



Grain Suffers But Other Crops Thrive During Rainy Week

Though harmful to a few fields of unthreshed grain, the 3.24 in-ches of rain that fell during the week end was generally beneficial to the community. The gains were far greater than the losses, according to prevailing opinions here.

Hanging on for almost a week the wet weather did the very thing that grain farmers dread. It sprouted grain in the shocks. As a result some of the grain is completely lost and the rest of it is seriously impaired by a low test.

The greatest losses were sustained in fields intended for seed wheat. Instead of commanding a premium those crops will now sell at considerably less than the regular price.

Other crops, however got a wonderful lift. "So far, so good" say, the corn raisers. This rain came just in time and in sufficient quantity to help both the early and late varieties. Ears just forming have a chance to fill completely with kernels and kernels already formed can develop perfectly. Continued favorable weather will give Muenster its best corn crop in many years.

Pastures and hay crops were similarly improved. Lush grazing s expected to pay off soon in higher milk and beef yields and alfalfa fields are well on their way for a heavy cutting.

The total rainfall from Wednesday of last week to Monday of this week measured 4.87 inches. Thursday morning at 8 the city's gauge showed 1.63 inches and subsequent readings were Monday, Saturday, 1.58; 1.53: Tuesday, .13. Falling slowly, practically all of it soaked in and hardly affected creeks and branches.
