## Fire Prevention, The Job

Every 37 second a fire breaks out in some city in the United States, endangering lives and damaging or destroying property.

Every 46 minutes some one dies as the result of fire in this country.

These are the two impelling challenges commanding us to give a thought to fire safety during Fire Prevention Week (October 9-15).

It was the Great Chicago Fire in 1871 that eventually brought recognition of the need for a concentrated drive for fire prevention on a national scale.

### FIRST FIRE PREVENTION DAY

The first Fire Prevention Day was observed October 9, 1911, the 40th anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire.

In 1920, President Woodrow Wilson issued the first Presidential-Proclamation of Fire Prevention Day.

And, in 1922, President Warren G. Harding proclaimed the first Fire Prevention Week.

Each year since then, the President of the United States has proclaimed the week containing October 9 as Fire Prevention Week.

Last year losses from fire were a shade below those of the preceding year.

In 1959 the number of fires deaths totaled 11,300 compared with 11,500 in 1958.

And fire losses at \$1,047,073,000 were nine-tenths of one per cent under 1958, the first decline since 1950.

### THE JOB MUST CONTINUE

There can be no relenting in the fight against fire. There can be no resting on the laurels.

It is the job of all of us to continue our efforts to make America fire safe.

Have you checked your attic or basement recently for accumulation of the type of combustible trash in which fires so easily start?

Have you checked your electric circuits and extension cords to make sure they are in tip-top shape?

Does your fuse box contain fuses of the proper amperage?

Remember one-fourth of all fires are caused by matches and smoking. Another 20.4 per cent are the result of misuse of electrical equipment. And three-fourths of all fires are needless — they are caused by human carelessness and forgetfulness.

You can do your part tonight by using care.

## TV & THE PRINTED WORD

Competition for shares of the advertising dollar gets tougher all the time. Television has seen to that.

Television people have, on occasion, attempted to sell the idea that their media is a far more effective way of interesting the potential consumer than any other — including newspapers. So a survey in Richmond, Virginia, is of unusual interest.

Editor & Publisher reports: "An independent research organization found that of more than 41,000 telephone calls only about one-fifth of them had the TV set turned on. Of that number 81% were able to identify the program turned on but 71% could not name any sponsor or product or type of product being advertised on that program. And even if the respondent said 'soap' instead of giving a brand name it was counted as sponsor identification, which seems to us like leaning over backward to be fair."

### TAX-MAN SAM SEZ:

Quite a few Pops still worry every summer about how much money Junior makes during vacation. At one time Pop lost his income tax exemption for Junior if Junior earned over \$600 during the year. However, since 1954 this is no longer the case. Pop doesn't have to worry about how much money Junior makes. A father who furnishes principal support for his child can claim an exemption for a child under 19 years of age, or for a bona fide student, over 18 years of age who was a fulltime student for 5 months of the year, even though the child files his (or her) own income tax return and takes his (or her) own personal exemption on his (or her) return. This is the one case where you can take a double deduction for the same exemption.



### PART OF THE JOB

Individual Americans, as everyone knows, enjoys more control over their personal lives, more control over their government and are less subject to the whims of those in authority over them than almost any other people of the human race.

Unfortunately, this is not a state of affairs that will perpetuate itself unassisted. There always are evil or misguided people who, from either the worst or best of intentions, try to subvert other people's liberties to their own desires.

A healthy dose of public exposure is the first step in defending against corrupt or crackpot schemes, whether they develop in government, business, labor unions or any other segment of society. Providing this exposure is one of the most important jobs of a free press in a free country.

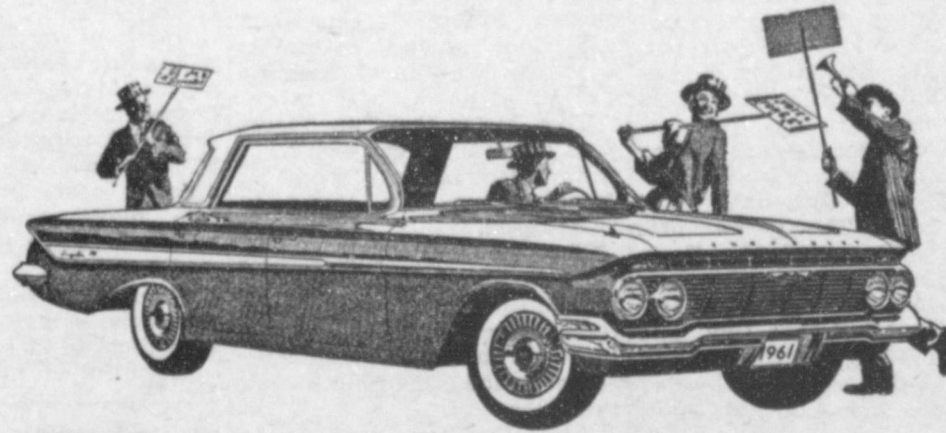

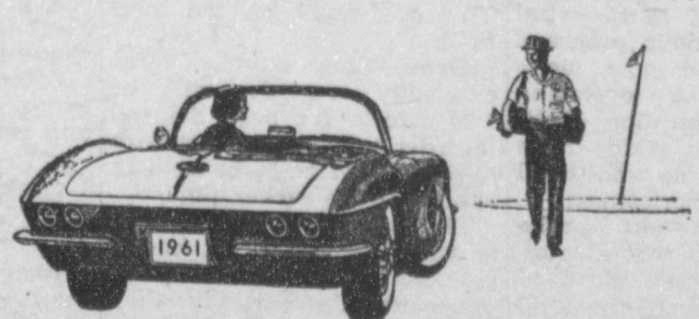

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

Looking back through history, searching for causes of the down-fall of old and mighty empires, one finds agriculture an important contributing factor.

Lack of conservation farming knowledge buried the old cities beneath soil deposited by water and wind.

Before white men came to this continent, all the land was covered with grasses and trees. Under this condition no erosion problems existed.

The arrival of white men and a growing population created the need for food, pressuring the farmers to rip open the earth with a plow and subject the fields to the tremendous erosive power of wind and water.

Should the soil be used as it was in the days of old? Or should conservation methods be applied? Today, almost everyone knows the answer. Conservation farming is a must to preserve the land for future generations and continue this nation's way of life.

Economically sound conservation practices that are used by Muenster-Saint Jo area farmers and ranchers are waterway-terrace systems, cover cropping, crop rotation, fertilizing, and proper pasture and range management.

One conservation step that can begin now on cropland to prevent soil erosion is waterway-terrace system development.

Waterway location should be marked now and work begun on preparations for sodding or seeding next spring. Some area landowners who have begun this conservation activ-

ity are Dangelmayr Brothers, Andy Walterscheid, Leo Mosman, Fred Arend and Ely and Sparkman.

Local SCS personnel will be glad to assist in the application of such practices.

SECTION 13 - Disposal of Salt Water. It shall be unlawful for permittee to allow, deposit or otherwise bring salt water to the surface...

SECTION 14 - Penalties. Any person who shall violate any of the provisions of this Ordinance...

SECTION 15 - Derick & Rigs. It shall be unlawful and an offense for any person to operate in connection with the drilling or reworking of any well...

SECTION 16 - Pits. Only possible slush tanks for mud or water shall be permitted in connection with the drilling and reworking operation...

SECTION 17 - Drilling Fluid and Cement. All operators shall be required to drill with fluid of sufficient weight to lubricate the formation...

SECTION 18 - Fencing. Any person who completes any well as a producer shall have the obligation to enclose said well...

SECTION 19 - Smoking. No person engaged in drilling or operating any well shall permit smoking to take place within the city limits of Muenster...

SECTION 20 - Disposal of Salt Water. It shall be unlawful for Permittee to allow, deposit or otherwise bring salt water to the surface...

SECTION 21 - Violations. Any violation of the laws of the State of Texas or any rules, regulations or orders of the regulatory body...

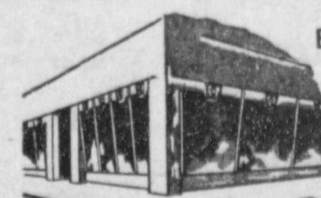
