



(b) The word "Well" shall include and mean any hole or holes, bore or bores to any sand, formation, strata or depth, which is or are drilled, bored, sunk, dug or put down for the purposes of either bore or bores to any sand, formation, strata or depth, which is or are drilled, bored, sunk, dug or put down for the purposes of either exploring for or ascertaining the existence of any oil, gas, liquid byproduct, or any of them, or for the purpose of producing and recovering any oil, gas or any petroleum or mineral products, including water, if used in connection with production or operation of oil wells.

(c) The word "Permittee" shall mean the person to whom is issued a permit for drilling and operation of a well or water flooding under this Ordinance, and his or its administrators, executors, heirs, successors and assigns.

(d) The term "Drilling Unit" as used in this Ordinance shall mean one continguous body or block of land composed of one or more tracts or lots of land, comprising a total surface area of 20 acres of land, subject to a tolerance of 5 per cent more or less, provided, however that the separation of such tracts or lots of rodinance.

(e) All technical or oil and gas industry words or phases used herein shall have that meaning customarily attributable thereto by prudent operators in the oil and gas industry.

It shall be unlawful and an offense for any person acting either for himself or acting as agent, employee, independent contractor, or servant of any other person, to commence to drill, or to operate any well within the city limits of the City of Muenster, or to commence to water flood of any lease or well, or to work upon or assist in any way in the operation of any such well, without a permit for drilling or permit for water flooding and operating of such well or lease, having first been issued by the authority of the City Council of the City of Muenster, Cooke County, Texas, in accordance with the terms and provisions of this Ordinance.

SECTION 3.—Streets and Alleys

It shall be unlawful to drill any well, and no well shall be drilled and no permit shall be issued for any well to be drilled at any location which is within any of the streets or alleys of the City of Muenster; and no street or alley shall be blocked or incumbered or closed in any drilling or production operation, except by special permit by order of the City Council of the City of Muenster, and then only temporarily.

(a) No well shall be drilled and no permit shall be issued for any well to be drilled at any location which is nearer than 150 ft. of any residence, building, or structure, without the applicant having first secured the written permission of the owner or owners thereof.

(b) No well shall be drilled and no permit shall be issued for any well to be drilled on an area which is less than 2½ acres, and which said area, as near as possible shall form a square, or the normal size of a city Block, which is considered to be 300 feet by 300 feet. If a rule 37 Permit is applied for and approved by the Railroad Commission, the same would also have to be approved by the City Council under the terms of this Ordinance before a permit can be issued.

SECTION 5—One Well on Drilling Unit.

The drilling, completion and operation of only one well to each reservoir may be authorized by permit as herein provided on each drilling unit within the city limits, and it shall be unlawful to drill on each reservoir more than one well on each unit; provided, however, that in the event a well is lost or abandoned as a dry hole, the permittee may relocate the well on the drilling unit involved and drill and complete such relocated well under the permit for the first well by filing a plat and certificate showing the abandonment of the first well and the location of the second well.

SECTION 6—Water Flooding

No type of water flooding shall be commenced, instituted or operated within the limits of the city of Muenster without having first obtained a permit from the City Council.

(a) All persons, firms, corporations, agents or employees thereof, desiring to use water flooding in or upon any oil and gas lease within the limits of the City of Muenster, shall make application thereof with the Secretary of the City of Muenster, showing and describing clearly therein the plat, tract location of well, the injection well and all other information deemed necessary.

Any old or abandoned wells, which have not been plugged, must be opened and cemented or pluggeded before a permit can be issued for ater flooding.

(c) No water flooding can be done by use of water from the Trinity sand within the limits of the City of Muenster or within an area extending two miles around the city of Muenster.

(d) Any water flooding whether under permit previously issued or otherwise in which such operations affect the water supply of the city of Muenster shall be discontinued and such water flooding immediately stopped.

SECTION 14. Termination of Permit
When a permit shall have been issued, the same shall terminate and become inoperative without any action on the part of the City unless within six months from the date of issuance actual drilling of the well designated therein shall have commenced. In the event a permit be issued by the City Council under the terms of this Ordinance for the drilling and operation of a well, or whether the permit be for the purpose of water flooding of a lease or wells, no actual drilling or water flooding operations shall be commenced until a surety bond, duly executed by permittee, as principal and by a reliable surety company authorized to do business in Texas, as surety, in the amount and upon the conditions prescribed in this section shall be filled with and approve in writing by the City Council of the City of Muenster, or the designated employee of the City Council, whether same be the City Secretary or some other designated and appointed person, which makes the drilling and operation of such well to be drilled or the operations of water flooding subject to the terms and conditions of surety bonds, totaling \$10,000.00 previously filed by permittee hereunder. Such bond shall run to the City of Muenster, for the benefit of the City and all persons concerned, conditioned that the permittee will comply with the terms and conditions of this Ordinance in the drilling and operation of the Well, or in the operation of the City which may be disturbed or damaged in the operation to their former conditions, as near as practicable; that the permittee will promptly restore the streets and sidewalks and other public property of the City which may be disturbed or damaged in the operation to their former conditions, as near as practicable as it existed when operations for the drilling of the well were first commenced; and that permittee will promptly pay and discharge any liability imposed by reason of the granting of the permit or the operations carried on thereunder, and that the permittee will comply with all condition as near as practicable as it existed when operations for the drilling of the permit or the operations carried by any person whomsoever and resulting from the drillin

SECTION 20—Premises

SECTION 27—Penalty

It shall be unlawful and an offence for any person to violate orneglect to comply with any provisions hereof irrespective of whether or not the verbiage of each section hereof contains the specific language that such violation or neglect, is unlawful and is an offence.

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
