#### Gladiola's Baking Recipe of the Month

From Mrs. Smaistrla: "Helen's Sunshine Rolls"

1	cup milk, scalded	2 tablespoons lukewarm water
1/2	cup shortening	1 teaspoon sugar
1/2	cup sugar	2 cakes compressed yeast
1	teaspoon salt	3 egg yolks
	5 cups (about) sifted	Gladiola Special Hard Wheat Flour

Melt shortening in scalded milk; add sugar and salt and stir to dissolve. Cool to lukewarm. Dissolve the teaspoon of sugar and yeast in lukewarm water. Add yeast and egg yolks to cooled mixture and beat. Add about half the flour and beat thoroughly by hand or an electric mixer. Add remaining flour gradually, beating well, to make a medium soft dough. Place in a greased bowl, cover and let rise in a warm place until double in bulk. Punch down and divide dough into two portions. On a lightly floured surface roll each into a 9-inch circle. If desired, brush dough with melted margarine or butter. Cut each circle into 12 wedges; starting with the wide edge, roll each wedge and place, point down, in a greased shallow baking pan. Brush with milk and sprinkle with poppy seeds if desired, or brush again with melted butter. Let rise in a warm place until double in bulk. Bake in a moderately hot oven (400 degrees) 12 to 15 minutes or until golden brown. Makes 24 rolls.
