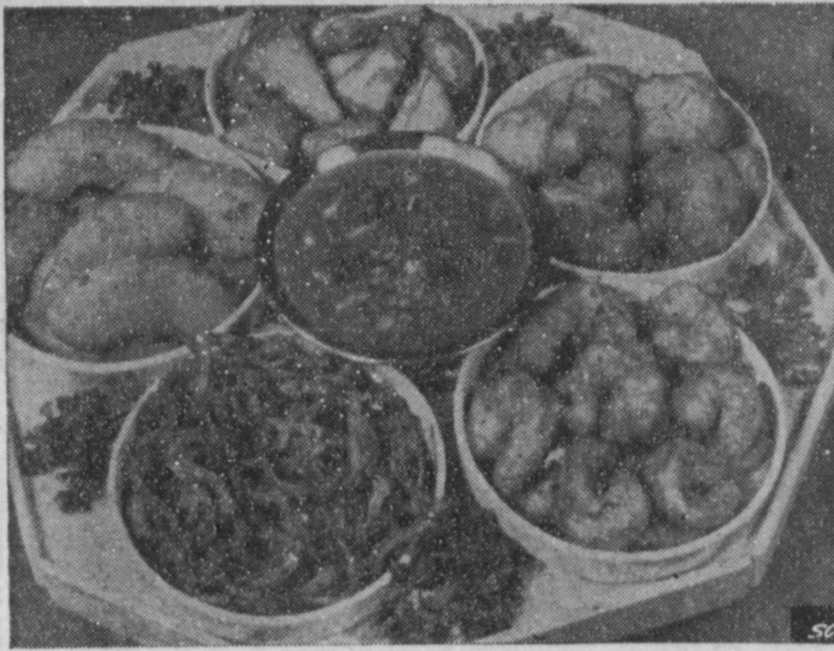
CASSINO MONKS START 4TH RESTORATION OF FAMOUS MONASTERY

Cassino, Italy — Four times in the 1,338 years of its existence, the monastery here of the Benedictine friars has been destroyed, the most recent in 1944, when the Germans and Americans fought a bitter battle for control of the Rapido Valley. The friars now are restoring it a fourth time.

In the Lombard invasion of Italy in 580, the monastery was wrecked. Again in 800, an invader, the Saracean, destroyed it. An earthquake leveled the buildings in 1349.

The old foundations upon which St. Benedict and his followers erected the first monastery in the early years of the Sixth century will support the new structure. Friars and workmen now are at work. In the ruins they found the bodies of 170 persons. Seven

French Frying Can Be Easy



Remember the last time you ate some wonderful French fried foods at a restaurant? Didn't you long to be able to duplicate them at home? You can duplicate them at home by using the same method that many famous hotels and restaurants use, dipping foods in a batter made from pancake ready-mix before deep frying. A batter dip of pancake ready-mix forms a protective coating over the food which prevents fat from soaking the food during frying.

GENERAL BATTER DIP DIRECTIONS

For seafoods or vegetables, combine 1 cup pancake ready-mix with 1/2 cup milk, 1 beaten egg and a dash of salt and pepper. Stir lightly. Dip seafood or vegetables in the batter and fry in hot deep fat, 370° F. until golden brown.

For a fruit batter, combine 1 cup pancake ready-mix with 1/2 cup milk, 1 beaten egg and 1 tablespoon sugar. Stir lightly. Dip fruit in batter and fry in hot deep fat 370° F. until golden brown.

French Fried Shrimp

Peel raw shrimp; remove black vein, drain and salt well. Dip in batter and fry in hot deep fat about 2 minutes.

French Fried Cauliflower

Wash cauliflower and separate into flowers. Boil vigorously for 2 to 3 minutes in salted water. Drain. Dip each flower into batter. Fry in hot deep fat for 2 to 3 minutes.

French Fried Eggplant

Peel eggplant. Cut crosswise in 1/4-inch slices. Cut each slice into pie-shaped wedges. Dip in batter. Fry in hot deep fat for 2 1/2 to 3 minutes.

French Fried Fruit

Dip fruit (pineapple rings, half banana, apricots, peaches or apple slices) in fruit batter and fry in hot deep fat for 1 to 3 minutes.

French Fried Onions

Peel medium-sized Bermuda onions and slice crosswise in 1/4-inch slices. Separate rings. Dip in batter and fry in hot deep fat for about 2 minutes.

were of German soldiers. The others were refugees. No member of the Benedictine order was killed in the furious airplane and artillery attacks on the hill.

St. Benedict, who lived between 480 and 543, established his order to develop and encourage scholarly and artistic attainments. The friars made a distilled spirits liqueur of brandy, sugar and herbs which became famous as benedictine, in America largely an after dinner drink. The friars were farmers and almost from the day the monastery was established on the Cassino hill they cultivated an olive grove. When American General Clark's army swept through the Rapido Valley there were 14,000 olive trees blooming on Monte Cassino. There are none now. It is believed the olive trees will bear again in five years but 20 years will pass before normal olive production will be restored.

The only part of the old abbey that survived was the little chapel which was St. Benedict's personal room. The tomb of the Saint was not damaged.

The American Way

AS SIMPLE AS ABC

Every labor union should discourage slow-downs and feather-bedding. Workers within unions who have the ability and are willing to deliver an honest day's pay must be encouraged, not hog-tied. For instance, the bricklayer who is capable of laying 1,500 bricks per day must be allowed to do so, and must be compensated accordingly. The worker unable or unwilling to lay 1,500 bricks must be offered a correspondingly less attractive reward.

A union-sponsored plan must be established whereby every worker becomes worthy of his hire—a plan which does not penalize the good worker in favor of the bad.

In short, there must be a grading of workers—the top-drawer worker to be classified as "A", the second rated as "B", the down-right incompetent as "C". Under such a grading it would be the natural instinct of the B and C workers to better their grades and the Class-A workers would have to look to their laurels — incentive and initiative would be promoted.

If union leadership gags at the thought of such an intelligent classification for fear it would cost them numerical membership, let me point out that such a possible loss could easily be compensated by setting up a progressive scale of dues. Most certainly the Class-A worker would be willing to pay his union what is fair for the privilege of having his hands untied.

At present the chief concern of our union heads is to gather into their folds as many people as will pay union dues. Poor craftsmen are accepted into unions with the same status as the good, with the result that the poor outnumber the good by so wide a margin that real craftsmen have very little voice within their own unions. In union meetings the minority is forced to go along with the majority who in many cases are not fit to be classed as trade unionists. This is a deplorable condition, a far cry from the honest intent of unionism.

If unionism has fallen into evil repute in the nation, the foregoing is responsible. Unless enough red-blooded leaders and union members declare themselves in favor of a program based on equity and integrity, unionism will surely perish in the bed it is making for itself.

The demand for new homes today is greater than ever before in the history of our country. Manpower and materials,

with the gradual lifting of governmental restrictions, are now available—and yet the average man desiring to build a home is unable to do so.

And, needed in addition to millions of homes for workers is an adequate House for Labor—a bright house on the hill at which all eyes may gaze with admiration and respect. Needless to say, these badly-needed houses are not going to be built until labor is graded according to its ability to produce and until the unions themselves see the light and openly declare for it.

Only through the immediate inauguration of a thoro-going educational program, based upon a sincere determination on the part of unions to reform, can the threatened depression be averted and national prosperity maintained. It takes no Einstein brain to figure that one out. It is just AS SIMPLE AS A, B, C.

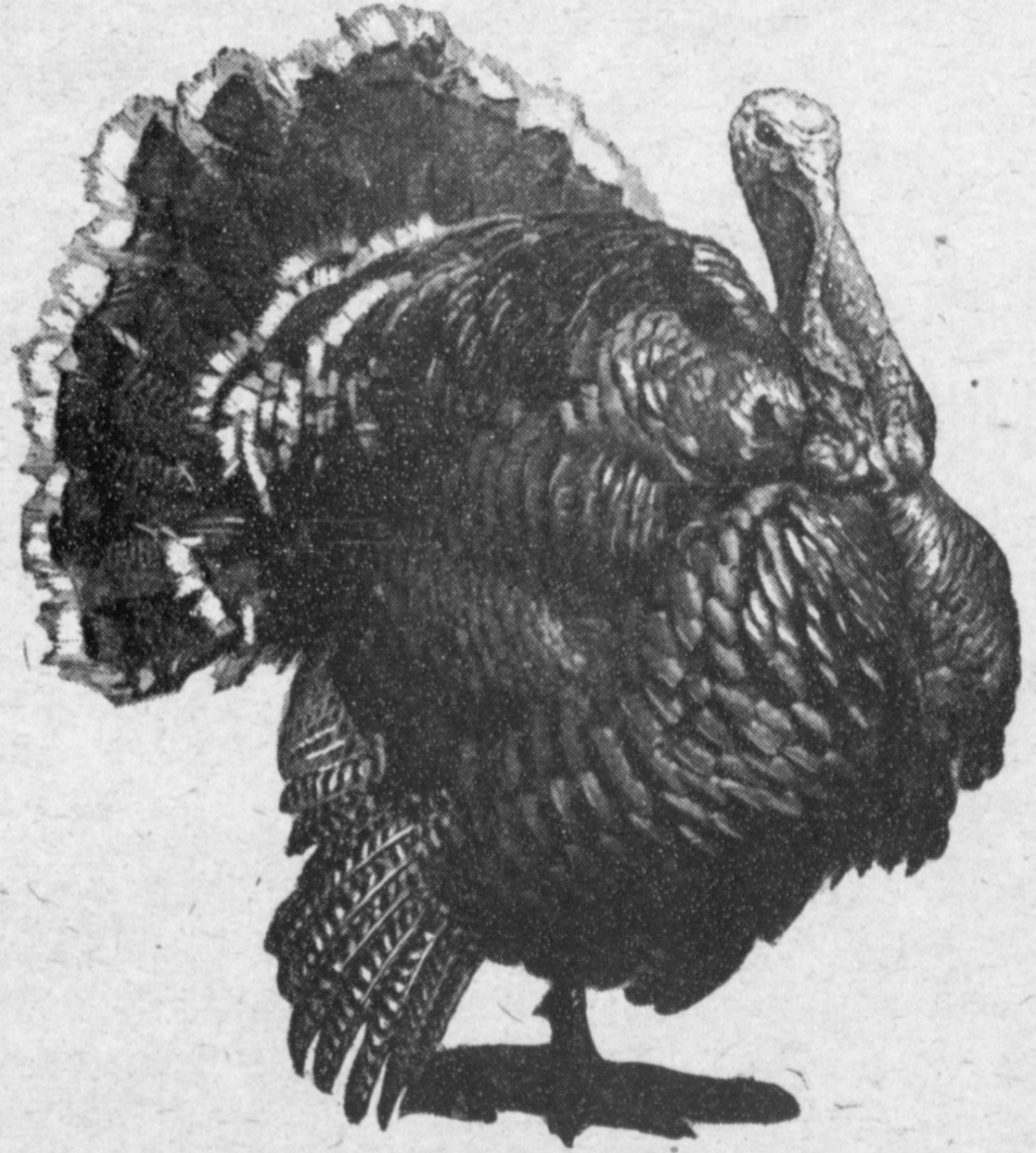

DANGER FROM RABIES WORSE IN WINTER, SAYS HEALTH DEPARTMENT

Austin. — Contrary to popular belief, rabies is more prevalent in winter than in the so-called "dog-days" of the hot summer months.

In a statement released this week by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, it was disclosed that of all animal brains submitted for examination by the State Laboratory in January, 1947, 33 per cent tested positive for rabies, while in the mid-summer of July only 18 per cent were positive.

"If all stray dogs were destroyed, and all pets vaccinated for rabies it would go far toward stamping out this justly feared,

and always fatal disease," Dr. Cox said.

The doctor stressed that dogs suspected of having rabies should not be killed immediately, but should instead be confined ten days for observation to see if the disease develops. If a dog sickens and dies during the observation period, the head should be packed in ice and sent to the State Health Department for examination. Freezing the brain, or killing the dog prematurely, or in such a manner as to injure the brain may make correct

laboratory findings uncertain, if not impossible.

Dr. Cox declared that after a dog is confined ten days and then killed, there is still a safe margin of time for a victim of his bite to be treated for rabies prevention, but he cautioned that if the disease is found to be present in the dog, the victim should begin treatment without further delay.

PUPILS RIDING SCHOOL BUSES MUST OBSERVE REGULATIONS—OR ELSE

The following list of regulations concerning pupils riding school busses is drawn up and circulated by the state department of education for the safety of school children.

They are published here at the request of the Muenster school board as a matter of information to parents.

1. The driver is in full charge of the bus and pupils. Pupils must obey the driver promptly and cheerfully.
2. Pupils must obey and respect the orders of monitors or patrols on duty.
3. Pupils must be on time; the bus cannot wait for those who are tardy.
4. Pupils must never stand in the roadway while waiting for the bus. They shall wait a sufficient distance from the pavement to allow for the bus to pull off the pavement onto the shoulder.
5. Unnecessary conversation with the driver is prohibited.
6. Outside of ordinary conversation, classroom conduct is to be observed.
7. The use of tobacco in the bus is not permitted.
8. Pupils must not throw waste paper or other rubbish on the floor of the bus.
9. Pupils must not, at any time, extend their arms or heads out of the bus window.
10. Pupils must not try to get on or off the bus or move about within the bus while it is in motion.
11. When leaving the bus, pupils must observe directions of the patrol or driver.
12. Any damage to the bus must be reported at once to the driver and or principal.
13. Students going to and from the bus stop will walk on the left hand side of the highway, or the shoulder; and whenever a car approaches them at high speed, or in a reckless manner, they should move several feet from the pavement.
14. All students shall cooperate with the bus patrol. He is working for the welfare of everyone on the bus. Refusal to comply with safety caution from the patrol or a monitor is sufficient cause for a student to be barred from riding the bus.

PENALTY: For violating any of these rules a pupil will be reported to the school principal who can bar him temporarily, or permanently, from riding the bus.

DAIRYBURGER HAILED AS MEAT SUBSTITUTE

Fayetteville, Ark., — Development of a low-cost burgerlike meatless dairy food product with a protein content approximating that of lean beef was announced Saturday by the University of Arkansas.

The new food, described as pleasing to the taste, contains

dried milk products, yeast and other ingredients which the university did not identify. It does not contain meat or eggs, it was said.

Dr. Lewis Webster Jones, university president, said the food was developed by Dr. Barnett Sure, nutritional chemist of the College of Agriculture and a discoverer of vitamin E.

The product can be used "in any recipe calling for ground meat — such as croquettes or loaves, or combined with spaghetti or vegetables," the university said.

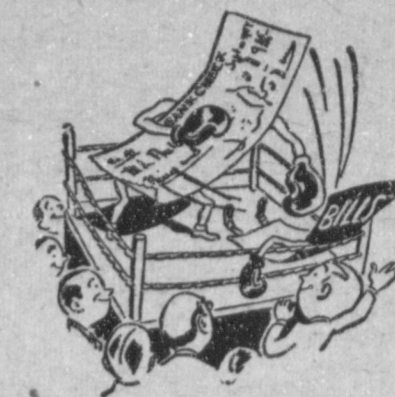
Dr. Jones declared the food has "great possibilities for use" in the

food conservation program and for overseas shipment because of a "low production cost and a great nutritional value."

Tests show the food is suitable for canning and freezing and largescale commercial output, the university president declared.

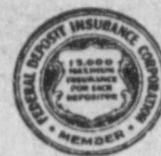
The new product already has been served to more than 300 persons, including dietitians. Dr. Jones said it was planned to serve a test meal to a group of high government officials in Washington this month.

A patent has been applied for and negotiations are under way with commercial food packing firms.

Feed More Proteins To Increase Production And Save Grain, Says USDA

United States Department of Agriculture authorities and other livestock leaders advocate increased use of protein in livestock rations this season to save scarce grain, make fast gains with less feed, increase production and reduce costs.

Protein, scarce during wartime, now is relatively abundant and cheap compared with grains; and amounts of protein used in livestock rations should be increased to levels that will take full advantage of its grain-saving qualities. A larger 1947 cotton crop has made increased amounts of cottonseed meal and cake available for this purpose.

"Feeds and Feeding", standard livestock text, quotes feeding experiments showing that 100 pounds of cottonseed meal, in a balanced ration, are worth 287 pounds of corn for fattening steers. Five hundred to 600 pounds of corn are saved by 100 pounds of protein supplement in feeding pigs. Dairy cows fed restricted amounts protein produced 22 to 50 per cent less milk and fat than those fed protein liberally.

CLOTHING FOR WAR RELIEF SHIPPED BY CDA COURT

Approximately 175 pounds of remodeled clothing was shipped by the local court Catholic Daughters of America to the War Relief Service warehouse in New York City last week, members announced Monday. The shipment included articles remodeled and sewed by the sewing circle sponsored by the court.
