As a result of the improvement all of the plant's condensed whey in the future is expected to meet specifications for human consumption. Heretofore most of it had to be processed into Kraco, a supplement for stock and poultry feeds.

The Kraco processing equipment will be retained here, however, to take care of the surplus in peak seasons.

Condensed whey now delivered to Denison is used in the and certain processed cheese. Be-Springfield, Mo. If Kraft's recent purchase of a war surplus factory at Garland receives final government approval, Muenster's total output of condensed whey will eventually be delivered there.

The new stainless steel unit doubles the whey condensing capacity at the cheese plant. Handling 40,000 pounds at a time it can condense the factory's entire whey output at peak production. Installation work, involving a complex system of valves, pumps, gauges, etc., was done by C. J. 

You and I know that this just can't be done.

Between now and next November 2 - Decision Day - we are going to listen to a barrage of campaign oratory, both from the public platform and over the radio. Some of us will even see and hear it by television. Great promises will be made and perhaps some of the candidates will sincerely believe that those promises can be fulfilled.

The thing for you and me to do is to weigh those promises carefully. Can they be carried out without bankrupting the nation? Respectfully, we should inquire, "Where is the money coming from to give all these marvelous things to the people?"

We must bear in mind this one important, inescapable fact no government is able to give anything to its people which it first does not take away from its people. And if government takes away from the thrifty and industrious to give to the wasteful and indolent, what happens? Initiative is stifled or completely destroyed, with abject poverty the end result for all.

Whether the candidate be running for President or Sheriff, my vote is going to the man or woman who promises economy in government and who unequivocally states he or she does not believe that government owes its people a living.

Yes sir, my vote is going to

\$5,000 a year. And - of equal importance the long-time trend has been to steadily raise the percentage earned by people of modest means.

And how does capitalism stack up against the other systems which are in operation throughout the world? The evidence in its favor is overwhelming. A wire basket allows for lots of air circulation around the eggs. It's about the best thing there is to collect eggs in. Pails, boxes or woven baskets keep the gathered eggs warm and the air out, so use a wire basket. And don't fill it all the way to the top.

A few degrees of heat makes a big difference, says Beanblossom. Freshly laid eggs held at 90 degrees lose as much quality in 20 hours as eggs held for three days at 70 degrees, or for 24 days at 50 degrees.

The best humidity for eggs is around 85 to 90 percent and a temperature of 32 to 60 degrees. The lower the temperature within these limits, the better the eggs zapfel Insurance Agency. will keep.


