

up with a family garden," she recalled. "Gardening was all around us. We would just go to this uncle's field when this was ready or Dad's field when this was ready. We didn't do any canning because there were things growing all year long down there. We didn't have to worry about that. I had to learn to can when I got up here because even at Christmas time we were picking tomatoes out of Uncle Edward's field full of tomatoes because it doesn't freeze down there."

Beth Bartush wrote in a letter of recommendation to Texas Farm Bureau, "Michele Knauf has a true gift of instilling an interest in agriculture and its importance to our society, into her students. This is observed when you walk into her classroom and are welcomed by the sounds of baby chicks and the excitement of the children as they begin to explain what they have been doing and why these chicks are in school."

A parent, Rep. Drew Springer, wrote, "The children, themselves, were the best recommendations for Mrs. Knauf when they frequently came home sharing details of her efforts in the classroom to relate agriculture to their lives. My wife and I distinctly remember the excitement the kids felt as they were actually encouraged to get their hands dirty while planting seeds and plants in their perennial wildflower garden on the school campus next to the playground for all to enjoy. Mrs. Knauf always had some project or animal in the classroom actively showing animal life cycles. She used these to let the children see, first hand, how the animals were an integral part of our agriculture-based community.²

And the children do learn as the late SHCS Principal Ralf Rondon had written in his letter, "Mrs. Knauf's teaching has advanced the curriculum goals of our school and this has been reflected in our standardized testing scores. Mrs. Knauf's students have routinely exhibited the highest rate of growth for our elementary school."

Michele remarks about teaching, "I like learning along with the kids. I like seeing their faces light up when they finally really see what we're talking about or when they get the concept, or when they've discovered something new, too. Then they are hollering for everybody to come see what they found. It's fun. And, it's neat to hear their point of view. They, a lot of times, will think of things that you'd have never thought of and that's pretty cool too. So many different ways of looking at things.

"I'm really very excited about it! I just thought it was a great honor to be picked out of the whole state," remarked Michele on receiving the statewide award. She was told that there were quite a few applicants. As the Agriculture in the Classroom Outstanding Teacher, Michele will get to take an expenses paid trip to the National Agriculture in the Classroom Conference in Arizona next summer. She is thrilled to get the opportunity to meet with other teachers from across the nation and share in what they have been doing in their classrooms.

Also, both Michele and Cooke County Farm Bureau receive \$300 cash.

Michele praised Cooke County Farm Bureau President Robert Klement and his wife Gloria for all the work that He asked them to declare they do for the County Farm Bureau and for putting on the Ag Days in the spring for the County 4th graders. She said that Gloria was very helpful in assisting with getting the application prepared for Michele.

City Administrator Stan Endres asked Jones about his request for exclusive rights to use the tower. Jones said that there would be a lot of money invested in equipment that would be sensitive to interference. He asked for an exclusive for at least two years.

Endres said that they would have to advertise for bids so all interested parties had the opportunity to bid.

Jones stated that it would be beneficial for the City to go with a local company such as the one he proposed rather than one that is not local. With his, the sales tax would stay in Muenster.







All the adults in this group of young men's'lives deserve credit for this phone call that might never have been made. (Mr. Pierce felt a little awkward and thought long and hard before making the call. He was "moved" to do it.) It is so uplifting as the Superintendent of Schools to have this message delivered in such a heartfelt manner. In this Season of Giving, there is no better gift that we can give than that gift of truly caring about our fellow competitor in showing him or her dignity and respect. Thank you boys, coaches, teachers, and community of Muenster for helping to develop character in our kids that is so outstanding, people who are strangers feel compelled to share and talk about it.



Highway bill restores crop insurance

After weeks of uncertainty, a highway bill approved by the U.S. House and Senate is expected to save federal crop insurance from \$3 billion in cuts included in the Bipartisan Budget Act.

An agreement between House and Senate Ag Committee leaders was said to be in the works to restore the funding in an omnibus spending bill, but that agreement came into question soon after the announcement was made.

Agricultural organizations, like the American Farm Bureau Federation (AFBF), spent days speaking to legislators and discussing the importance of crop insurance for American farmers in an effort to save the program.

"They are fulfilling that promise. That was a little bit scary. We've done several hundred Hill meetings and certainly discussions and letters saying this \$3 billion cut would truly cripple the crop insurance program. I think we made a good faith effort and it is a success," Mary
