



ASC committees have charge of the local field administration of such national farm programs as acreage allotments, marketing quotas, commodity loans, the feed grain program, the Sugar Act program, the National Wool Program, the Agricultural Conservation Program, the Conservation Reserve Program, and farm stor-

age facility loans. Other duties are assigned to the committees by the Secretary of Agriculture as the need arises.

Each year, farmers who are taking part in one or more of the farm programs which the committees administer elect a community committee from among their own number.
