

Of all the work in manufacturing goods, 85% is done by tools and mechanical power, 10% is done by animal muscle power and 5% by human muscle power. It is because man harnessed'animals and mechanical power to do his work for him that his standard of living has risen so enormously since the days of the cave-man. For the animal man, with his own muscles, has a productive power of only one-tenth of a horse power, but man using machines and tools with mechanical power, has a productive capacity of about six horse-power, sixty times as much as his primitive ancestor.

That is why it is possible for so many more millions of people to live on this earth and for all of them to have so much more than did the primitive man.

But the most fortunate people of them all live in the United should - but he don't. States, where there, are more tools and machines per worker than anywhere else on earth. Here the average worker can buy power and tools are the reason. We do just as much work in producing the goods, but it is done more by tools and mechanical power and less by human muscle power.

There is another kind of work than the work in using the tools and machines that take the place of muscle in doing the physical work. That is the work of management, working with the brain you, if you can figure it out, instead of with the muscles.

Someone must conceive what needs to be made, how to do it, select the people and machines, combine them properly, guide and supervise their efforts. 
