#### Straw Improves Condition of Soil


Russians spend about half dition of the soil and should graduated from Cooke County added that where large amounts of straw are worked into the soil, the soil microbes Muenster will take up large quantities of the available nitrogen and other nutrients making it essential to fertilize the crop following small grain. Dr. Baxter said 20 pounds of extra nitrogen should be applied per acre for each ton of straw or other residue returned to the soil.

Concerning above-ground residue, he stated an average annual return to the soil of 3,600 to 4,000 pounds of this material per acre is required to maintain the level of organic matter in the soil. One bale-to-the-acre cotton returns only 2,000 to 3,000 pounds of residue per acre; 40 bushelsper-acre wheat returns 4,000 pounds; 80 bushel-per-acre corn or grain sorghum returns about 5,000 pounds; and three-year rotation of grain sorghum, small grain, and cotton returns an average of 4,-000 pounds, he reported.


