Apparently he thinks that he can heap abuse on this country without limit but the slightest retaliation to his ugly attitude is out of order. Who does he think he is, anyway? A self made god with a self endowed divine right to throw his weight around as he pleases?

Does he actually think he is so big that he can impose his repulsive presence anywhere? Even on free people who loathe him as the world's most contemptible, treacherous, murderous and depraved specimen of all human history?

### 4,700 Stations in Texas Ready for Car Inspections

Motor vehicle safety inspections for 1961 in Texas began on September 1 and will end on April 15, 1961.

Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said station are ready to attach the new 1961 inspection stickers to the windshields of more than four and one-half million vehicles coming under the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Inspection Act. All such vehicles must display the new sticker on April 16, 1961. Garrison said, "We feel that

the vehicle inspection program in Texas has proved a deterrent to vehicle accidents on our streets and highways." He urged all motorists to get their vehicles inspected before the bad weather of winter begins.

"It takes just a few minutes to have a vehicle safety checked," Garrison said. "Yet those few minutes thus spent today could mean the saving of someone's life tomorrow. Garrison noted that the per cent of accidents in which vehicle defects were causative factors has been cut approximately in half since the program was started in Texas. The fee for each inspection is \$1.00 plus any repair or adjustment necessary. The average cost for inspection in 1960, including the \$1.00 fee, was \$2.00 per vehicle.
