IT'S A LONG SWEAT IF YOU INTEND TO SWEAT OUT LOWER CAR PRICES

Detroit — If you're waiting for lower retail prices before ordering a new automobile you probably won't get delivery this year. In fact, even at present prices you'll be lucky to get delivery in 1948.

The price trend still is very definitely upward. Kaiser-Frazier expects to hold to its present price schedules regardless of what model changes it may make. Elsewhere in the industry, however, additional increases are in prospect.

The first of these probably will come with formal introduction next month of the new 1949 Lincoln and Mercury models. These are the first of the new Ford lines to be redesigned. Some time in June the 1949 Fords will be brought out and with higher price tags.

Ford, spending close to \$100,000,000 for retooling, has made no secret of the fact prices will have to go higher.

Meanwhile, tool and die shops are busy on new manufacturing equipment for Ford competitors in all price classes. Some new models will go into production next September and October. Most industry sources believe the 1949 Chevrolets and Plymouths will not reach the assembly lines until near the year-end.

How much business these two competitors will lose to Ford's completely redesigned line is arousing considerable speculation in industry quarters. Some say that because all three of these largest volume producers have more orders than they can fill for more than a year, Ford will make no actual inroads on Chevrolet and Plymouth.

Ford will be out of production for from four to six weeks getting the new Ford model on the assembly lines and it will lose around two months' output before getting back into full stride. Certainly both Chevrolet and Plymouth will have new models out long before the "big three" can catch up with their backlog of unfilled orders.

So far this year Chevrolet has made approximately 190,000 passenger cars; Ford around 135,000 and Plymouth about 80,000. Their combined bank of unfilled orders is said to total close to 2,500,000, with new orders still accumulating faster than deliveries can be made.

ATTEND RELATIVE'S WEDDING IN VINITA, OKLAHOMA

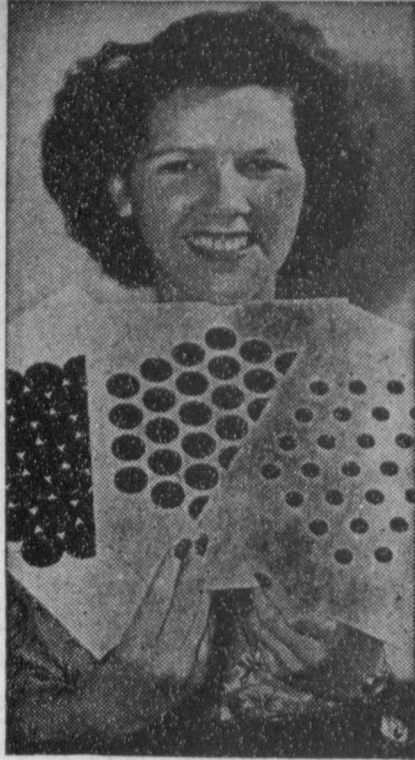

SINKING MIGHTY "T" AT STATE SHRINE IS BIG ENGINEERING JOB

San Jacinto Battleground, March 29. — They're going to sink the battleship Texas but there won't be a rush for the lifeboats.

A special Davey Jones locker is being prepared here that will hold the mighty T secure against time and tide and any possible threats of being lend-leased. It is a big engineering job that bears no resemblance to anything that has been done before in Texas.

Cyril S. Adams, the engineer supervising the task for the Battleship Texas Commission, explained how the permanent berth for the ship will be made up.

Lightened of all ballast the Texas will weigh 26,000 tons and have a draft of twenty-five feet. The berth will be dredged to that depth with a few inches to spare.

On high tide the Texas will be floated into position. Then every tank and available space will be pumped full of water to set her down hard on the bottom. This water would lower the Texas by four feet if she were on the high seas. Clay filling will be placed about the hull leaving a 4-foot depth of water to make it appear that the Texas is still floating.

After the dedication ceremonies April 21, a dike will be constructed between the Texas and the main ship channel. The engineers must avoid any possibility of the great ship ever slipping out into the main traffic line and becoming a menace to navigation.

"This," Adams said, "is no normal operation. We're working against time but with no unforeseen obstacles I think we'll make it."

Lloyd Gregory, Houston newspaper executive and chairman of the battleship commission, said the berthing of the Texas and

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSE CAREER RECOMMENDED TO GIRL GRADUATES

Austin, Texas — The State of Texas is planning to observe national "Public Health Nursing Week" April 11-17, as proclaimed by President Harry S. Truman. Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, urges high school graduates to consider public health nursing as a career.

"Public health nursing offers young women opportunities for lifetime careers which are highly useful and satisfactory. The demand for professional nurses now exceeds the supply in public health and other fields of work," Dr. Cox said. "Possibilities of travel, worthwhile service, income, and other features of the nursing profession compare very favorably with those open to women in other careers."

Education for nursing is available in 33 schools in Texas and enrollment is now under way for fall classes, which open about September 1. All schools still have vacancies. Applicants should be graduates of high school or have some college credit, with a record of good scholastic standing, be in good physical condition, and of high moral character. An interest in people and

their problems, also ability to work well with one's hands is necessary.

Details regarding nursing education can be secured from hospitals, physicians, nurses' organizations, and local health departments, as well as the Texas State Department of Health.

The American Way

THE SHAREHOLDER DOLLAR

All successful corporations have two payrolls: the first consists of wages to employees for work done or services rendered; the second consists of wages paid in the form of dividends to stockholders for the use of their money.

Wage payments to employees are up 106 per cent over the pre-war level. This, however, is not net gain. According to a recent study of the National Industrial Conference Board, in 1947 it took one dollar of the wage dollar to purchase what could have been bought for 66¢ in the period from 1935-1939. But these figures show that even though that dollar does not go nearly as far as it used to, the workers today receive more than enough additional dollars so as to actually increase their purchasing power. In other words, the worker today can buy more loaves of bread, more pounds of meat and more suits of clothes, etc., etc.

But what about the man or woman who is on the other payroll of the corporation? How is the stockholder faring in this period of rising prices? Have his or her wages kept pace with those on the corporation's other payroll?

And in considering the stockholder please bear in mind that stocks are owned not only by "Economic Royalists" but by millions of people in modest circumstances as well as by schools, colleges, hospitals and charitable institutions of all kinds.

Dividend payments have been increased by many companies but in the aggregate have barely kept pace with the increase in the cost of living since pre-war. On the other hand, total wage and salary payments for work done and services performed have increased much more than dividends; and as pointed out in a previous paragraph, average weekly earnings of workers stand

well ahead of the rise in the cost of living since pre-war.

Now, when you take a dollar to a store, the merchant makes no distinction between whether that dollar you present came out of your pay envelope, or was received by you as a dividend. For either dollar the store-keeper will give you exactly the same amount of merchandise of the same quality. In other words, a dividend dollar has no preference over a pay-envelope dollar.

So, why all the shouting in some quarters about corporate earnings and dividend disbursements having increased? Why should this not be the case? Is not the stockholder entitled to a reasonable raise of wages on his invested capital, without being labeled "profiteer"?

Please do not misunderstand me. This is not an attempt to "white-wash" every individual corporation. Admittedly, there have been some instances of price "gouging," resulting in abnormal and unreasonable profits. But statistics clearly demonstrate that this does not apply to corporations in the aggregate. For instance, the estimated total profit (after taxes) of all American corporations for 1947 was \$17 billions and this represented a margin of but 5½ per cent on a gross business aggregating around \$300 billion. That margin, any reasonable person will concede, is a reasonable, legitimate profit — most certainly it cannot be considered "profiteering."

In signing off, let me repeat: a shareholder dollar has not even one tiny little more purchasing power than a dollar emanating from any other source. This being the case, it is entitled to a raise in wages — a raise large enough to allow it to keep pace with rising living costs.

THE LOW DOWN FROM HICKORY GROVE

Are Corporations people — that is the subject I will expound on, in today's lecture — the topic needs airing.

Corporations have been more or less polite and gentlemanly-like and with a disposition to stay out of brawls and arguments. And talkative, political gents noting such a disposition, have made it open season on abuses. And some voters seeming to figure that silence means they are guilty, causes me to waltz out the corporation subject.

Corporations are made up of people who have saved up a few shekels and put 'em in a pot with some other folks and hoping to earn interest on their money by forming an outfit to drill an oil well, start an ice cream factory, build a sawmill, etc.

If you have an insurance policy — life or fire — and care to see your insurance company remain strong, you are the person to take the spellbinder and his harangue, with a grain of salt. Every policy depends for its backing upon the investments of the insurance company in the bonds and stocks of companies in all kinds of businesses.

Corporations are not a demon to eat us alive — they are you and me. But if you don't give a hoot about the safety of your insurance, then go ahead, cut loose and abuse the corporations, put 'em out of business, and maybe feel better — or worse.

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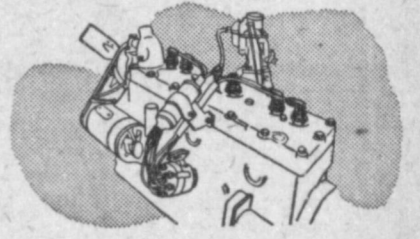

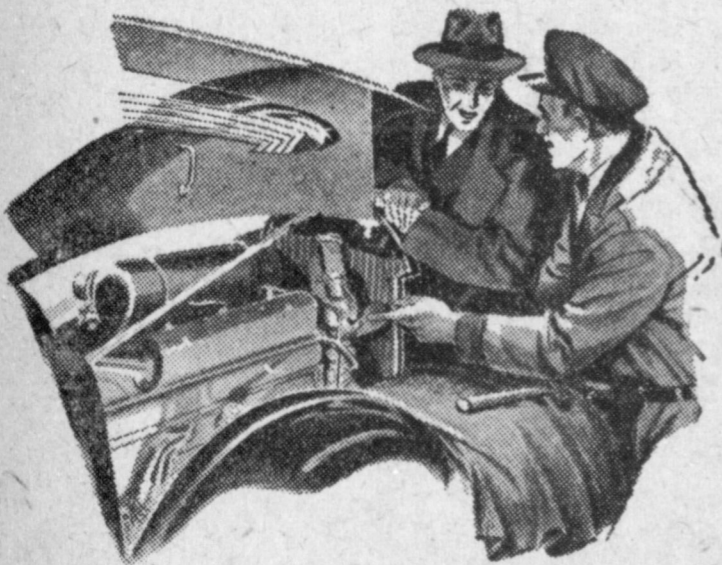

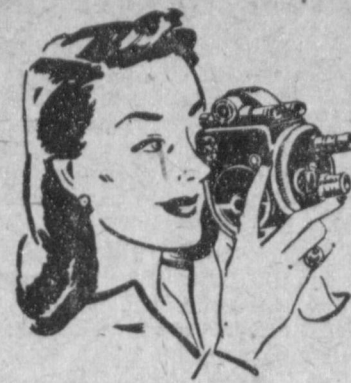

TEXAS POPULATION REACHES 7 MILLION MARK JULY 1, 1946

Washington — Texas' population had just about reached the 7-million mark by July 1, 1946, Bureau of the Census reported Sunday.

The number of potential voters in the state had increased 9.8 percent since April 1940.

By exact count, Texans numbered 6,961,023 at the last complete tally, and there were 4,240,881 persons over twenty-one years of age.

Civilian population under twenty-one grew very little in most parts of the county, but Texas, and a few other Southern States, reported gains in this category because of relatively high birth rates, the report showed.

The Census Bureau forecasts that by election day, Nov. 2, 1948, the population of the United States over twenty-one years of age will have risen to 94,641,000. This will represent a 13 percent increase in potential voters over 1940. Women of voting age will outnumber men by about 1,670,000, the report said.

NEW YORK, March 31. — All ants are not busy.

It depends entirely upon which ant you are watching, American Museum of Natural History scientists say. They're just returned from Panama and a five-month study of ant behavior there.

They report 40 per cent of the ants spend their time lolling about the nest all day, 40 per cent are good workers and the remainder work just occasionally.

Beginning Next Year, All Montana New Babies Will Be Given Serial Numbers

Helena, Mont. — Starting next January, Montana will assign a serial number to each baby born, and he'll have it the rest of his life.

The state registrar of vital statistics, L.L. Benepe, says all the states will put the plan into operation eventually.

That one number, he said, will be the person's number for social security, military registration, police identification, and all other identification purposes. It will be discarded when he dies.

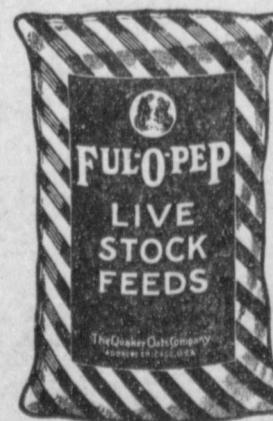
