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Well, it's all over now, including most of the shouting. President Harry Truman has just put over a stupendous victory that is likely to hold the record long into the future as the greatest political upset in American history.

He accomplished the unbelievable and he did it almost single handed. He fought the opposition of his own party members who tried to brush him off at the national convention. He fought against a discouraging lack of enthusiasm among party leaders who had all but conceded his defeat and openly admitted that their principal hope was to salvage control of the Senate. He fought against unfavorable poll reports. He fought gallantly against all kinds of odds and won the admiration of his country by doing it.

No doubt the increasing public admiration for his courage during the closing weeks of the campaign changed many votes, in his favor. And now that it's all over and his magnificent achievement becomes apparent many of those who opposed him are equally outspoken in their admiration. Regardless of principles and convictions along political lines, the average American is proud to have his kind of scrapping spirit in the White House.

While praising Truman for swinging the tide in his own favor, we cannot overlook the fact that other factors were involved in the contest. Tuesday's return amounts to a verdict that the American people like this country as it is and don't wish to take chances on another administration. They are enjoying an era of comfort and prosperity, so why make a change? They'd rather follow the Democratic advice of maintaining the status quo than heed the Republican warning that current policies will lead to trouble. The pleasant view is always more appealing.

Another factor worth considering is the big depression of the last Republican era. People remember that times were tough, and the memory is likely to haunt them until the Democrats have the misfortune of being caught in a similar mess.

In the last analysis the GOP simply failed to sell an idea. It proposed to take the good conditions we have and improve on them. But the voters were not convinced. They were afraid the change would be for the worse.

The extent to which our representatives, and those of other Western Nations as well, will go to get along with Russia sometimes makes us hang our heads in shame. The latest incident is yielding to the Soviet demand that reference to God be eliminated from the UN draft of the Declaration of Human Rights.

A Brazilian amendment to the first article carried the statement that all human beings "are created in the image and likeness of God". Russia's disciples of godlessness were not in favor of that passage. They protested and the Western representatives obligingly agreed to delete it.

Yes, our representatives apparently thought it better to snub the Almighty than to provoke the displeasure of Stalin and company. Either they don't have the courage to stand pat on their convictions or they're operating on a set of principles that is little better than the Russian brand. Whatever the reason it is unworthy of men who pretend to be defending Christian civilization.

This sort of thing has been going on ever since the beginning of the UN. Out of consideration to Russia the original delegates decided to dispense with the age old custom of seeking divine blessing at their meetings. They've ignored God ever since. And look what they've got! After four years of futile effort to lead the world out of its confusion they have a worse mess than they started with.

Isn't it about time that some of those fellows got wise to what's going on? Can't they realize that actually they are permitting Atheism to replace Christianity in the UN policy? There isn't any compromise on those issues, you know. Either the council must insist that there is a God from Whom human beings derive their rights or they must agree with the Reds that men have no rights except those granted by the state.

Several thousand years of history give ample proof that people have to observe God's standard of living in order to get along. UN delegates from Chris-

Hornets' 2 to 0 Win Avenges Former Loss To Xavier Warriors

Though they played the St. Xavier Warriors off their feet at Denison Wednesday night, the Hornets were victims of a goal line jinx that almost held them to a scoreless tie. The deciding mark was a safety in the closing seconds of the first quarter for the Hornets' 2 to 0 victory.

In the middle of the field Muenster's boys could not be stopped. Six times they slashed and drove within reach of pay dirt and every time they fouled up on the final push.

Along with their own tough luck they got a couple of good scares when the Warriors came equally close to crossing for the deciding touchdown.

Starting from his own 5 late in the third quarter Milligan broke into the open and appeared to be touchdown bound when Flesman took off in pursuit. Flesman gained slowly and the moments were tense while everyone wondered whether he would close the gap in time. He finally made a successful tackle on the 17 and saved the game for his teammates.

In the closing minutes the Warriors threatened again with their only real offensive drive of the game. Taking over on downs on their own 5 they headed upfield with three successive first downs. They were still going strong when the clock stopped them in midfield.

The Hornets started with a bang. Taking the opening kick they clicked off 4 successive first downs to the 22, then went haywire and lost on downs on the 27.

Two plays later Emmett Walterscheid intercepted and ran back to the 17. Another first down to the 6 was followed by 4 unsuccessful attempts ending on the 5.

The Warriors' attempted kick out of danger then netted the only score of the game. Julian Walterscheid broke through to block the punt and a Warrior covered the ball behind his goal line.

The balance of the game was mostly a repetition of the first quarter. Muenster was strong everywhere except near the pay-off line with Vogel, Flesman and Walterscheid sparking the drives. They lost on downs on the 12, lost on an interception on the 15, and lost twice more on downs on the 5.

First downs stacked up 13 to 5 in favor of the Hornets and the passing record was about even. St. Xavier had one completion and one interception out of 5 attempts, the Hornets two completions and one interception out of 7. The game ends the score for the two teams this season. Their clash here on Oct. 1 had resulted in a 19 to 13 win for the Warriors.

Knabe and Fisher Entries Top Production Record of County Dairy Association

A Jersey cow named "Blank", a member of John Knabe's herd, had the highest average production of any cow in Cooke county during the month of September, according to a survey conducted by the Dairy Herders' Improvement Association.

The Jersey produced a total of 876 pounds of milk during the month, averaging 5.5 per cent butterfat, or a total of 48.1 pounds of butterfat.

Mr. Knabe milks 34 cows, mostly Jerseys, and had cows which produced more than 40 pounds of butterfat each. This gave the Knabe herd the high herd average of 28.7 pounds of butterfat per cow during September.

Paul Fisher had the highest herd average among the herds of 3 to 15 cows with 25.8 pounds of butterfat per cow. The second highest individual cow was Holstein No. 9 owned by Peter Prescher. The Holstein produced 1,050 pounds of milk and 47.2 of butterfat during the month.

Dallas Contractor Gets Job for Local Farm to Market Road

Another step toward the realization of that long awaited street and road paving job in this community was completed last week when the state highway department designated Cooper and Woodruff of Dallas as the contractor. The information released in an official statement by the highway department on October 28 gives the contract figure as \$51,160.

The road is designated as Farm Highway 373, and the work specified consists of "grading, drainage structures, flexible base and double asphalt surface treatment from Muenster to 5.2 miles north."

According to information previously given here by J. M. Isbell, district highway engineer, the work will begin at Highway 82 and include a curb to curb pavement for the Main Street of Muenster... provided the city will qualify by completing its curb line for the full length of the street.

Preliminary grading work on the project is expected to begin in the near future but the work will not be completed until some time next summer when weather is suitable for applying the asphalt surface.

Another Cooke county project placed under contract is a short section of Highway 77 in Gainesville. It consists of .69 mile of grading, drainage structure and railroad underpass at a contracted price of \$161,614, the work to be done by the McDonald Construction Company of Dallas.

These two Cooke County jobs were included in a total of 33 highway construction and maintenance projects placed under contract by the highway department for a total cost of \$5,707,213.

The Marysville community is losing one of its early landmarks with the removal of its general store building. L. T. Henderson, who managed the store for more than 50 years, sold the building and the new owner is moving it from the community.

Mr. Henderson has retired from business but he and his wife will continue living at Marysville.

Muenster Voters Favor the Losers in Tuesday's Election

This community voted with the losers in the two hottest contests of last Tuesday's general election. Its substantial Republican majority for both the presidential and the senatorial races was smothered in the state's landslide for the Democratic nominees.

The final tally of the two Muenster boxes for those contests gave Dewey a 311 to 204 lead over Truman and Porter a 375 to 148 lead over Johnson.

Sweeping majorities for the Democrats in state offices indicate that an unprecedented percentage of Muenster voters cast a split ballot. Republican candidates for state offices drew an average of about 110 votes indicating that approximately 200 persons split to favor Dewey and Warren and approximately 260 split to favor Porter.

The only local contest on the ticket was that between Andy Harrison and Matt Schmitz for constable of Precinct 8. Harrison in the Democratic column won 340 to 92. Ben Seyler received a solitary write-in vote for the position of Justice of the Peace, Precinct 8. Because no other candidate appeared on the ballot and no others were written in, he became a one-vote winner.

Approximately 75 per cent of the community's qualified voters turned out for the election. The North Muenster box polled a total of 422, the South Muenster box a total of 137. According to the list submitted by the county tax office there are 498 poll taxes and exemptions filed for the north box and 162 in the south box. The number of over-age exemptions is estimated at 60 to 70.

VOLLEY GIRLS BREAK EVEN IN GAMES WITH 2 GAINESVILLE TEAMS

Volleyball girls of the Muenster Independent School broke even in a three team junior round-robin match at the Gainesville Hi gymnasium last Wednesday night.

Teams represented were Muenster Hi, Gainesville Hi and Gainesville Junior College, the latter drawing the bye to take on the winner of the first match.

After winning two out of three games by scores of 3-15, 15-4 and 15-7 over Gainesville Hi, Muenster lost 15-2 and 15-12 to the junior college team.

A return game with the Gainesville Hi girls will be played here next Wednesday, Nov. 10, at 1 o'clock.

**Rampaging Hornets
Trample Alvord Hi
Bulldogs 37 to 7**

Muenster's Hornets went on a scoring spree Thursday night to roll up a 37 to 7 victory over the Alvord Bulldogs.

Taking over at the starting whistle they opened a relentless attack that netted four touchdowns before the first half ended.

The second half was more evenly matched but still favored the Hornets. Coach Hennigan turned much of the period over to his youngsters, and Alvord took advantage of the weakened competition to score its only touchdown and mark up 8 of its 9 first downs. Meanwhile Muenster added two more touchdowns and completed 10 more first downs.

For the first time this season the Hornets turned in an impressive passing record. They completed 8 out of 10 attempts for an average of 16 yards, two being to Mollenkopf for touchdowns. Alvord's aerial game was a sad failure. Its 9 attempts resulted in 4 interceptions and only one completion.

The Hornets started their scoring drive the first time they got possession of the ball. Holding the visitors for downs they took the kick and began the 75 yard march from their 25. Five series of downs featured by Vogel's consistent long gains reached the 5 from where Yosten went

over the goal. Vogel's kick added a point.

The second touchdown was exactly two plays later. Alvord received and the ball went into play on the 18. Then Fleshman intercepted a pass on the 25 and dashed for pay dirt.

As the second quarter opened the Hornets received a kick on their 25 and started another scoring drive. Vogel, Fleshman and Emmett Walterscheid did the heavy toting and Walterscheid made the pay-off dash from the 17.

An interception by Vogel on the 47 following the kickoff opened another march. A pass and three runs reached the 11 and Damien Hellman circled left end from there for the 6-pointer.

Three touchdowns in the third quarter completed the game's scoring. As the period opened Muenster ran the kickoff back to the 45, lost on a fumble, then started from the 20 after taking Alvord's kick. Three successive first downs reached the 31 from where Fleshman passed to Mollenkopf for the touchdown.

Then the Bulldogs showed their first real drive of the game. They covered a feeble kickoff on the 47 and promptly marched to the goal line. The kick for extra point was good.

The Hornets retaliated by returning the next kickoff to their 37 and starting another march down the field. A short gain, then Emmett Walterscheid's 15 reached the Alvord 35. Two successive short passes, Yosten to Pels over center, got to the 11. Two line plays added 6 and Herr's heave to Mollenkopf in the end zone was good for the final touchdown.

The fourth quarter was mostly a see-saw with Alvord leading in gains but losing their benefit through interceptions by Rohmer and Julian Walterscheid.

POOR REFRIGERATION CAUSES 12,526 CASES OF FOOD POISONING

AUSTIN.— From statistics compiled by the State Health Department, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer has disclosed that a lack of proper refrigeration contributes materially to the total disease outbreaks for one year, caused from foods other than milk and milk products.

During the year, there were 299 outbreaks of disease from contaminated foods, incapacitating 12,526 persons, 17 of whom died.

"The food poisoning was usually caused from contamination through insanitary conditions, infections of food, handlers, or of even more significance, lack of early and adequate refrigeration," Dr. Cox said. "Even when contaminated, foods will seldom develop toxins sufficient to cause poisoning if properly refrigerated promptly after preparation. Outbreaks caused from foods have totaled nearly six times the number caused from water of milk."

The State Health Officer pointed out that the consuming public is, in many areas, protected by proper enforcement of sanitation standards for eating establishments such as are set up in the United States Public Health Service Milk Ordinance and Code. The public is entitled to a good clean, safe and wholesome food supply, including milk which has been produced under strict sanitary conditions and properly refrigerated. This is a great protection against disease outbreaks caused by contaminated foods of various kinds, and Dr. Cox said this was especially obvious in view of the fact that no disease outbreak has as yet been traced to pasteurized grade A milk, which had been adequately refrigerated.

SURVEY DISCLOSES THAT GLARE IS NO. 1 FOE OF CAR DRIVERS

SAN FRANCISCO.— Glare is the No. 1 enemy of millions of motorists who drive at night, according to a nation-wide survey of the American Automobile Association.

It characterized the existing situation in regard to automobile headlights as a 'serious factor against safety, courtesy and law.'

The survey showed that one-third of drivers at night either forget or refuse to dim their headlights for approaching cars.

Other findings revealed that automobile headlights, long inadequate, have not nearly kept pace in safety and efficiency with other automobile improvements. Hazards of night driving have been increased greatly by the large number of cars with lights incorrectly adjusted or focused, or with one or more blacked out.

A RIDDLE SOLVED

For quite some time something has puzzled me. To a degree I can understand the poor fellow who has nothing and no prospects of ever getting anything being willing to share his adversity by falling for the "everybody-share-and-share-alike" promises of Communism, or its twin-brother, Socialism. I can

see how such a fellow figures he has everything to gain and nothing to lose; how his mouth waters at the prospect of getting something from others, while he has nothing to give in return.

But, the American citizen who has a job, some money in the saving bank, equity in life insurance, perhaps even some of his savings invested in corporate stocks and bonds, astounds me when he swallows the bunkum peddled by the salesmen of the Soviet Union. How can this possibly be?

Well, one of the readers of my column seems to have arrived at the answer to this paradox, and has written me expressing his views. His comment is as follows:

"Your release, 'Do We Want a Dictatorship?', raised a question why totalitarianism is so popular when the Free Enterprise System has been so successful in this country and totalitarianism has proved a dismal failure in so many places well within the memory of living people. It seems to me unfortunate that your article did not give the answer to that question.

"It not the real answer the peculiarity of human nature? Because of the tendency for all people to attribute their failures to someone other than themselves, is it very easy to sell them the idea that their failures are due to our economic system. Under the Free Enterprise System, there must be millions of failures occurring every day, and hundreds of millions that have taken place within the memories of individuals. Every new business that is started, every private undertaking by an individual, every man who seeks and secures a job is making a venture under the Free Private Enterprise System.

"If a man finds his job unsatisfactory and quits it, or if he is laid off for lack of work, or if he is fired for cause — any of those events is a failure of his undertaking and he is very prone to attribute it to something other than his own failure, or a failure on the part of another individual. He will readily listen to the glib talker who assures him that the trouble in every case is with our economic system; and that if the Government supplied all the jobs and ran all businesses, he could not fail.

"Of all the hundreds of millions of people who have at some time in their lives suffered one of these economic failures, by far the greater number of them must have LATER succeeded. All the people who are out of work in a spell of hard times get some job back before they die. They remember their failures, their being let out, but they do not remember their successes in getting other jobs."

My correspondent friend has, I believe, solved the riddle of why people fall into the error of blaming "The American Way" for their failures. But what is

the solution? What can be done to show these "disgruntleds" the error and danger of their thinking?

It seems to me that the solution lies in constantly pointing out to them that for every failure under our Free Enterprise System, there are dozens and dozens of successes; that the exact opposite applies in totalitarian countries where failures greatly outnumber the successes. "The American Way" is the best system that has yet been devised for the welfare of mankind. But, bearing in mind that "Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty", we must ever be on guard. And to be on guard means, over and over again, with patience and fortitude, calmly and dispassionately, to enumerate the virtues of "The American Way" to all and sundry who unthinkingly would cast it aside for some lesser system.

Doing a Big Job

"The public has a false impression of the place and importance of the railroads in the movement of goods from point of production to point of use," according to the Chicago Daily Drivers Journal. "The fact of the matter is that the railroads still haul seven-tenths of the total freight moved in this country, the remaining three-tenths being handled by all other forms of transportation — motortrucks, pipelines, waterways and air carriers. That is an impressive fact. The business of this country couldn't function without rail service, and it is vital to the welfare of that business that rail service be adequate and efficient."
