That's an odd remark, in defense of the foreign policy that has been in effect for expect the building and its thirty years. When it started communism controlled the Soviet Union, an area of about 8.5 million square miles and 193 million people. Today communism controls about 13 million square miles and more than a billion people. That's about a fourth of the earth's surface and a third of its people.

In other words the record at this time shows that our policy of three decades, and especially since World War II, has already gone a long way toward turning half the world to the red menace. Faced by the obvious failure of that policy, how can a person feel justified in criticizing another policy?

Whatever anyone thinks of Goldwater's ideas, it must be admitted that they have not been tried. No one can say whether or not they would ready for patients. be successful. On the other hand it is a known fact that policies which have been tried for thirty years are not succeeding. Under the circumstances it seems that his ideas deserve consideration rather than ridicule
