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## Urban Endres Appointed New Ford Dealer

When Jack Biffle came out of the bank Monday he thought he was the most conspicuous man in town. He was oppressed by the thought that he had been where he did not belong and someone might suspect his motives for being there.

Barging in as usual, Jack was impressed first of all by the complete absence of service. But he waited patiently thinking someone would surely show up. Then he began pacing around uneasily and happened to notice a car hanging on the door. He flipped it over and discovered the bank was closed for Armistice Day. As he left he gave the door a good yank — from then on the bank was really closed.

As for an explanation of how the door happened to be pulled not quite shut, maybe Joe Weinzappel could venture to guess. He was in the bank shortly before Biffle was.

A man who was sold on Muenster the first time he saw it is Bill Hoffman of New Orleans. Three weeks ago he came here for a visit with his Coast Guard buddy, Eugene Klement. By the time he was ready to leave he was convinced that this is the kind of place he's been looking for. Now he and his wife and two children are back here — residents of Muenster. His decision means good news for the community, too. He's a carpenter — more relief for the building strain.

Last week's general election proved one thing beyond the shadow of a doubt. That is that the nation is fed up on the New Deal and wants to get back to the traditional American way of living. The sweeping Republican victory means that Mr. and Mrs. Citizen favor the Republican proposal to reduce federal expenditures and federal controls. The new legislature has been told emphatically just what the public wants and it is faced with the duty to hasten the changes.

Another noteworthy fact is that the same trend swept the Solid South some time ago when New Deal candidates in the primaries generally took a sound trouncing. As a result the new legislature will consist overwhelmingly of men pledged to work for restoration of the American way of life.

Two important things we can hope for as a result of the election are a slash of public expenditures and a reduction of official meddling. However there is little hope for a drastic reduction of taxes. The reason is that we are coming to our day of reckoning. Those tremendous war time and New Deal debts will have to be paid off. They alone will require a heavy tax burden, and in addition we still have to pay the current cost of government. Some reduction is possible, but the percentage will have to be small.

Unfortunately, the spirit of the general election did not continue through last Thursday's referendum on an amendment authorizing the state to purchase 25 million dollars worth of land for re-sale to veterans. While the country is in the act of eliminating bureaus our state creates another one. Yes, the public, by ratifying that amendment established a bureaucracy of its own for the purpose of doing what real estate companies are already doing — another case of a tax supported agency competing with a tax paying business.

The amendment has another ill flavored feature. Proposing to help GI's who cannot get adequate backing in regular financial institutions, it practically invites unsound deals, as a result of which the state will absorb the losses.

In short, if this agency, which we just created at a cost of more than a quarter of a million dollars (that was the expense of holding a separate, useless election) intends to promote deals that sound business does not approve, we don't want it. We don't want state officials gambling with our money. If it sticks to sound business principles we don't need it. Real estate companies already offer that service.

A long delayed movement that is gaining momentum these days is the campaign to get better pay for school teachers. Assurance of more adequate compensation it is believed, will draw an increasing number of talented people back into the ancient and honorable profession of pedagogy.

Nobody can deny that the teachers are right in their demand and that the present alarming shortage of teachers, especially qualified teachers, is a disgrace to the state. A beginning teacher, according to Rural Aid laws, receives a little

## MILK RECEIPTS DOWN 20 PER CENT BELOW LAST YEAR'S FIGURES

Muenster is in line with other dairy areas of North Texas and Oklahoma in its present slump in milk production. Rudy Hellman disclosed this week that dairy receipts have dropped to 25,000 pounds as compared with 31,000 a year ago. Of that volume 40 cans, about 3,000 pounds are delivered to the Crystal Creamery of Gainesville to help make up for a shortage of production there. Last year only 20 cans a day were delivered.

Similar situations exist in many other plants. Cheese production is down generally because small town plants are sending greater volumes than ever to help city dairies through their emergencies. Fewer dairy cattle, and unfavorable weather are chiefly responsible for the decrease.

## CIVIC LEAGUE SETS NEXT SATURDAY AS CITY CLEAN-UP DAY

Next Saturday, the 16th, is cleanup day in Muenster. The event is being sponsored by the Civic League and Garden Club.

Mrs. Frank Kaiser, chairman of the sanitation committee of the organization, stated that a truck for hauling is available on the 16th and that the project is expected to consume the greater part of the day, beginning at 8 a.m. A minimum charge of 25c will be made at each stop.

Every citizen is urged to cooperate in this cleanup and have trash, cans and other junk sacked or boxed, ready to be picked up when the truck stops. The sponsor group asks that the sacks or boxes be placed at curbs rather than in alleys, explaining that all city alleys are not open to traffic and others are not free from nails and glass which damage tires.

The sponsor group announced that ashes will not be hauled in this cleanup and asks citizens to dispose of ashes in some other manner. All other rubbish will be picked up.

The area covered will include the entire corporate city limits.

In case of rain the cleanup will be held on the following Saturday, the weather permitting.

## Nick Miller Installs New Cleaning Machines

The balance of the repair program started at Nick Miller's cleaning and pressing plant several weeks ago is in progress this week. He is installing a complete set of new cleaning equipment consisting of a continuous flow type washer with filtering unit, an extractor and a tumbler. The plant is closed this week for installation.

With the new equipment Miller expects to increase his plant's capacity at least 50 per cent. The continuous flow of cleaning fluid saves time formerly spent in changing fluid and the extractors and tumblers save time formerly spent hanging clothes out to dry. An automatic boiler has already proved to be a time saver in the pressing department.

## Fire At John Klement Garage Extinguished With Garden Hose

The garage at J.B. Klement's home has a badly charred corner but no serious damage as the result of a fire which was put out before it had a good start. When the fire department — and almost half of the city — arrived at the scene the blaze was completely extinguished.

Shortly before noon Friday members of the family discovered the fire in its early stage from smoke coming out of the doors and windows. Within two minutes it was extinguished with a garden hose.

Spontaneous combustion from oil soaked rags in a corner is believed to have started the fire. There were no open flames or electric wires anywhere near.

## Hornets Will Play Sunday Afternoon, Wednesday Night

The Muenster Hornets are scheduled to go into action twice during the coming week. Father John Walbe, coach, disclosed Wednesday. Their first encounter is with Father Thomas Weinzappel's Sacred Heart Eagles of Texarkana, the second in with Marietta, Okla., Hl.

In both cases the Hornets will face teams of their own caliber as far as experience is concerned. However nothing is known here of either team's strength or its record for the season to date. Texarkana's team was organized this year and Marietta was re-organized this year after being inactive for the duration of the war.

The Texarkana game will be played in Leeper stadium Sunday afternoon at 3. The Marietta game will be played under the lights at Marietta, Wednesday night at 8.

Tentative agreements have also been made with Saint Jo and Valley View for return games in the near future, Father John said. Valley View's Eagles are seeking revenge for the Hornets' early season victory whereas Saint Jo's Panthers are giving the Hornets a chance to even the score. The Eagle game will probably be played at night on the Leopard field in Gainesville and the Panther game here. In either case the game will be played at the earliest convenient date.

## BE CAREFUL ABOUT WOOD TICKS, AVOID RELAPSING FEVER

Austin, Texas — With the hunting season now open, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, is urging that all hunters, or other persons spending time in wooded areas use all possible precautions against being bitten by ticks which may infect the victim with relapsing fever. He further advises that when a tick is found, it be removed from the body as soon as possible and that care be taken not to crush the ticks in handling them.

"Tick-bite fever is contracted, Dr. Cox explained, either from the bite of infected ticks or by absorbing the infectious material through breaks or scratches in the skin." According to Dr. Cox, the disease does not spread from person to person by direct contact but only through the bite of an infected tick or body louse. Prompt removal of the insect is of the utmost importance.

Relapsing fever, commonly called tick-bite fever, is characterized by sudden onset, intense headache located in the front part of the head and pains in the back and limbs. The fever lasts from three to five days before slowly declining. The temperature will then remain normal for about a week when the fever repeats itself. There may be three, four, or even more such relapses, which accounts for the name of the disease.

Dr. Cox said that the wearing of suitable clothing so as to prevent ticks getting next to the skin is of importance in the prevention of this disease. The insects may be removed with the fingers but the use of tweezers is recommended since this helps to prevent leaving the head embedded in the skin. After removing or handling a tick, the hands should be washed carefully with soap and warm water.

## Drive Begins To Raise Fund For Factory

Plans to build a lawn mower factory here began to take definite shape Wednesday when Lawrence Baumhardt of Sherman secured the backing of local business men for almost half of the venture. He will be here again Friday to contact persons he was not able to see Wednesday.

The factory will be set up as a corporation under the name of Southwest Manufacturing Company and shares in it are offered at \$100 each. It is estimated that \$25,000 would be sufficient as a minimum for capitalization, but the intention is to secure more capital, if possible, to provide an adequate working fund after setting up the building and equipment. \$30,000 is believed to be ample for all needs.

Most of the equipment to be used is now owned by Baumhardt in his business at Sherman and constitutes his personal investment in the corporation. At the present time no decision has been made about the location of the factory. That phase of development is to begin as soon as a sufficient number of pledges is received to complete the capitalization.

The building will measure approximately 50 x 80 and will provide working space for about 10 men at one time. Plans are to have two shifts bringing total employment to 20 men.

For the most part investments in the business are prompted more by the prospect of creating a regular pay roll than by the opportunity of earning dividends. Business men are agreed that the increased business volume the industry can create is worth more to the community and city than an annual return on their stock. The possibility of keeping local talent at home and further stimulating other business ventures was also appealing.

Baumhardt estimates that with normal progress the plant will be in production within six months. If building conditions improve soon the time will be consistently shorter.

Estimated production capacity when the plant gets into full time operation is 100 units a day.

## COMMUNITY TURKEY PRODUCTION FALLS TO MERE 600 BIRDS

The community turkey market, declining steadily during the past several years, hit a new low this season. Only about 600 birds were received at the FMA, and they have already been forwarded to poultry dressing plants of other cities.

The shortage of turkeys is especially emphasized by comparison with peak production years of the late thirties and early forties when more than a dozen car loads of dressed turkeys were shipped annually in the local turkey packing projects. Each of those cars held three times as many birds as the community produced this year.

According to Rudy Hellman, FMA plant manager, local farmers have been giving three principal reasons for their declining interest in turkeys: One is the discouraging feed situation at the beginning of the season, another is the increasing number of losses to foxes and other predatory animals, another is that many farmers believe other activities will net a better return on their time and investment.

## Season's First Frost Here Monday Morning

A very light frost, the first of the season, tinted car and roof tops of the community Monday morning but apparently was not severe enough to affect vegetation.

Since then clear and moderately warm weather has prevailed. The only moisture of the past week was a flash shower of .3 inch early Saturday afternoon.

## Driving Courses In School

The Texas Safety Association reveals that 286 high schools and several junior high schools of Texas now are offering driver education and driver training in their regular curricula. These courses were promoted through the Safety Division, department of education, which is not entirely state-supported. Thousands of drivers on the highways — what better investment could a state make?

Some months ago I reported in the *Clarion* how Mel Bate's uncle died up north, and left him with a tidy fortune.

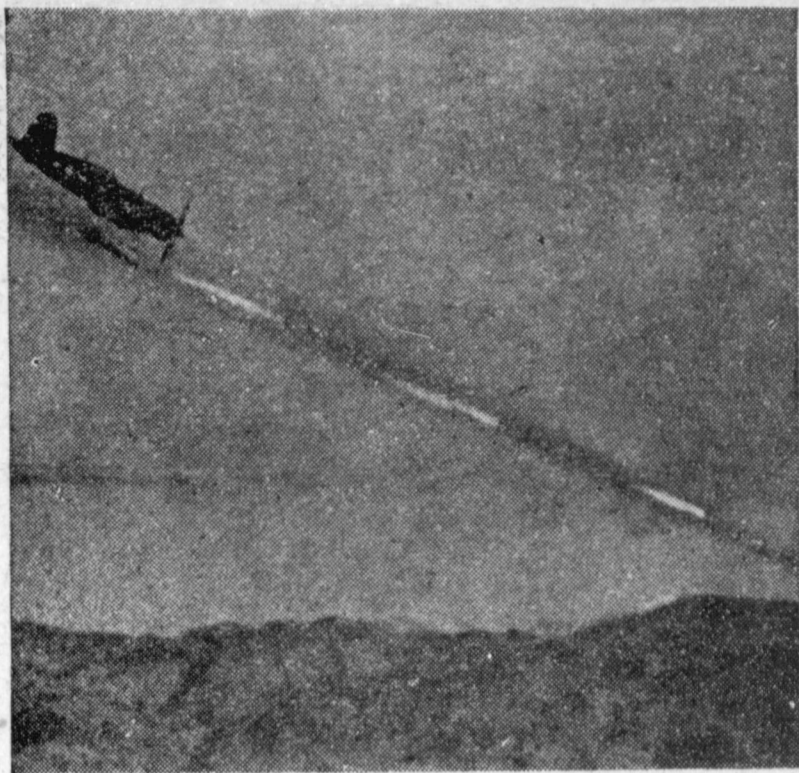

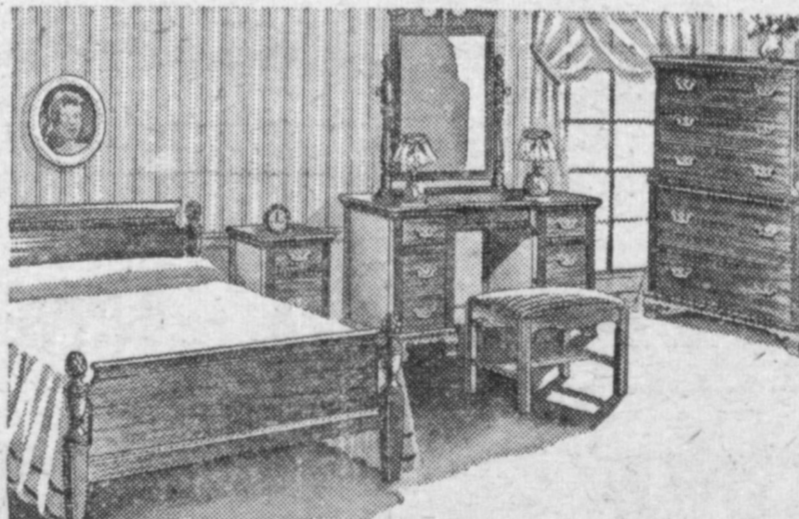

### JESTER INVITED TO TEACHERS' POW WOW ON INSUFFICIENT PAY

Dallas, Texas — Governor-Elect Beauford H. Jester has been invited to attend the annual meeting of the Texas Teachers Welfare Association, Inc., in Dallas on Saturday, December 14, to discuss his program for increasing the pay of Texas Teachers. The Governor-Elect is pledged to raise the pay of teachers.

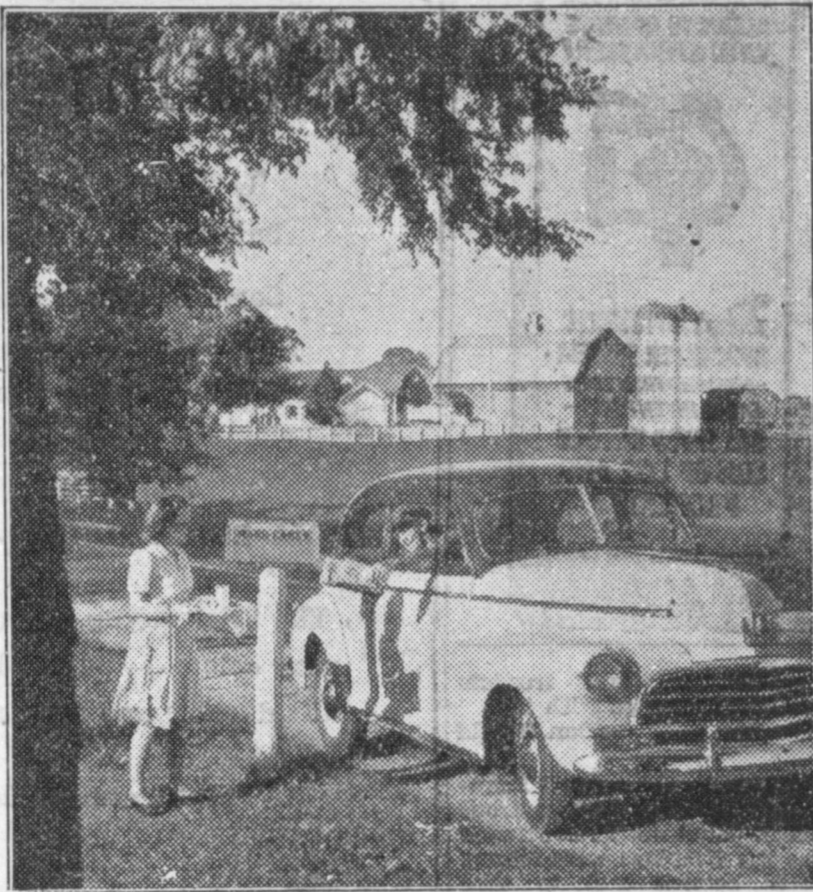
The recently chartered Texas Teachers Welfare Association, a militant organization of teachers pledged to work for the general improvement of the teaching profession, is now conducting state-wide campaign to inform the public of the grave shortage of teachers in Texas schools and to bring about an increase of pay which they declare is necessary to halt the wholesale exodus of teachers from the schoolrooms of the State.

Amendment of the Rural Aid Law lifting the ceilings which this law imposes on teachers in Rural Aid Schools is first on the program now being sponsored by the Texas Teachers Welfare Association. A minimum of \$2,400 a year for beginners, instead of the \$1,215 maximum for beginners now allowed under the Rural Aid Law, is proposed by the association.

Texas ranks 33rd among the states in per capita expenditure for education, far below the national average. The figures cited by Dr. Harris were compiled by the National Educational Association, which has taken a strong stand in favor of higher pay for teachers generally.

Less than three out of every hundred Navy and Marine wounded died in World War II as compared with more than eleven out of a hundred in World War I. Death from disease was less than one tenth that of World War I, despite the fact that fighting in the recent war took place in far more unhealthy regions.

#### BUILDING TO "ROLL" IN AN EARTHQUAKE

At least one building in Los Angeles will "roll with the punch" during any future earthquake, thanks to the ingenuity of an Indiana manufacturer in making huge roller bearings for it to rest on.

Weighing 600 pounds each, 65 sets of the specially designed bearings are being placed under the main pillars of the building each bearing assembly supporting a load of 250,000 pounds. They will permit the building safely to move six inches in any direction.

Commercial motor vehicles equipped with lighter, "stronger and more enduring" body of aluminum, magnesium and stainless steel have successfully passed tests, manufacturers report.

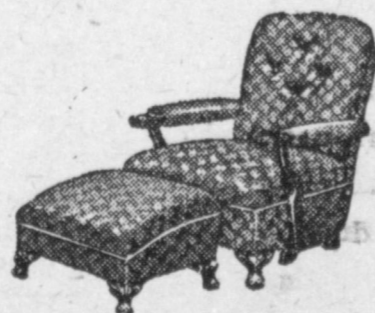

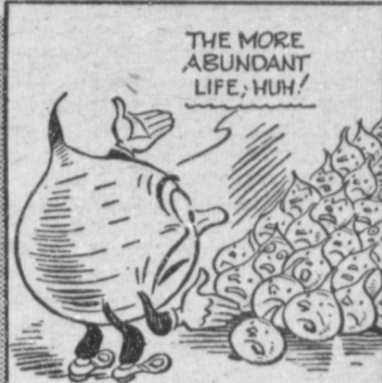

more than \$1,200. No wonder qualified men and women are deserting the classrooms in favor of other occupations. Domestic and day laborers can realize a better net income. And persons with the equivalent of a teacher's educational background can do two or three times as well. The skimpy standard of living allowed on \$1,200 a year is poor reward indeed for the many years of expensive training a teacher must have.

A report just released indicates how the poor wage scale reflects on the state's educational standards. Of almost 36,000 teachers beginning the current school term more than 9,000 were new at the job and almost 6,000 were sub-standard. And still more than a thousand teaching positions remained vacant.

The pitiful inadequacy of pay is just another phase of a general deplorable condition brought on by our cockeyed economy of recent years. Teacher pay hasn't been reduced. The trouble is that posts and other wages have increased unreasonably and people with an old set salary are simply holding the bag. The same applies to people who saved money in the past. Many a person who thought he had something to retire on is discovering that he will have to do a lot of skimming to get by. For the same reason men who provided a few thousand dollars worth of insurance are wondering whether their widows will be free from want.

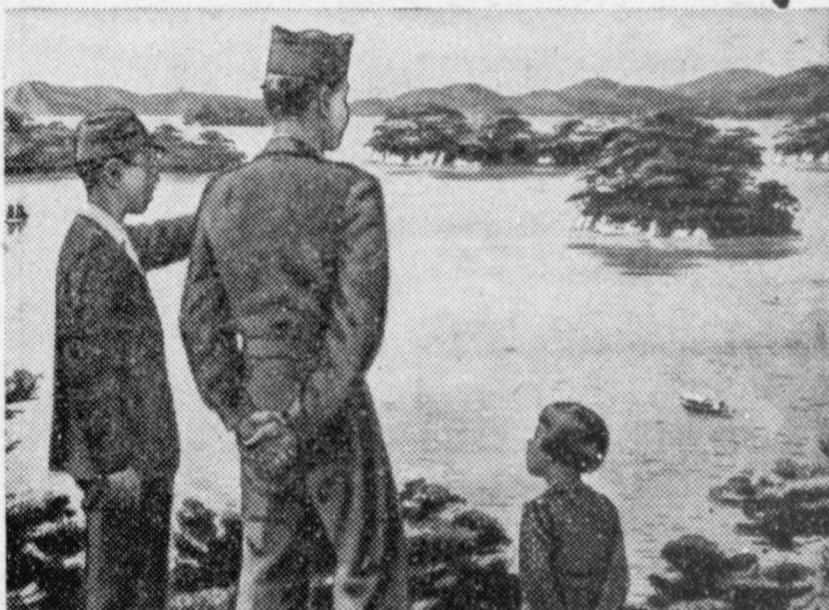

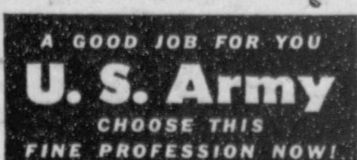
