

Gulley Washer Skips Muenster; Rain Here Is 2.21 Inch Soaker

Heavy downpours that did extensive damage in other sections of North Texas during the weekend simmered down to a plain good rain at Muenster. The total rainfall spread out over a four day period was 2.21 inches according to the official measure on Steve Moster's rain gauge.

Recordings at 7 a.m. the past four days are as follows: Sunday .41, Monday .62, Tuesday .94, Wednesday .24. In each case the rain had fallen during the previous 24 hours.

The rain each day likewise was well scattered. There were a few havy downpours lasting a short time but in general the showers were scattered and slow with ample time to soak into the soil. Very little of the water ran off the land.

Tornado Sunday Afternoon Flood Control Plan Includes Reservoirs For Muenster Area

Prospects of important developments in soil conservation and flood control in Cooke County were presented to members of the Cooke County Agricultural Club in the Gainesville Community Center Building Monday night.

Robert Tharp, educational director of the Trinity Improvement Association, as guest speaker at gram which is intended to conentire 12 million acres compris-

The program has two principal objectives. The first is to keep topsoil where it belongs thereby preserving land productivity and eliminating it from urban reservoirs. The second is to control water flow in order to prevent disastrous floods all over the watershed.

One phase of that program is the construction of six detension reservoirs in the Upper Elm-Red soil conservation district. In all some 25 such detension reservoirs are to be built in the upper 8 million acres of the watershed out of a 2 million dollar appropriation now pending in Congress.

Tharp explained the association's flood control theory as follows. By means of soil conservation practices surplus water is under control from its very start. Water retarded on the field carries less dirt and reaches streams more slowly. Small, pond-size reservoirs in gulleys and ditches will further retard the water's flow to creeks. The six detension reservoirs in strategic places on creeks of this area will retard the flow of water to the river tributaries, and large reservoirs, Benbrook, Grapevine and Lake Dallas will retard flow into (Continued on Page 10)



Texas Veterans Free To Select **Privately Owned Land Tract** For Farm or Ranch Home

By BASCOM GILES Commissioner of the General Land Office (Editor's Note: Second of a series of articles on the Veterans' Land

The recently enacted legislation implementing the Texas Veterans' Land Board will be the means of making the dream of thousands of Texas Veterans for a farm or ranch home of their very owa,

One of the most attractive features of this bill is that section which permits a veteran to personally select a tract of land suitable for agriculture or grazing held under private ownership in any sector of the State. It might be owned by kinsmen or by a corpora-tion—it matters not to the Board.

-What will matter to the Board

will be that the veteran feels reasonably sure that it will serve his purpose and needs; that it must have at least half of the mineral rights unencumbered and that the land is worth the asking price.

Operation of this part of the veteran purchase plan will elimin-ate the necessity for migration of veterans from one part of the State to another as a majority of the purchasers will select land ad-jacent to their homes where they are already familiar with produc-tion conditions. This factor will serve to lessen chances of failure.

Under the provisions of this section a veteran may purchase a tract of land up to \$10,000.00 but he will be required to tender the difference above the \$7,500.00 state finance maximum.

Another provision of the bill, sponsored by Senator John Bell and Representative Reuben Senterfitt, permits a veteran to pur-chase a tract of land owned by the State when such tracts are offered through duly advertised sales. The purchase will be made through sealed competitive bids with the award going to the highest bidder. To make the contract valid the minimum five nervent days the contract of the purchase of of minimum five per cent down pay ment will accompany the bid. Proper application forms will be furnished by the Board on request. After the veteran has made his selection his next step will be to furnish the Board with a complete abstract and description of the property so that it may be appraised. At the same time he files his application with the Board, he will pay to the Board his initial down payment of NOT less than the selection ment will accompany the bid. Proper application forms will be furnished by the Board on request. Each veteran will be limited to one purchase. However, he will NOT be limited as to the maximum amount of land he may be able to purchase under the full loan of \$7,500.00. purchase under the full loan of \$7,500.00.

The term "state owned land" does NOT include Public School

the applicant will be required to execute an on or before note for forty years at three per cent interest for the balance. After receiving his contract of sale he will be non-disabled veterans applications will be held in abeyance.

I fear the unplanned spraying program is similar to the application of perfume or toilet water to overcome B.O. or the application of powder to cover dirt."

Giles Explains Operation of New Veterans' Land Program

By BASCOM GILES Commissioner of the General Land Office

The Veterans land program is

now a reality.

The idea was born in the hearts of the veterans themselves while Land n they were overseas and thinking about home. Their letters to my office asking how they might obtain a farm or ranch home if and when they returned, inspired me to put the machinery of this program

Last week Governor Jester's signature made the Veteran's Land bill into formal law. The bill was sponsored in the upper House by Senator John Bell of Cuero and in the lower House by Representative Reuben Senterfitt of San Saba. The legislation grew out of a Constitutional Amendment adopted

by the Citizens of Texas in a spe-cial election in November of 1946. At the following session of the Legislature the necessary enabling legislation failed to receive final consideration in the Senate.

The 51st Legislature, promptly

and without a single negative vote in either House carried out the mandate of the people, making it possible for Texas Veterans of World War II to own a farm or ranch home of their own choosing by making a small down payment with the balance financed by the State at a low interest rate.

The Legislature has placed the administration of this program in the hands of the Governor, Attorney General and the Commissioner of the General Land Office.

All applications should be addressed to Bascom Giles, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Austin, Texas.

Here briefly are some of the outstanding provisions of the new

law:
The Board may issue up to \$25 million in bonds to finance the

Land may be purchased from an individual, from the State, or Corporations for re-sale to veterans at st. (This provision will be more fully explained in a separate article—Editor's Note.)

Veteran may select land which he desires to purchase subject to the approval of the Board.

The maximum purchase by each veteran shall not exceed \$7,500 to Veterans disabled by combat

service connected disability have 90 days preference right to purchase. Lands may be purchased for a minimum of 5% down payment with 40 years to pay the balance at 3% interest. (This indebtedness may be retired sooner if the veteran wishes.)

All money received during the six remaining years of operation shall be used to pay interest on bonds and to purchase additional land for re-sale to veteran. The purchaser shall not transfer or sell lands purchased for a period of 3 years from the date of purchase. The veteran will not be permitted to make more than one purchase. The veteran is not required to re-
