
Get the idea? Don't rub it in ourselves to grandpa's ways -'cause the adjustment happens to go back farther than grand- has resulted from the city's conpa's days.

#### DIRECT FLOW FROM NO. 2 TANK DOUBLES

Assuming that the city water situation will continue as well as it has the past ten days, residents of Muenster will have he satisfaction of pulling through the power emergency without a water emergenry.

The storage tank on North Main adjoining Well No. 2 enables the city to furnish exactly twice as much water as it could without the tank.

Water Superintendent Steve Moster explained this week that by releasing water directly into mains the city can use its portable power unit full time for pumping from the well. Without the extra tank it would have to spend half the time boosting wa-

er to the tower. In spite of that arrangement the city does not have all the water it wants. Normally the supply runs out by mid-afternoon and water is not available until 6 or 7 when the unit gets back on the job.

Wednesday was an exception to the rule. A break on the two inch line near the public school resulted in the loss of thousands of gallons during the previous night. The break was repaired before 10 Wednesday, but the city was out of water shortly after noon.

Electricity came back to Muenster Wednesday night at 10:15 o'clock ending an 8 day blackout, the longest experienced in the history of this city and almost twice as long as the previous record breaker in 1945. That power failure lasted 4½ days.

It was about 1:30 on the morning of Wednesday, January 26, when the most destructive ice storm on record isolated this community from the rest of the electrical world. It was the third and final break resulting from an almost constant freezing drizzle that started early the previous Monday.

The first break came about 2

p.m. Monday. By 11:30 a.m. Tuesday it was repaired but another break came 12 hours later. Repairs that time were complet-

From then on ice continued to accumulate on the dead lines for almost 24 hours to complete the most destructive line wreckage ever experienced by electrical companies of North Texas.

TP&L officials state it was the worst on record anywhere in the United States, tearing down hundreds of miles of heavy and light transmission lines and extending over an area that includes Durant, Okla., Honey Grove, Minerals Wells and Temple.

The section worst hit extends to the south and the east of Sherman, which includes the main feeder lines for this section. Heavy double pole line supports snapped by the hundreds. In some cases even the steel tower type of supports were crushed



To stimulate public interest in the importance of dental health for all children, the American Dental Association is sponsoring such a program beginning with National Children's Dental Health Day on Monday (Feb. 7).

Dental authorities declare that by following three simple dental health rules from early childhood the average present can be assured.

the average person can be assured a lifetime of dental health. These rules are: (1) regular dental care, (2) brushing the teeth after eating, and (3) minimum consumption of all forms of sugar.

#### Governor Jester Urges Observance of National Children's Dental Day

AUSTIN. - Observance of the first National Children's Dental Health Day on February 7th has been approved and commended to Texans by an Official Memorandum signed by Beauford H. Jester.

The dental health of children is of prime importance to their general well- being, and Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer says that every child should be under the regular care of a competent dentist from the time he is thirty months of age.

"Much can be done in the way of tooth decay prevention by dentists of today," Dr. Cox said, "and studies are under way at present which may lead to still further advances in the control of dental caries. Two Texas cities with almost identical fluorine content in their city water supplies are being used in one experiment. Sodium fluoride is being added to the supply of one city, and the results in the reduction of dental caries checked against that of the city whose water supply is not treated.

"This experiment has been in progress only 29 months and it is too early to establish a posltive evaluation, but the results cheked so far have demonstrated a decided tendency to caries reduction in the city where sodium

INCREASING NUMBER OF RABIES CASES NOTED

BY HEALTH DEPARTMENT AUSTIN-Rabies is a "growing menace" to Texas people, pets and livestock, the State Health Department warned Saturday.

There has been an average of three human deaths a year from rabies in the last five years, the department said . More than 4,000 animals were tested during the last year, and 1,100 of these showed positive evidence of the disease. An average of 3,000 persons a

year have taken emergency treatment for prevention of rabies after being bitten by mad animals and it is difficult to estimate the number of lives thus saved, the department said.


