



With the help of Myra our district can go far in its improvement program. But if Myra should choose to continue its independent status Muenster will lose a big and important potential.

Hemmed in as it is, with little or no prospect of adding more districts, Myra has no possible chance of acquiring the attendance to qualify for first class rating.



### Garden Club Sponsors Entry For Montague Grape Festival Queen


