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VICTORY FOR FREEDOM

Early in October the Supreme Court of the United States handed down a decision of far-reaching significance.

Kansas is one of the 19 states with right-to-work laws — laws which say, in effect, that a man may join or not join a union, as he voluntarily chooses, and have the right to pursue his trade in either case. A big union attempted to get around the Kansas law through a gimmick known as the agency shop. Under the agency shop, non-union workers would have to pay fees to the union in order to hold their jobs.

In a court test, the Kansas Supreme Court outlawed the

agency shop. The decision was appealed to the highest court in the land, which refused a hearing, and thus upheld the Kansas Court.

This marks a decisive victory for the freedom of a man to make up his own mind, without coercion from either side, as to whether he wants or does not want to join a union and pay its dues. There can be no doubt that the court decisions accurately reflect the will of Congress, which authorized state right-to-work legislation in the Taft-Hartley law — and represent a long step forward in protecting and guaranteeing a fundamental right of the individual citizen.

No Danger From Within?

THAT SPEECH by President Kennedy at Los Angeles climaxed an attack by liberal forces of this country on patriotic groups whose sole sin seems to be that they love their country and are worried about its future. We shall quote the provocative part of it:

"Men who are unwilling to face up to the danger from without are convinced that the real danger comes from within . . . We know that it comes from without, not within. It must be met by quiet preparedness, not provocative speeches."

NO DANGER from within, Mr. Kennedy? You really can't be serious.

Pro-Russian forces within the United States stole the atomic-bomb secret and passed it on to the Soviet Union.

Agreements at Tehran and Yalta were dictated from within.

Gen. MacArthur was stopped at the Yalu River from within — not by the Chinese communists.

Our policies which chased Chiang Kai-shek off the mainland of China, isolated him on Formosa and resulted in complete communist domination under Chou and Mao came from within — not without.

Decisions which helped Castro take over Cuba and which bungled the recent "invasion" attempt came from within — not without.

Policies which furthered communism in the Congo, British Guiana, Indonesia and Laos came from within — not without. Successful penetration of our own federal government by 14 communist cells during the 1930s — later proved by competent investigations — was aided from within, not without.

When the danger of men like Alger Hiss and Harry Dexter White was called to the attention of men in high places and for years nothing was done to root them out, that inaction came from within — not without.

Successful penetration of the United States by Russian agents, operating through the United Nations, has been aided from within — not without. Alger Hiss was the first secretary general of the U. N.

Our record "from within" has not been good, Mr. Kennedy. The American people have the fortitude and ability to whip the Russians anywhere, and time, any place. But long before you thought of being president, Mr. Kennedy, an attitude of complacency, softness — yes, of sympathy — toward Russia had penetrated our government, our educational systems, our media and some of our churches.

THE DALLAS NEWS well remembers, Mr. Kennedy, how former Rep. Martin Dies of Texas — head of the Un-American Activities, Committee — went to the late President Roosevelt in the late 1930s and warned him about the penetration of communists in our government.

In firm and threatening tones, Mr. Roosevelt told Dies to "concentrate on the Nazis; the communists are no danger to America."

No doubt he thought it. But mistakes can be a danger from within, particularly mistakes influenced by evil forces from without.

Mr. Dies, Rep. Walter, Senators McCarthy and Jenner all proved to this country in investigations that there is a danger from within and without. We should not minimize either. The record is plain that we have had dangerous rats gnawing at our own foundations and fattening on cheese-headed people who refuse to trap them. — Dallas Morning News



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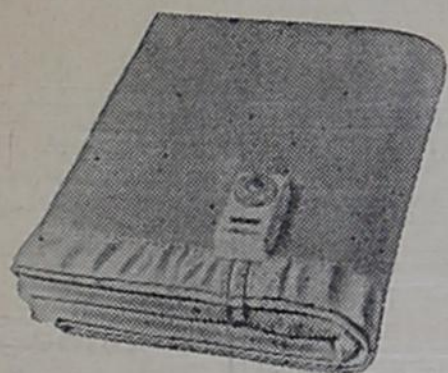
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AN AGING PERSON'S PRAYER

Who Will Benefit by a Southern Bloc Vote?

As far back as 1928, the communists in the United States published a booklet entitled "American Negro Problems" by John Pepper, who was a communist representative from Moscow. His real name was Joseph Pogany. This Kremlin agent revealed the communist plot to use the Southern Negro politically in their program of stirring up racial strife throughout the United States. Pepper said that "The Negroes of the South are disfranchised politically," and called attention to "the tremendous revolutionary possibilities" in the racial agitation plot.

These political plans of the communists were revealed further during 1951 by Pettis Perry, one of the top-ranking Negro communist leaders. Perry was reporting on the communist plan to use Jewish, Catholic, and Protestant organizations to further their plot to communize the South. He told communist leaders: "Dixiecrats admit that the Negroes in certain areas constitute such an overwhelming majority that a whole number of Congressmen would come from them, and that in other areas every officer and official would be members of the Negro race." Obviously, Perry and his communist superiors were fully expecting these future Negro office holders to be substantially pro-communist.

John Gates, editor of the Daily Worker at that time, said in a speech at Carnegie Hall, New York City, on January 20, 1956: "If the Negroes and poor Whites

of the South could vote, the East-lands would be voted out of power." Front-page headlines in the communist Worker of October 8, 1961 read: "SET MASS VOTE DRIVE IN SOUTH WITHIN 30 DAYS." In this article communists were told of a plan to "tumble the walls of segregation in the entire South through the weight of a powerful non-violent freedom army. . . ." They were told that the "focal point" of the "assault" would be "a voter registration drive scheduled to get under way in Montgomery, Ala., within 30 days", and that the assault would be "extended to other parts of the South in the month following. . . ."

The communists claimed that there were more than 300 delegates from every state in the South at this meeting and that they represented more than 70 organizations. The meeting was sponsored by the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. Among the participating organizations listed by the Worker were: the NAACP, CORE, the National Urban League, and the U. S. National Student Association. The long-standing communist interest in a Negro bloc vote in the South and their current agitation for federal usurpation of control over election processes in our sovereign southern states should be a matter of serious concern to all thinking Americans.

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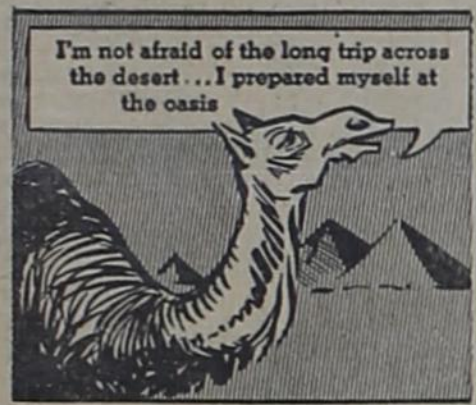

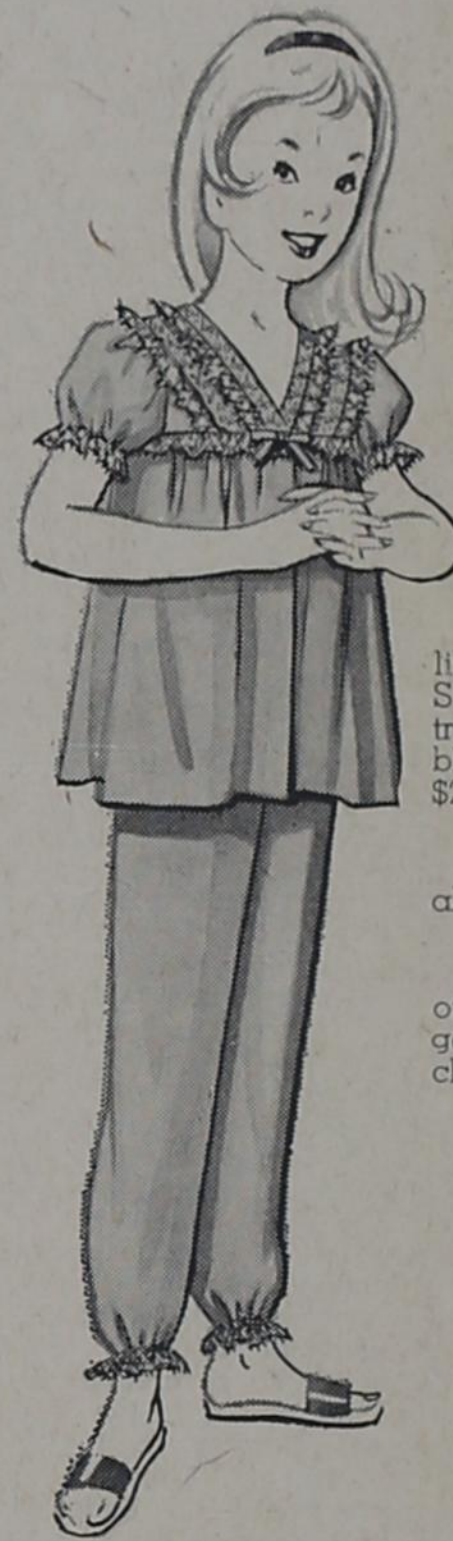

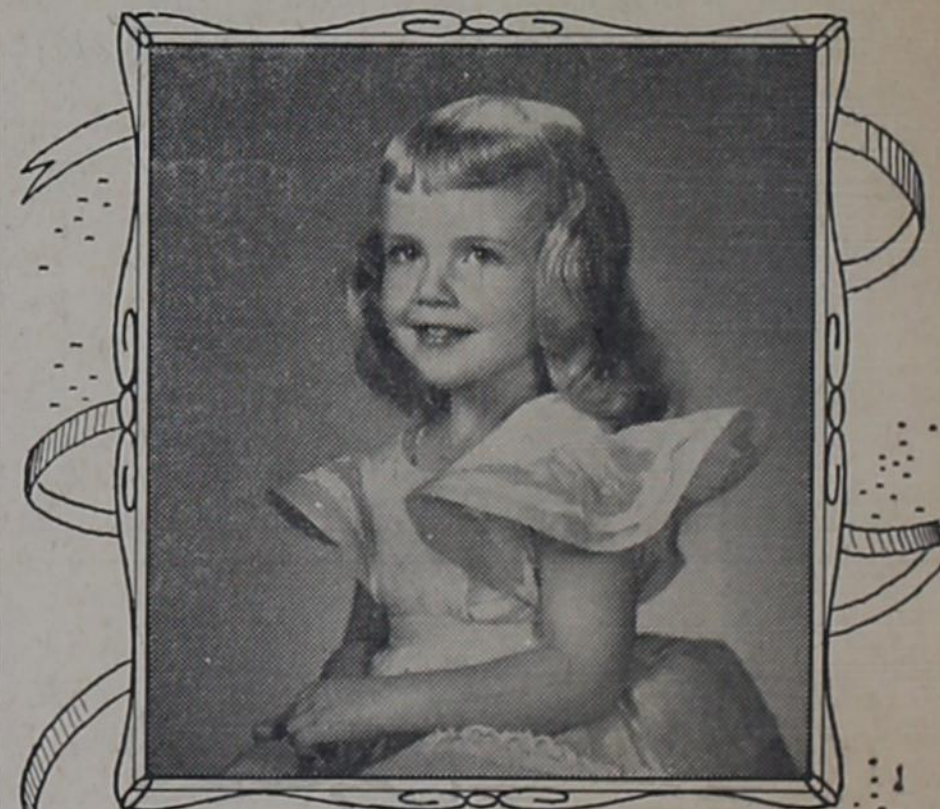
