The American Way



By George Peck WHITE'S BLACK BILL

"Pinkitis" or "Left-Wingitis" is a most contagious disease, to which politicians seem to be especially vulnerable.

As a case in point, hearings have just been completed before the Senate Committee on Interstate and Foreign Commerce on S 1833, as nice a piece of "left-wing" legislation as has ever been proposed to a committee of the United States Congress. And who of all people do you suppose is sponsoring this Bill, which if enacted would utterly destroy freedom of radio? None other than Senator W.H. White, Jr.

And who is Senator White? In 1916 he was first elected to the House of Representatives. After serving successive terms there, in 1930 he was elected to the United States Senate, was re-elected in 1936 and again in 1942. Currently he is majority floor leader of the Senate in the 80th Congress. And to what political party does Senator White belong? Believe it or not, he is reputed to be a Republican. And what state sends Mr. White to the Senate? None other than Maine — you will remember Maine and Vermont were the only two states that went Republican in the national elections of 1936.

So here we have the spectacle of a Republican Senator from the rock-ribbed Republican state of Maine dumping into the legislative hopper a Bill that could not be more totalitarian had it been concocted and introduced by William Z. Foster, or Earl Browder, or even Joseph Stalin himself. Amazing, isn't it? Yes, and even more than that, it's terrifying.

Space does not permit listing here the "left-wing" provisions of Senator White's proposed legislation. But here follow just a few of the things it would do:

- 1 — Virtually destroy network broadcasting.
- 2 — Impose a censorship on radio that would make it a political football.
- 3 — Give the Federal Communications Commission life-and-death power over radio stations.
- 4 — Make it practically impossible for radio broadcasting interests to obtain the capital so necessary for further experiment, research and development.
- 5 — Result in radio programs of a standard as poor or poorer than those broadcast by the government-owned British Broadcasting Co. If you have ever heard any of these latter, you will realize what a threat to our radio listening enjoyment, the White Bill is.
- 6 — Drive radio broadcasting from private to government ownership and constitute the entering wedge for dictatorship in America.

Just how a man of Senator White's reputation, character, past performances and life-time political affiliations can father such a destructive piece of legislation, is almost beyond comprehension. The only possible explanation is that he has fallen a victim of that dread disease, "Left-Wingitis."

By all means write your Representative and your United States Senators to scrutinize this Bill most carefully. Such examination should convince enough of our legislators of the threat to our national freedom embodied therein; that it would indeed be a dark day for America, to enact into law, White's black Bill.

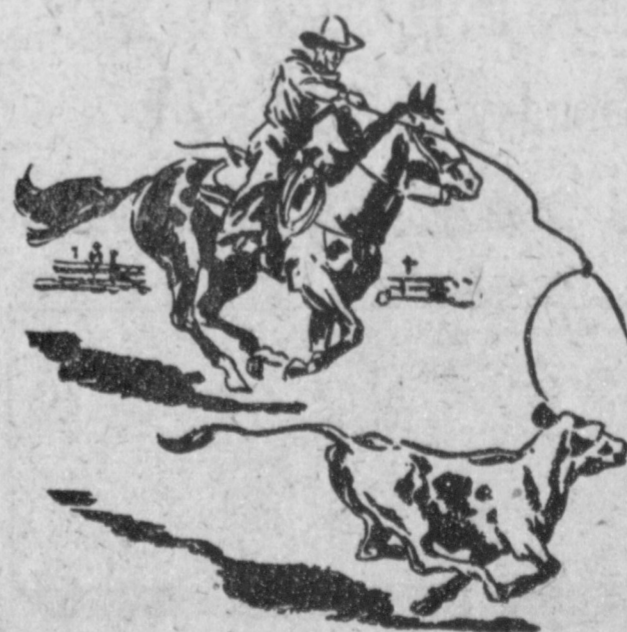

Well, just in case the lucky angler who catches Kilroy should take advantage of those two prizes and get just a bit tippy, the boys down at the Denison police department have chipped in \$10.45 to pay for a tippy fine should the angler need it.

"We'll probably never have to pay it," smiled Chief Paul Borum today, "but we felt that in view of the type prizes that have been added the least we could do was give the angler that added protection. Naturally, we hope he never has to collect it."

In case you're still interested, the \$10.45 brings the total cash and prizes on Kilroy, No. 1013 in the \$75,000 Lake Texoma Fish Rodeo, to \$1,318.38.

Smallest Tractor With Full Set of Implements To Cost Less Than \$1000

The smallest farm tractor yet developed, now being built by a Midwest manufacturer to sell for \$185 or more below the cost of a standard-size tractor, will enable owners of small farms to mechanize their operations on a sound commercial basis.

Selling at \$545, F.O.B. factory at Louisville, Ky., the "little giant" will enable a farmer to acquire a tractor and a set of implements such as plow, planter, cultivator, disc harrow, and mower, for less than \$1,000 at the factory.

When full production is reached, the "little giants" will be turned out at the rate of 50,000 per year.

It Happened 10 Years Ago

5 YEARS AGO

July 24, 1942

Draft boards are directed to call single men first. — 38,000 pounds of scrap rubber are donated here to aid the war effort. — Mrs. J. B. Confetti---

If those unions succeed in putting over their deal, is obvious. Railroads estimate that the increased cost to them will be about a billion dollars a year. They can't absorb the increase, so it will have to be passed on to the consumer.

All this comes at a time when railroads were about to ask for rate increases to offset their other higher costs. Already working on a margin that is too close for comfort, the railroads cannot possibly maintain

their service without relief in the form of greater revenue or less cost. Investors just don't continue putting money into a losing proposition.

Aside from purely business complications the demand involves also a very fundamental ethical consideration — as regards the justice in featherbedding. Is it fair and can our supreme court possibly regard it as legal to demand pay for work not done? We all realize, of course, that it has been going on, but isn't it about time that someone with principle and authority put an end to it?

Sooner or later, if we hope to keep this country from going completely to ruin, we'll have to get back to the standard of an honest day's work for an honest day's pay. Any deviation from that standard, no matter how slight, is dishonest on the part of the person concerned and an unfair imposition on everybody else.

This case of railroad men is a convenient and glaring example to trace through. The unearned wage of 20 man-days has to be paid by increased rates which eventually are paid by other workmen — including honest workmen who earned their pay. Every dollar of increased freight cost to them amounts to a dollar of extortion by the featherbedders.

Reducing the case to such simple terms we should not have any doubt about applying the moral code. Taking from another is unjust, period, and somebody ought to have the courage and legal right to put a stop to it.

People who refuse to be moved by the moral appeal might do well to ponder that this problem is serious also from a standpoint of plain expediency. The man who doesn't measure by right and wrong but only by a cold calculation of what he can get out of it had better start to realize that this kind of homeplay is hatching a first class economic mess that will hurt every

man, woman and child in this country. This is the kind of stuff that communists promote. It fits perfectly with their objective of reducing us to confused, quarreling, distrustful incompetents ready to be gobbled into their international slavery system.

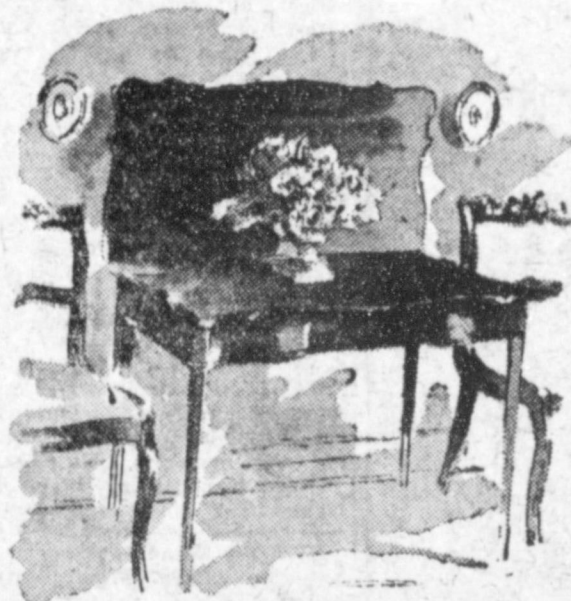

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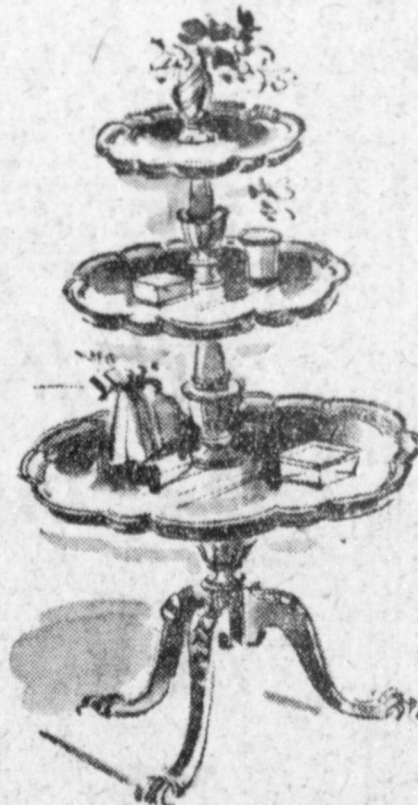

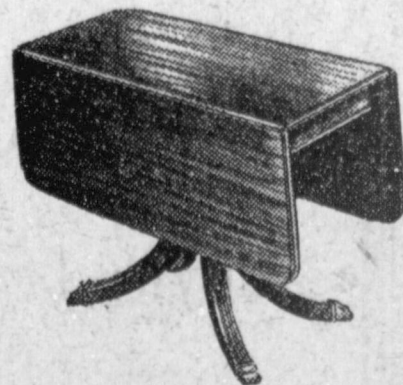
