TIME TO TALK BACK
 Since it was published "for private circulation" among those gifted students of government who will delineate President Kennedy's "New Frontiers" for him, you may not have seen Harvard Historian Arthur Schlesinger's pamphlet, "The Big Decision — Private Indulgence or National Power".
 But you very definitely should know about it, since the National Associated Busi-

nessmen — America's voice of small business — sees in it the blueprint for the takeover of business by Government. Professor Schlesinger calmly regards "our national wealth and talent" as properly belonging, not to those who created the wealth, or to those who developed and employed the talents that God gave them, but to the Government. He complains that the Eisenhower Administration spends "a

smaller share of our gross national product (a phony yardstick if there ever was one) on public services and facilities today than . . . a decade ago". We have failed dismally, in the Schlesinger view, to expand our "social overhead", under which he lists "education, medical care, housing, slum clearance, urban and suburban planning, social security, provision for the sick and the aging, roads, recreation, water, assistance to distressed classes and areas, resources and energy development."

To remedy the deplorable situation in which a timid Federal Government has failed to completely absorb state and local prerogatives and responsibilities and has allowed the misguided citizenry to retain some of its earnings only to spend them foolishly on "tail-fins and television", Schlesinger & Co. would simply revise the "allocation of resources". In plain English, since business and individuals are so stupid and selfish about handling their own money, the Government will have to do it for them.

Throughout his pamphlet, the professor refers to the people of the US not as citizens or taxpayers, but as "consumers". Obviously, he seeks to create the impression that we are all victims of a monster called "business". He overlooks completely the fact that ours is a business nation, that these consumers — unless they are doctors, lawyers, dentists or on a government payroll — themselves constitute the business community. It is therefore especially interesting that Dr. Schlesinger's initial suggestion for increasing Federal revenues is a tax on advertising. That his first effort should be to deaden the nerve that energizes the American economic system should be significant not only to the National Associated Businessmen, but to every last one of us who believes that Government must be our servant, not our master.

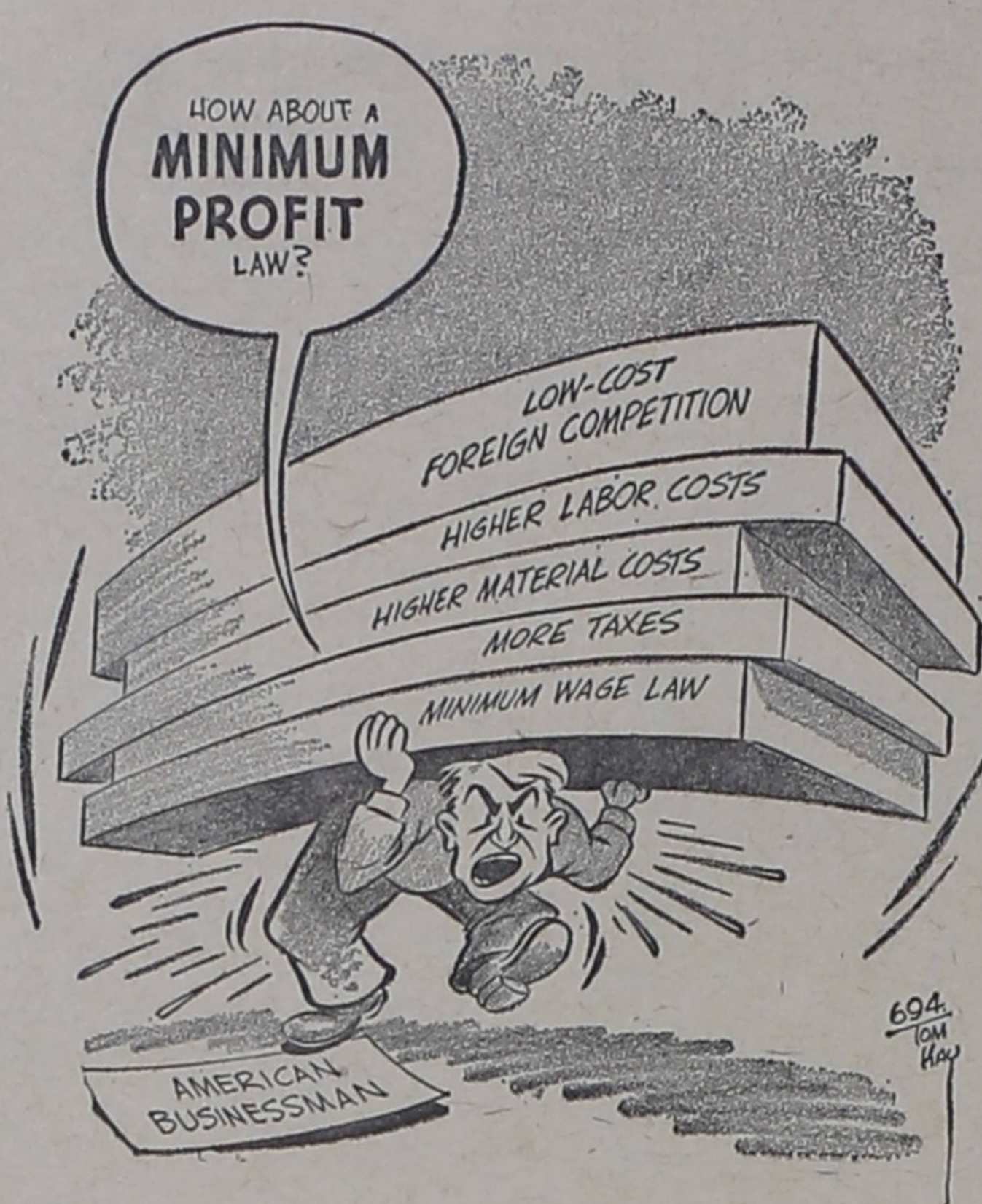
Nobody elected this Schlesinger to anything. But he speaks from on high — and we had better start talking back.

No Relief in Sight

NOT EVEN A GARDENER

The Antigo, Wisconsin, Daily Journal, says: "The man with the hoe" at one time was considered the counterpart of the farmer. Today he can scarcely pass for a gardener. Few and simple tools used to be enough for farming, and some would be made right on the farm or at the local blacksmith's. Today, according to the U. S. Department of Agriculture, investment in farm machinery amounts to about ten per cent of the physical assets on farms. This compares with six per cent on a much smaller value. Machinery costs make up an increasing share of the total farm costs, and its efficient use is more and more important as a part of farm management."

Present day labor costs, if nothing else, would have made expanded use of farm machinery inevitable. The price of human labor has reached the prohibitive point in many agricultural operations. Machines are great savers of time and energy. They make it possible to get the most out of each acre. And they also make it possible to conserve those acres for future generations.

Mechanization has been the saviour of the family farm. A given number of people can efficiently farm much larger holdings than in past times, and at minimum cost. Thus, they can compete in the market place.

DWINDLING INCENTIVE

President Eisenhower in a nonpolitical speech at Houston, Texas, on October 24, deplored the growing tendency of American citizens to let Uncle Sam do things for them. He said: "For in the end it is the people — not the government — who pay and then pay not only in money, but in a currency more precious — their hard-won right to run their own affairs in their own way. This is fundamental."

Contributing greatly to the increasing number of hands outstretched to government is exorbitant taxes, which people have come to feel entitles them to get free from Uncle Sam, services they could perform more economically and better for themselves.

Self-reliance which contributed so much to our becoming the world's most prosperous nation is withering on the vine. The President-elect has promised additional free services by government to the tune of many billions of dollars. This increased spending

Alfred Sicking, Upper Elm-Red District cooperater farming near Myra, has finished over a mile of terraces. Farm equipment was used to build these terraces which outlet onto Bermuda grass established for the purpose. This makes a total of more than three miles of terraces Alfred has built on his place.

Near Hardy, Buddy Gibson has completed a 2400 cubic yard stock pond on his farm. The additional water provided by this pond will make it possible for Buddy to get more uniform grazing over his pasture.

The pond was built in a 425-acre native grass pasture that is used for winter grazing. There's also about 85 acres of Bermuda grass pasture set aside for summer grazing and stock is kept out of the 425 acres throughout the growing season. By deferring grazing on the big pasture Buddy has good winter grazing and is improving the grasses year by year.

He has also cleared around 100 acres of brush in the big pasture and has seeded the area to grass, where it was not already present, for a seed source. This acreage once produced practically nothing. It is now saving this cooperater quite a lot of hay through the winter months.

that we now have about 75 per cent of our total. The over-all goal is \$560,000, of which \$500,000 is intended for construction and equipment and \$60,000 as the required fund to assure the first two years of operation. Toward that goal we have the \$60,000 willed to the hospital, the available Hill Burton grant of \$250,000 and the \$108,000 in the drive to date. That's \$418,000 toward the total goal of \$560,000.

It's unthinkable that this community would permit the

project to fail when it is so near to success, or that we would allow over \$300,000 in grants to slip away when we have less than half that amount remaining on our goal. Of course, this still re-

quires lots of work and lots of giving. But the goal is attainable, and the project as deserving as any ever undertaken here. Pride and judgment demand that we put it over the top.
