Sudden Death Claims 'Cleve' Henderson While on Trap Line

The body of Charles Cleveland (Cleve) Henderson, well known Cooke County wolf trapper and farmer, was found about 7:30 a. m. Tuesday in a field on the Danglmayr ranch between Muenster and Marysville.

According to his wife, Mr. Henderson left home Monday morning to set some wolf traps. He was due back home by noon, but when, night came the family, had not seen or heard of him. A searching party was formed and a call was sent in to the Gainesville police for aid.

Deputy Sheriffs Archie Nichols and A. E. Cogburn went out to join the search for Mr. Henderson. Justice of the Peace G. C Powell accompanied the deputies. Henderson's body was Mr. found by one of his sons in a field about 200 yards from his parked car. He had a gunny sack full of bait and traps still clutched in his hand and a half smoked cigar was lying on the ground

That was last year, but now as Congress digs into the new budget, this program has vanished into thin air. Originally, the 5-year program called for 70 air groups by 1953. Under the new proposals this is to be cut to 48 groups. After spending a full year arranging the business of airpower for the next five years, aiming at a safe, sure goal, our Air Force now learns



A two or three percent chlor-dane solution, made up of a chlordane wettable powder or an emulsion form, may be used in the control of cut ants, says Gunter. Pour about a half gallon of this solution down each opening of the colony

Another good method is to dig up a shovelful of dirt at the surface opening to the passageway into the interior, then pour a barrelful of water down this passageway. As the last gallon or two runs down into the ant hill,


