So now, a new angle has to be dreamed up to sell the program to Congress and the American people this year, and in leading off the parade of administration witnesses who will seek to cojole Congress into appropriating another \$4.5 billion for foreign aid, Rusk reached deep down into the muck to produce the argument that to be against foreign aid is to be for the spread of communism.

How Rusk, or anybody else in the present administration, can make this statement with a straight face is beyond our understanding. Who, we might ask, is this man to accuse others of encouraging the spread of communism when he is one of the chief architects of our dim-witted and bumbling Cuban policy that has not only permitted but is now abetting the existence of a Communist stronghold right in our own backyard?

Did our foreign aid prevent Communism from taking over Cuba? Has it stopped the spread of communism in Laos,

These manufacturers buy the cheap Soviet ore, then ship the alloy to America where they undersell American producers. The only way for American producers to stay in business is our brains to convince people

BATON ROUGE, LA. - Compared to the first prefabricated home introduced in this country in 1624, modern day manufac-

tured houses are palaces. Manufactured in England and shipped to the U.S. where it was erected in what is now the state of Massachusetts, the first prefab house in this country was a two-story frame building. It was constructed of precut oak timbers which, when fitted together, formed the frame of

the house. It is believed that the exterior of the "Great House," as it was called, was made of handhewn shakes or shingles. American manufactured homes first appeared in 1727 with component parts to be erected on site, were shipped to the West Indies from New Orleans. Ironically, Louisiana is the headquarters state of one of today's leading home manufacturing companies, Crawford

Corporation of Baton Rouge. Crawford, a pioneer in modern home manufacturing techniques, predicts that within the next 10 years manufactured houses will represent 50 to 75% of total private housing.

The industry is growing at an average annual rate of 10 to 11 per cent. An estimated 170,000 units were produced last year. Today, one of every five

ASCS Submits Statement on Wheat Program

The following statement of the 1964 Wheat Program, preparped by the ASCS information Division, was submitted to the Enterprise by the Cooke County ASCS office.

"The Wheat Program for 1964 and Subsequent Crops" was passed by Congress only after long and careful consideration of a number of programs.

The program finally drafted and approved brought important changes in the basic legislation for wheat:

The new law honors existing farm allotments, recognized existing patterns of producttion, and deals equitably with all farmers who have depended on wheat for all, most, or a part of their income.

The new law provides for increased acreage, for any class of wheat that is or may be in short supply.






