

If they meet physical and mental standards and pass an aptitude test they may attend, at Navy expense, one of 52 colleges and universities in which there are Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps Units. The University of Texas and Rice Institute are the Texas schools with NROTC units

Applications for aptitude tests should be made before November 15. Principals of high schools, college deans and Naval recruiting stations will advise students on how to apply. Aptitude tests will be given December 11 in 21 Texas cities.

Successful applicants will be permitted to take any college course they desire but must include certain naval subjects. Before you consider that statement a wild exaggeration of a cynical pessimist, let me point out that we have been developing a new factor which, if not handled wisely, will contribute largely to the depth and length of the next depression. This new factor is the large growth in union membership during recent years and the great increase in wages obtained by that membership.

When the prevailing, unprecedented demand for consumer goods begins to slacken, producers may be stymied in their efforts to encourage buying through reduced prices, by the opposition of well organized unions to go along in the price reduction by taking a commensurate reduction in wages.

Business executives and the nation's leading economists are keenly aware of this great danger which can lead to vast unemployment. How can prices be reduced to meet the depression emergency if the cost of labor, the greatest factor of production costs, cannot be reduced? Failure of the unions to acquiesce in lowering wages will mean that many industries will be forced to suspend or greatly curtail operations, throwing millions out of work. We have not yet arrived at the point in this nation where government can force industry to perate at a loss.

During the past few months have looked in vain for a statement by any one of our topranking labor leaders that union labor also is conscious of this threat to the future well-being of union workers, themselves. 'Twill be a hollow victory for workers, if having obtained the right to higher wages, they find themselves priced out of their jobs. Such a condition would be comparable to that which existed in the final period of wartime price controls. Remember? The price controls succeeded in keeping prices down, but few items could be purchased, unless one resorted to the black mar-

Union labor leaders now have an opportunity to demonstrate that they are real statesmen, that they are sincerely concerned about the welfare of their constituents. If they are wise they can do much to prevent a recession in prices developing into depression chaos and vast unemployment.

If they will indicate their willingness to have labor accept lower wages when the cost of living declines, as freely as they fought for higher wages when the cost of living advanced; and will insist that their members once again give an honest day's work for a fair day's pay, this nation can weather the storm of depression without too great hardship.

Accepting lower wages, would not result in any drop in the workers' real purchasing power and a falling-off of their stan-dard of living. And, as statistics show, labor's rate of production and the quality of the work produced have fallen off seriously in recent years.

Labor leaders know or should

prospective purchaser, doesn't buy. The same thing applies to the sale of labor. If the worker's wage is priced beyond the ability of the employer to pay without involving loss, the employer just doesn't buy that worker's services and skill. In view of this, labor's leadership must see to it that labor's gains are not converted into losses by pricing workers out of their jobs.




