The Olympic festivals were originated by the people of Elis, a Greek city-state on the plains of Olympia. Gradually, all the Greek city-states joined in the Olympics. Other contests, such as jumping, discus-



In about A D. 60, the Roman emperor Nero entered the contests. One of the purposes of the games was to glorify the individual, his skill and his sportsmanship. But Nero was a poor athlete and by competing he lowered the standards. The games deteriorated and

by A. D. 394 they had become corrupt that Emperor Theodosius abolished them. Centuries passed, while earthquakes and floods buried the plain under 20 feet of

gravel and soil. When excavators found the ruins of the ancient stadium in 1878, interest in the games was revived. In 1896 eight nations took part in the first Olympics of the modern age.
