





The real issue as far as Muenster is concerned is not the amount of tax but whether or not it should pay any tax. People here are making a voluntary sacrifice to provide their own facilities and are justifiably opposed to being taxed for someone else's facilities . . . especially since the tax over the 30 year period would equal about 75 per cent of their voluntary contribution . . . and since they expect to get very little use from the other facility.

Many of us here feel that the county hospital, located at Gainesville, of course, will be a particular asset to the city of Gainesville, just as Muenster's hospital will be a particular asset to Muenster. While providing medical service to people from miles around it has a special local value in its payroll, the business created by its own needs, the additional business it attracts, and the possibility of attracting new financial venures. These added values are well worth the immediate community's support, and Gainesville as well as Muenster should be willing to provide for them. The committee's letter also implies that Muenster should feel indebted because it is receiving the entire county's share of Hill-Burton aid. It (Continued on page 6)
