### Unchanging Duty in a Changing World

The 228 Catholic bishops of imagining that our hour of the United States said that opportunity has passed. this hour, when the forces of freedom and of tyranny face hour of greatest opportunity is a showdown, is the nation's striking now, as the forces of ple.

The theme of the statement issued by the bishops at the close of their annual meeting is "Unchanging Duty in a Changing World.

"Because we have so often faltered in our course," they said, "and because the com-

munist nations have profited by our mistakes to inspire false ideals and to awaken glittering but barren hopes, we must not be discouraged,

"It has not passed. The time of greatest opportunity. freedom and of tyranny grid for a decision."

The bishops note the historic religious origins and traditions of the United States but deplore a decline in morals and the need of rebuilding "a sound religious and moral foundation for America."

Evidences of moral decline are seen by the bishops "in the alarming increase in crime, particularly among the young; in the sensational treatment of violence and sexuality in literature, on the stage, screen and television; in the disclosures of greed and

cynicism in government, labor and business; in the stubborn continuance of race prejudice and injustice; in the multiplication of divorce and the rapid disintegration of the family, and in a harsh and pagan disregard of the sacredness of human life concealed under the mantle of science."

The bishops blame much of this on "a pernicious cult of the image" and lay against popular education a measure of responsibility "for the decline and rejection of moral

The great need stressed in the bishops' statement is to 'recognize and affirm the essential place of religion and morality in the formation of the human personality if we are to survive as a moral peo-

"In a world in which individual obligation is being denied, we must show the reality of personal responsibility - transcendent responsibility to God for all acts and attitudes, personal accountability for self, for family, for community, for nation."

The statement emphasizes that the soundness of society depends on the principles of life: the unity and sanctity of marriage, parental duty and authority, and filial reverence and obedience.

Beyond the family, the bishops appeal for adherence to those moral principles which govern man's wider social relationships" and which "must be made to permeate all of society and its institutions. The laborer must bring them to his union meetings; the industrialist, to the business world; the teacher of his class; the parent, to his home each to the sphere of life in which he moves."

XXIII, "Mater et Magistra."
