

Following a long established custom of the community Mayor Herbert Meurer has issued an official city proclamation designating Good Friday, April 15, as a day of special reverence and urging all citizens to observe it fittingly by suspending normal activity for a period of three hours.

The proclamation asks business houses to close from 2 to 5, allowing ample time before and after special Good Friday Services which begin at 3 o'clock in Sacred Heart Church.

Mayor Meurer praised the community for its record of Good Friday observances and asked that this year's be carried out in the same respectful and edifying manner. He especially urges that business firms stay closed and that all people refrain from unnecessary car driving.

The city and community were picked for several of the group's many stops and besides arrangements have been made for serving lunch in the K of C hall.


