BE ON GURD AGAINST SUMMER AILMENTS SAYS HEALTH OFFICER

AUSTIN, TEXAS—Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a warning to parents that this is the season for an increase in dysentery, diarrhea and "summer complaint."

"The chief cause of these intestinal diseases are contaminated milk; water or food; allowing the child to get overheated or exhausted; excessive sugar in the babies formula; and improper amount of food," Dr. Cox said. "All foods should be fresh and clean, and left-overs should be properly refrigerated to prevent spoilage."

Dr. Cox urged extreme care in the preparation of a feeding formula for infants. He said it should be prescribed by a physician, and that cleanliness and refrigeration were absolute essentials. Babies should be fed at regular intervals and on a definite schedule, since their stomach and bowels can be easily upset if fed irregularly or whenever they are fretful or restless.

The State Health Officer declared that dysentery is transmitted by flies and said every home should be well-screened and free of flies.

"If dysentery or diarrhea develop, consult your physician at once," Dr. Cox advised. "This so-called 'summer complaint' can be a very serious menace to your baby's health, if not an actual threat to his life."

EARLY CUTTING EARLY IN THE DAY IS GOOD RECIPE FOR GOOD HAY

"There is more feed value and dollars and cents gain in legumes and grasses cut for hay in the proper early stages even though the hayrack or the wagon hauling bales is not quite so full," say Kraft Foods Company dairy farm service field men.

The things that can be done to insure this quality are to cut before maturity, cut early in the morning while the dew is still on in order that curing and getting the hay into the barn, stack or bale may be accomplished without undue loss of leaves.

The choice between a little greater tonnage from late cutting against higher protein content from early cutting is easily made in favor of more protein, greater palatability and generally higher quality.

The approximate protein con-



Textile chemical, a new type of melamine resin, imparts shrinkage control, muss resistance and stability to woollens, rayons, cottons and blends, according to National Patent Council. This dainty damask is modeling garments processed with the chemical. She finds that her dresses emerge unwrinkled from suit cases, clothing holds its shape after prolonged wear, and blouses and blankets can be safely laundered in the Monday wash. The chemical permeates the microscopic hollows of the individual fibers.

Content of legumes cut when bloom begins is 20 per cent. After full bloom the protein drops to 15 per cent. When grasses are cut early they contain about 10 or 12 per cent protein compared to around five per cent at full maturity.

A summary of the recommendations by various states for cutting in various types of legumes and grasses are:

Alfalfa — One-tenth to one-fourth bloom.

Clover — One-half bloom.

Sweet Clover — When buds show, or earlier.

Johnson Grass and Sudan Grass — As the grass begins to head.

Other Grasses — As soon as headed, before bloom.

Soybeans — Earliest pods well-filled, before lower leaves turn yellow.

Adequate equipment to put hay up quickly is the next most important step after the hay has been cut at the proper stage. Early morning, while the dew is still on, is the time to mow to save the best hours of the day for curing. Hay should be rushed to the barn, bale or stack as soon as it is dry enough to store.

Over-drying will very quickly destroy color and the feed value in addition to greatly increasing the scattering of leaves which contain most of the nutrients. Furthermore, dry hay suffers most from exposure to rain or dew.

Take care of leaves when hay is made and the stems will take care of themselves. The leaves contain over twice as much feed value, pound for pound, as the stems, and they scatter so easily that fully half of the feed value may be lost.

Good legume hay should be 50 per cent leaves by weight. The best way to save the leaves is to avoid over-drying which causes shattering and to handle the hay as little as possible. Small windrows, unless rained on, will dry just as well without turning. That saves not only leaves but labor and time.

Yes, early is the word for hay. Cut it early in the morning, early in maturity stage, and save the leaves. It means a bank of protein feed that will assure highest yields from dairy and other livestock farming.

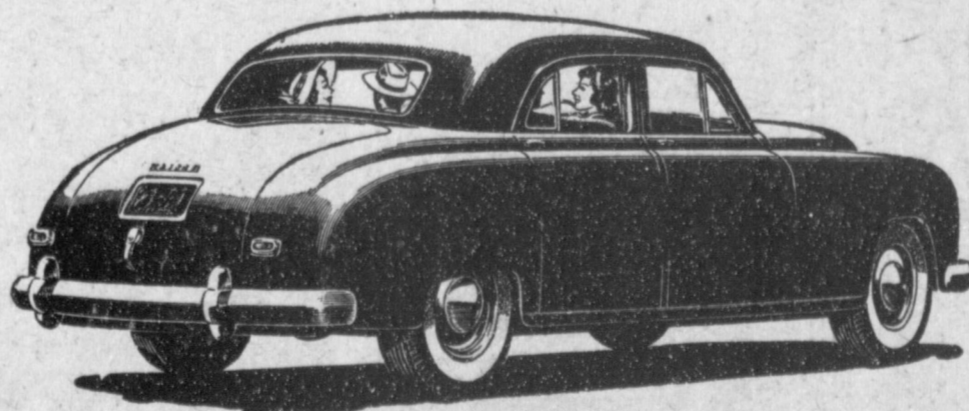

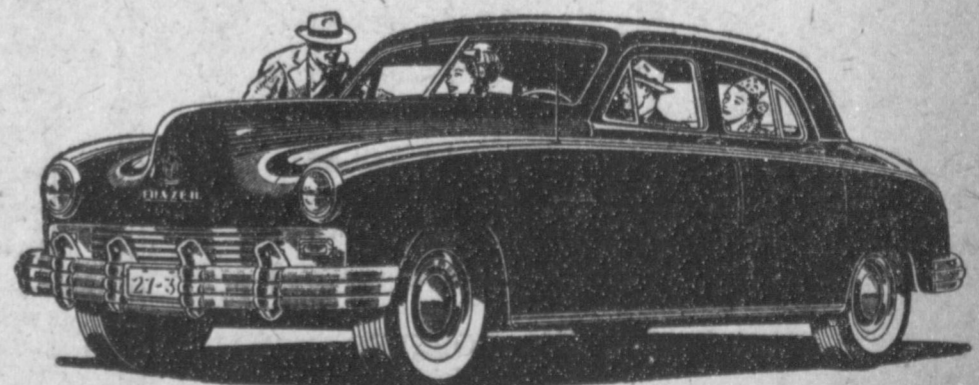

The American Way

THE NOOSE OF COMMUNISM

Will Rogers had a habit of saying, "All I know is what I read in the papers." If half the items we read in the daily press and hear over the radio pertaining to Communism are accurate, we have cause for grave concern. The ancient axiom, "Where there's smoke, there's fire," seems to make peculiarly sound sense these days.

The hot spots of Communism are emitting plenty of smoke today. If we sit idly by, that smoke will surely get into our eyes, too—just as befell the people of Yugoslavia, Hungary and Poland, and just recently to the people of Czechoslovakia. To study the manipulations and watch current developments unfold is to arrive at the definite conclusion that Stalin is trying to throw smoke in our eyes.

As an editor, I am in a good position to judge the vast quantities of written material being circulated in this country in the interest of a way of life wholly alien to our own. As this flood of

propaganda in the form of news items, magazine articles, books and the like, pours across my desk, I am astounded, not only by the scope but also by the subtlety of this mass attack upon our cherished institutions. Some of it is so intelligently presented that more than casual scrutiny is required to identify its true nature and purpose. Make no mistake, a serious move is being made to overthrow the government of the United States, by one means or another, including force, if necessary.

The handwriting is on the wall for all of us to see. In the case of each of the so-called satellite nations, it was the mental lethargy of the people themselves which made it so easy for Russia to step in and take over. All the more pity then that so many otherwise intelligent persons here in America are lending an attentive ear to the soothing effect of this left-wing nonsense.

Let us not delude ourselves about Uncle Joe, because he has much the same program all set for Uncle Sam. The propaganda, as I read it, is very carefully planned. To pursue it casually is to be enticed; however, to read between the lines, as a conscientious editor is compelled to do, is to discover the vicious objectives of this allegedly-Utopian economic system.

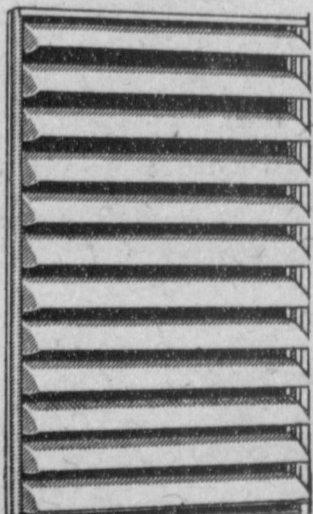

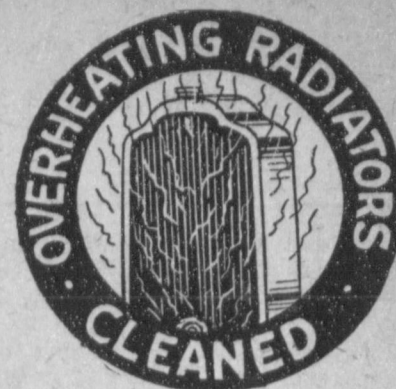

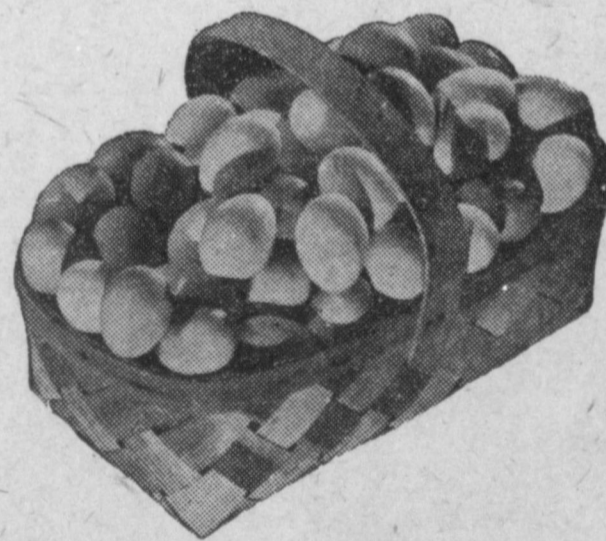

But Indian women had their revenge. An odd law decreed that if a father got into debt, his wife could sell him into slavery to pay off the creditors. This was just the opposite of some African countries, where the husband could put the wife up on the auction block.

And in African Sudan today, Dad definitely comes out second best. After bearing five children, a wife there may return to her parents, leaving Papa to look after the kiddies.

Ecuador, too, recognizes Dad's trials as a family man. There it is customary for an expectant mother to be put out of the house while her husband is coddled and humored until he recovers from the shock of becoming a father.

In the United States, statistics show that women own an ever-increasing portion of the national wealth, Dad's in danger of becoming the "forgotten man", many sociologists believe.

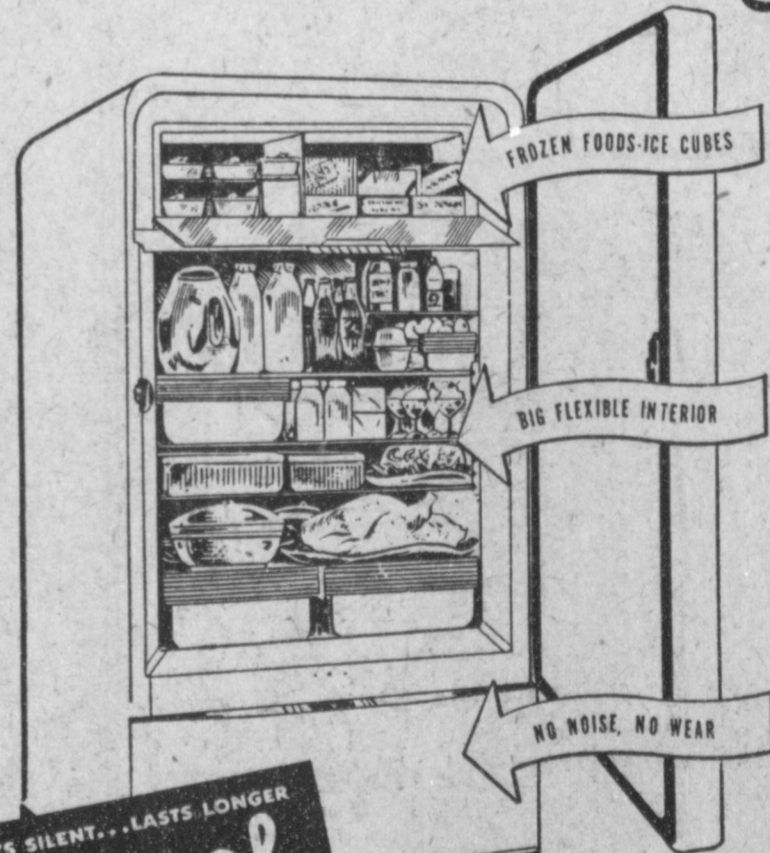

Watermelon Rind came into its own as high style in the little extras which make a meal something special when the preserve recipe was introduced and perfected. It seems strange there was a time when watermelon rind was thought as worthy of salvage as old shoe leather. Now the guest who bites into a crisp piece of watermelon preserve looks at his hostess with new respect and admiration. "Just the right touch to this fine meal," he is apt to pronounce.

That crisp texture is something to be prized. To obtain it, soak the rind two or three hours in lime water to cover. The lime water is prepared by adding one tablespoon of slaked lime (calcium oxide) to each quart of cold water. (If you prefer a texture more like that of preserved pears, soak the rind overnight in salt water—two tablespoons salt to each quart of water.)

These hints and the following recipe for Watermelon Rind Preserves are from the Ball Blue Book of home canning:

- 2 pounds watermelon rind
- 1 tablespoon ground ginger
- 4 cups sugar
- 2 lemons
- 2 quarts water.

Cut the white part of the rind into pieces of uniform size and shape. Soak in lime or salt water. Freshen in two or more changes of cold water. Sprinkle ginger over rind. Cover with water and boil 1 1/2 hours. Drain and drop into cool sirup made with the sugar, two quarts of water, and juice of one lemon. Boil gently one hour. Add the second lemon, sliced thin. Continue boiling until rind is tender and the sirup thick as honey. (If the sirup gets too thick before the rind is tender, add a cup or more of boiling water.) Let stand several hours. Pack into hot Ball Jars. Process 15 minutes at simmering.

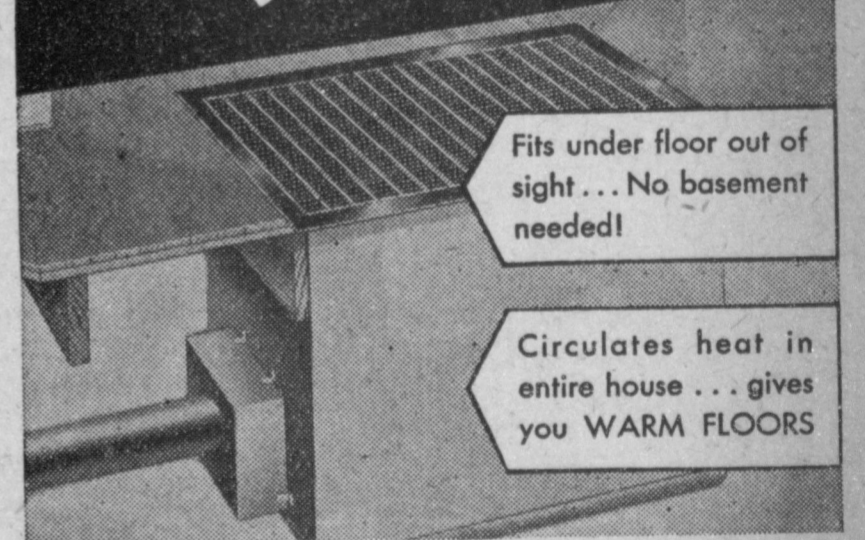

IF YOU SWEAT A LOT DURING THE SUMMER EAT A LOT OF SALT

AUSTIN, TEXAS.— There is little doubt that summer is here. If you don't think so, take a quick look at your thermometer or feel your shirt or blouse — chances are that it will be wet and salty with sweat.

Excessive sweating means the loss of body salt, and Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, advises the use of salt in drinking water as a means of avoiding heat cramps.

"Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat," says Dr. Cox. "On days when the thermometer goes to 90 degrees or above, as it has recently, the body may lose as much as fifty grams of salt. Laborers, farmers, and even white-collar workers should be especially watchful of heat cramps."

Heat cramps are characterized by pains in the stomach, headaches, and sometimes nausea and vomiting. The danger comes because the loss of the salt may occur without the knowledge of the individual until the deficiency causes cramps or heat fag.

Salt tablets may be purchased commercially. If they are not available, a pinch of table salt will serve the same purpose.

"Drinking milk is an excellent method of replacing body salt lost through perspiration," Dr. Cox says, "but alcoholic drinks should be avoided."

LAKE TEXOMA TO GET OLD TIME STEAMBOAT FOR EXCURSION TRIPS

LAKE TEXOMA.— There'll be a steamboat on the Lake. Within the next few weeks a 93-foot stern-wheel Mississippi River boat will be floating on Lake Texoma.

**SPRAYING WITH DDT
WILL CONTROL MOTHS
IN CLOTHES CLOSETS**

After cleaning the clothes closets, apply a DDT spray to the walls, woodwork, baseboards and shelves as a protection against clothes moths for the warm weather season, advises Mary Routh, clothing specialist of Texas A & M College. Approximately one-half pint DDT spray is necessary for an average size closet. An oil spray is preferred because it does not leave a white deposit as a water spray does.

The best DDT spray for this purpose is a residual spray, rather than one of the "aerosol bomb" or space spray type, if it is to be effective over a period of months in killing insects which come into contact with the closet surfaces. The aerosol spray is fine for killing flying insects, or

those which happen to be exposed at the time, but it does not have the lasting effect because it doesn't leave a residue.

DDT solutions may also be sprayed lightly on wool clothes without injuring the fabric. Too much of the solution, however, may show up in whitish traces on dark clothes, but these can be removed by brushing or dry cleaning.

DDT spraying is useful for protecting clothes hanging in closets, while the more familiar moth flakes or crystals are advised for clothes stored in tight bags, trunks or other containers where a fumigating effect is desired. Added protection may be given stored clothes by spraying them and their container with DDT.

ONLY 40 PER CENT OF TEXAS FIFTH GRADERS FINISH HIGH SCHOOL

Washington — Of every 1,000 pupils who reach the fifth grade in Texas, only 392 finish high school, the National Education Association has reported.

"Somewhere along the line the other 608 drop out of school from disinterest, discouragement, poor health, or early marriages," NEA researchers found.

Texas ranks among the middle one-third states in its "pupil-holding power," the report said. It gave 1946 enrollments as its source of figures.

In the United States as a whole, only 453 of each 1,000 who were enrolled as fifth-grade pupils are still in attendance in the final year of high school, the report said.
