About 250 persons attending the Gainesville Chamber of Commerce dinner last Thursday night got the low-down on communism straight from the shoulder as James M. Floyd sounded an emphatic warning that the red menace is known to be operating in North Texas and very likely is active in Cooke County.

He wasn't talking on theory but quoting facts based on his personal knowledge and official documents. He quoted the testimony of William Z. Foster, communist leader in this country, to the effect that when communism takes over our present form of government will cease to exist and we will be ruled by a dictatorship backed by the Red Army. He quoted a disillusioned young communist to the effect that entry in the party is subject to the denial of belief in God and a solemn oath to accept dictates of communist superiors and work for the overthrow of the government of the United States.

There was no mincing of words. Floyd proved beyond the shadow of a doubt that recent exposures or red activity are not just red herrings but authenticated cases in a nation-wide conspiracy to turn this country over to Jo Stalin and his gang of unscrupulous cutthroats.

Furthermore he proved that the cancerous menace to American democracy is by no means confined to the more turbulent areas of the north and east. Stating that it is also happening in Texas, he produced evidence of communist activity in Fort Worth, the Cooke County Electric Co-op-Dallas and Austin.

Floyd's remarks were specially significant coming the day after communist leaders in at least six nations asserted simultaneously that in case of war they would support Soviet Russia rather than their own countries.

Sod Outlets Before Terrace Construction

Gullying, excess terrace grade, and damage to roads, fences and other farm improvements usually results where terrace outlets are not protected with sod. Sodding with Bermuda grass is the most economical method of protecting terrace outlets. The area to be sodded and used for outletting terrace water should be located by running trial terrace lines. After the outlet has been located, follow the steps listed below in establishing permanent terrace outlets.

Twelve to eighteen months are usually required for growth and spread of grass before the field is terraced. Where Bermuda grass roots are hard to harvest contact members of your Soil Conservation Board of Supervisors for the name and location of sandy land farmers who will furnish Bermuda grass roots at a reasonable cost.






STEP 1. PREPARE LAND FOR SODDING BY BEDDING AND RE-BEDDING. Good land preparation is as necessary for successful growth of Bermuda grass as for other crops.





STEP 3. PLANT FRESHLY HARVESTED BERMUDA GRASS ROOTS in moist soil at 18 to 24 inch intervals and cover immediately by rebedding. Sodding may be done at any time of year when moisture is available. A sodded outlet is the foundation of a successful terrace system.



STEP 4. READY FOR TERRACE CONSTRUCTION. An excellent cover of Bermuda grass is usually present by the fall of the second year and ready to be used as a terrace outlet. Narrow outlets usually cause gullying, therefore the outlet area should be from 100 to 300 feet wide to provide ample space for spreading of water.

STEP 2. HARVEST BERMUDA GRASS ROOTS by plowing and following with a spring-tooth harrow, side-delivery rake, tiller tool, or other similar equipment which can be used for raking roots into piles or windrows. Roots should be kept damp until planted.



AUSTIN .- Contrary to the popular belief that pyorrhea is always incurable, this is only true in tht most advanced cases, according to Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. His advice to persons who even suspect the presence of pyorrhea is to seek an early diagnosis from their dentist so that proper treatment can be instituted while the disease s still curable.

"Early detection and proper treatment of pyorrhea represent the formula for a successful cure. This means that the dentist must have an opportunity to discover the presence of the disease at the earliest possible moment. Since the symptoms are often so vague that the patient is unaware of having pyorrhea," Dr. Cox said, "regular visits to the family dentist are extremely im-portant in the control of this disease.

The treatment of pyorrhea is not an involved procedure. In the average early case one of


