

An Agriculture Department report on crop conditions as of August 1 seems to indicate that the old reliable economic force known as supply and demand is going to accomplish the free and easy way what President Truman proposed to accomplish by expensive and meddlesome re-

gulation. Official estimates place the corn crop at 3.5 billion bushels, a neat increase over the 1946 record crop of 3.25 billion and a

tremendous increase over last year's 2.4 billion bushels. The report on wheat is almost as good: 128 billion bushels, just short of last year's record crop

of 1.36 billion bushels and very comfortably over the ten year average of .94 billion bushels. To complete this picture of abundance we have more reports

indicating record or near record yields in soya beans, rice, oats. sorghums, peanuts, pecans, citrus and several other crops.

It doesn't take the seventh son of a seventh son to figure out what all this can do for food prices. Flour, cornmeal, rice, grapefruit and lots of other staple groceries should come down. The same is true of feeds, which dairy products.

FANS SEE PLENTY OF SLUGGING AND SCORING IN SOFTBALL SERIES



In the last analysis it was not the removal of price control but the shortage, some of it created by the government itself, which sent prices zooming upward. Scarcity causes higher prices, on the open market or on the black market.

The system of government loans on crops, which actually amounts to a high price guarantee, likewise had its effect in keeping prices up. In fact there's something inconsistent when the president tells farmers about his efforts to hold up their price level, then turns around and blames others for the rise in food prices.

All of which goes to show that the law of supply and demand is bigger than any nation's artificial control. Give the American system of free enterprise a chance to produce and distribute and we'll have more abundance more equitably spread out than we could ever hope for in bureaucratic methods.

"We have reason for pride in our reduced infant and maternal mortality when it is realized that the reduction means in excess of 5000 babies are being saved annually which would have other wise died," Dr. Cox said. "In addition, the birth rate is higher 71,000."

The comparison between the live births figures for 1940 and 1947, shows white births up 22,-707; Latn American births up 7,186; and Negro births up 3,297. The report also shows maternal/ mortality has been reduced over 65 per cent. In 1940, the rate was 4.6 for every 1000 live births as compared to 1.6 for 1947.





A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide for a Board for apportioning the state into senatorial dis-tricts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportionment; providing for the issuance of the necessary proclamation by the Gov-ernor; and making an appropriation. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLA-TURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 28 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as fol-lows:

Section 28. The Legislature shall, at its "Section 28. The Legislature shall, at its first regular session after the publication of each United States decennial census, apportion the state into senatorial and repof each United States decennial census, apportion the state into senatorial and rep-resentative districts, agreeable to the pro-visions of Sections 25, 25, and 26-a of this Article. In the event the Legislature shall at any such first regular session following the publication of a United States decen-nial census, fail to make such apportion-ment, same shall be done by the Legisla-tive Redistricting Board of Texas, which is hereby created, and shall be composed of five (5) members, as follows: The Lieu-tenant Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Attorney General, the Comptroller of Public Accounts and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, a majority of whom shall constitute a quo-rum. Said Board shall assemble in the City of Austin within ninety (90) days after the final adjournment of such regular ses-sion. The Board shall, within sixty (60) days after assembling, apportion the state into senatorial or representative dis-tricts, as the failure of action of such Leg-islature may make necessary. Such appor-tionment shall be in writing and signed by slature may make necessary. Such app tionment shall be in writing and signed by three (3) or more of the members of the Board duly acknowledged as the act and deed of such Board, and, when so executed and filed with the Secretary of State, shall have force and effect of law. Such appor-tionment shall become effective at the next succeeding statewide general election. The Supreme Court of Texas shall have juris-diction to compute such Commission to rec-Supreme Court of Texas shall have juris-diction to compel such Commission to per-form its duties in accordance with the provisions of this section by writ of man-damus or other extraordinary writs 'con-formable to the usages of law. The Legis-lature shall provide necessary funds for clerical and technical aid and for other expenses incidental to the work of the Board, and the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representa-tives shall be entitled to receive per diem and travel expense during the Board's sesand travel expense during the Board's ses sion in the same manner and amount as they would receive while attending a spe-cial session of the Legislature. This amend-ment shall become effective January 1, 1951." ment shall become effective January 1, 1951." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1945, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "For the amendment to Section 28, Ar-ticle III of the Constitution of Texas pro-viding for a Board for apportionment of the state into senatorial districts and rep-resentative districts in the event the Leg-islature fails to make such apporthonment. "Against the amendment to Section 23, Article III of the Constitution of Texas providing for a Board for apporthonment of the state into senatorial districts and representative districts in the event the Legislature fails to make such apportion-ment." Each voter at such election shall mark ment." Each voter at such election shall mark out one of such clauses on the ballot, leav-ing the clause expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. Sec. 3. The Governnor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclama-tion for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Con-stitution and laws of this state. Sec. 4. The sum of Ten Thousand (\$10,-000.00) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the treasury of this state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.



When does a man stop being an EMPLOYEE and start being a **COMPETITOR?**

It's puzzling. These three men worked as projectionists for the State and Plaza Theatres. They were not discharged; they simply walked out.

After they started a picket line at the State and Plaza Theatres, they began regular work for competing Gainesville theatres. They are working there now, using paid pickets while on duty.

Our so-called "employees" claim there is a labor dispute with us. Yet the Texas labor laws define a "labor dispute" as a "controversy between an employer and the majority of his EMPLOYEES . . ."

(Do these three men expect you to believe they'll quit their present employment if they succeed in their demands?) Is it fair for them to work for a competitor, urge our patrons to go to other theatres, and picket us?

Whose employees are they? Who is being unfair?

that we have an anti-union attitude. These charges are not based on facts.

These three men entered a local union a year ago. They were working for us then. We made no attempt to discourage them, nor did we make the slightest objection to the exercise of their inherent right to become organized. We conferred with them both individually and as a union group. If that is not recognizing their union, why wasn't such a charge made a year ago?

The anti-union accusation was obviously a bid for support by Gainesville labor. If it were true, the picket line would merit that support.

But, only a little investigation would have disclosed that the State and Plaza theatres are Griffith-operated; that Griffith theatres in a number of towns have union operators, and that there is complete labor harmony in those theatres. We believe in the American Way of permitting our employees to decide for themselves whether or not they want a union.


