to work.

In the last Congress the CIO put on a big drive—which got no-where—to "liberalize" all phases of the social security law. One thing advocated was Federal subsidies to states to increase unemployment payments to \$25 a week and provide 26 weeks steady compensation.

If the \$20-for-20 weeks schedule is already operating in Detroit and elsewhere as a featherbed for some workers who remain idle by choice, it obviously would put too much of a strain on human nature to pay even more and for a longer period of idleness

The purpose of unemployment compensation is to provide a cushion for those who lose jobs and can't get others through no fault of their own. In the interest of all workers whose jobs are taxed to maintain the unemployment funds and who may to rely upon jobless benefits to sustain them in some future depression, officials administering the funds should be vigilant to see that no part of the money is dissipated in

BEER TAXES IN 1945 **EXCEED GOVERNMENT** TOTAL COST IN 1909

The taxes paid by beer into the Federal Treasury in the last fiscal year would more than have met the entire cost of operating the United States Government in or in any year prior to

In 1909, the total Federal tax collections were \$604,320,000 while excise tax collections from the sale of beer alone amounted to \$653,949,192 in the fiscal year ending June 30, 1946. Thus, beer's contribution to the cost of our national government was almost \$2,000,000 a day.

The 1946 tax peak reflected steadily mounting excise tax rates. From 1902 until 1914 the excise tax on beer was \$1 per barrel of 31 gallons. When the sale of beer was legalized on April 7, 1933 after 13 years in which this source of revenue was wiped out by prohibition - the excise tax rate was set at \$5 per barrel. On July 1 1940, the tax was increased to \$6 per barrel to help finance the nation's defense program. On November 1, 1942, the tax was raised

Brewers' patriotism, incidentally, originated the excise tax for beer in the United States - a tax that in its first inception was selfimposed. In 1862, when the Union Treasury was being drained by the demands of the war. the brewers met and evolved the cxcise tax system. In that year they paid \$1,628,934 into the Tresury ess than the amount beer now pays to the Federal Government in a single day.

But the relation of beer and taxes is as old as history - for beer has played an accepted role in man's march toward civilization from the beginning of recorded time.

It is recorded that Rameses III Egyptian Pharaoh, collected a total of 466,303 "jugs" of beer as part payment of religious taxes during his reign. Historians are not too sure how much an Egyptian "jug" held, but they know that it was more than a gallon.

Beer has held its place, in English law since the year 694, when King Ine, ruler of the West Saxons, levied an annual tax of 12 "ambers" of beer on each holder of more than 12 hides of land, each hide being 120 acres. An 'amber" in Anglo-Saxon law conseven gallons - which meant that beer contributed a substantial part of the king's re-

While beer was a major item in the days when taxes were colrected in kind, it was not until the reign of Charles II (1660-1685) that beer itself was taxed in the United Kingdom.



JATO ASSURES TURTLE RECORD



Official Navy photographers made a pictorial record as the Truculent Turtle, a Lockheed Neptune P2V land based patrol bomber powered by two Wright Duplex Cyclone engines, took off from Perth, Australia, in October to establish a nonstop record of 11,236 miles to Columbus, O., in 55 hours and 18 minutes. Com. T. D. Davies, of Cleveland, O., ordered the plane equipped with four Jato units (jet assisted take-off) which enabled him to take off with a 85,500 pound load, the greatest load ever airborne by a two-motor airplane. The above pictures show the Turtle taking off at Perth. It had Jato units, manufactured by the Aerojet Division of The General Tire & Rubber Co., attached to both sides of its rear fuselage, and with each unit developing thrusts equivalent to 330 hp., the big bomber was helped to rise easily into the air for its record-breaking trip. Ascent of the plane is quickly ascertained by noting the trees in the right of the pictures. "The biggest thrill of the trip was the takeoff," Com. Davies readily admits. "After we were airborne the record distance was assured since we had gasoline enough to fly at least to Bermuda."



You Don't Get Clean Milk From **Dirty Cows**

Since this is the last time I'll be talking to you until another year knocks on your door, I can't resist giving you this New Year's resolution for dairymen:

"I hereby resolve to help myself in 1947 by taking care of udders. In so doing I am mindful of the successful dairyman who said he owed all his success to udders.'

Sort of a roundabout way to lead up to the subject of animal sanitation, when I don't need any excuse at all for talking about that, as you've probably found out by now.

Dairy cows in most parts of the country are kept in barns at this time of year, which means extra care in handling milk, to make sure it is held at high quality. Here at the bottom of the production curve, consumers need every quart of milk that can be produced. It would be a shame to have any milk lost because of lack of care.

Whether your cows are in barns or not, they're apt to get dirty at this season and it's mighty important that the dirt be removed an hour or so before milking time.

As I've pointed out before, long hairs make it easy for dirt to stick to the cow's side. Give your cows a haircut regularly and you'll stop trouble before it starts. Clipping flanks and udders is an important step in your sanitation program.

If you don't happen to have a set of clippers, your milk plant will know where you can rent or buy a set. Ask the fieldman. He can tell you.
