## Plans Disclosed For Hospital's 2 Opening Dates

Though the actual opening of Muenster Memorial Hospital is not assured for December 8, the formal opening very likely will be held on that date.

Sister Mildred Felderhoff, administrator, pointed out Wednesday that she and the Hospital Authority confidently expect the building and its installations to be sufficiently completed by that date for a public showing and formal dedication. Visitors will get a good view of facilities and accommodations, but the hospital may not be quite ready to admit patients.

The date is especially favored because it is regarded as the birthday of the community. On December 8, 1889, feast of the Immaculate Conception, the founders of Muenster gathered for the first time to attend mass and adopted that date as the beginning of their community.

Regarding the actual opening, Sister Mildred said that many things still have to be done and it's not likely that all can be done before December 8. Besides, after a good sized crowd goes through, the place will need cleaning to be ready for patients.

According to the construction schedule the contractor's job should be finished in about two weeks. Most of the finishing work is done. The rest will be done soon. After that come a general clean-up and tests of heating, cooling, service pipes, wires and equipment. Also due soon is completion of pavement.

At the same time a group of volunteers under direction of Sister Mildred is sewing drapes and supplies. Mrs. Louis Rosenberg and personnel of the dress factory are giving overtime hours to provide all drapes needed for the hospital. Members of the Catholic Daughters and St. Anne Society are sewing surgical drapes, scrub gowns and other essential items.

Then comes a big installation job. Volunteer help will be solicited to move furniture into patient rooms, offices, dining room, lobby, waiting room etc., also to hang all of the drapes. Representatives of furniture suppliers will be on hand to direct work of the volunteers.

Patsy Streng was far ahead with 102,662 votes to claim the crown. She is a senior and the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Streng.

Runnerup is Miss Patsy Hartman, a sophomore, with 50,238 votes. Freshman Janie Fleitman brought in 26,196 votes and Junior Jane Hess gathered up 12,175 votes.

Queen Patsy of the House of Streng will be crowned in formal ceremonies Friday night during homecoming festivities before the Tigers host Dallas Christian. The three other contestants will be princesses in the royal court.

A pre-game pep rally will be held beginning about 6:30 on Main Street near the bank. On the march back to the Tiger field the queen and her attendants and their escorts will be in the parade. So will Mark Hess, Tiger mascot.

Queen Patsy will be escorted by Co-captain Dennis Hess, Patsy Hartman will be escorted by Clinton Endres, Janie Fleitman will be escorted by Larry Hess and Jane Hess by David Hess.

The crowning ceremony at 7:30 will immediately precede the game which is scheduled to start at 8 o'clock. At half time the pep squad will perform and after the game there'll be a homecoming dance in the Parish Hall with Teddy and the Bears providing the music.

## \$500 Stolen in Sunday Burglary At Fisher's Store

Burglars broke into Fisher's Supermarket early Sunday morning, smashed a safe and stole about \$500 in currency and an equal amount in checks.

City Officer Bill Pratt along with Sheriff W. E. Whisman and Ranger Lewis Rigler have been working on the case since then but so far have not come up with any clues.

All checks were found the next morning at the side of the street on North Sycamore. Two burglars were caught in the act by J. W. Fisher about 4:30 Sunday morning as he stopped in the store before leaving on a trip to Lubbock. But they were in semi-darkness and he could not see them distinctly enough to describe them. He left immediately to call City Officer Bill Pratt but before they returned the burglars were gone.

As indicated by evidence in the store, says Pratt, the burglars cut a 9x11 hole in the roof and either or both came through it. Inside they beat the knob off the safe and, apparently, when it still failed to open they moved it to a rest room at the back and continued pounding until they got the door open.

Most likely they had the money when J. W. Fisher surprised them because they were gone with it when Pratt arrived a few minutes later.

In Pratt's opinion the burglars either were professionals or well informed amateurs. When the door failed to open after the knob was knocked off they knew much more pounding was needed and moved to a small room to muffle the sound. The only evidence found was tools and a pair of cotton flannel gloves, very small size.

The next morning John Mosman found Fisher's bank deposit book beside Sycamore Street. He returned it, told where he found it, and Joe Galloway went to look over the area. He found the checks.

## A REALISTIC ALTERNATIVE TO THE UNITED NATIONS

Seen often these days is an advertisement depicting the mushroom cloud of an H-Bomb. The caption reads: "This is one alternative to the United Nations. The implication — that nuclear war is our only alternative to the UN — is the prime reason we remain in that body."

We overlook the fact the world has been at war almost continually since the UN was created. Directly or financially, we have been involved in much of that war. Lives, billions of dollars, and prestige were lost in Korea. Right now, American soldiers are dying in south Vietnam. How can this be called an alternative to war?

Worst of all, the UN itself started the Congo War. By force of arms it punished Katanga Province for seceding from the nightmare called the Congo. The UN murdered civilians, fired upon marked ambulances, hospitals and churches, and terrorized the inhabitants of Elizabethville. What sort of an alternative is

this? Today, we find the UN's biggest guns aimed at South Africa and Portugal — two countries that have made no threatening gestures toward other nations. At the same time, there has been no single UN move to rectify the wrongs of the Soviet massacre of Hungary. Neither did the UN ever consider China's invasion of India, or India's invasion of Portugal. Is tyranny an alternative to war?

If this is peace, war must truly be "hell." In spite of all this, there are still those who stoutly defend the UN. When literally millions of Americans suggest we get out, these people cry: "But the UN is all we have. What alternative is there?"

One alternative would be to adopt a program to extend the prosperous and peaceful capitalist system to the whole world. We should quit building up the socialist and communist nations of the world, and instead take the chains off our own economy. The resulting contrast between capitalism and collectivism would be an inspiration for people everywhere to adopt free enterprise and start moving ahead.

We should allow our great business geniuses the freedom to spread capitalism's abundant secrets to all nations that want it — but on voluntary basis, not by the forced "peace corps" or "foreign aid" way.

Our foreign policy should have two prime objectives: (1) the elimination of communism (the chief threat to peace) by suspending all U.S. government aid to it and (2) the spreading of capitalism throughout the world. The abundance created by the great private enterprise system is the only sure deterrent to war ever devised.

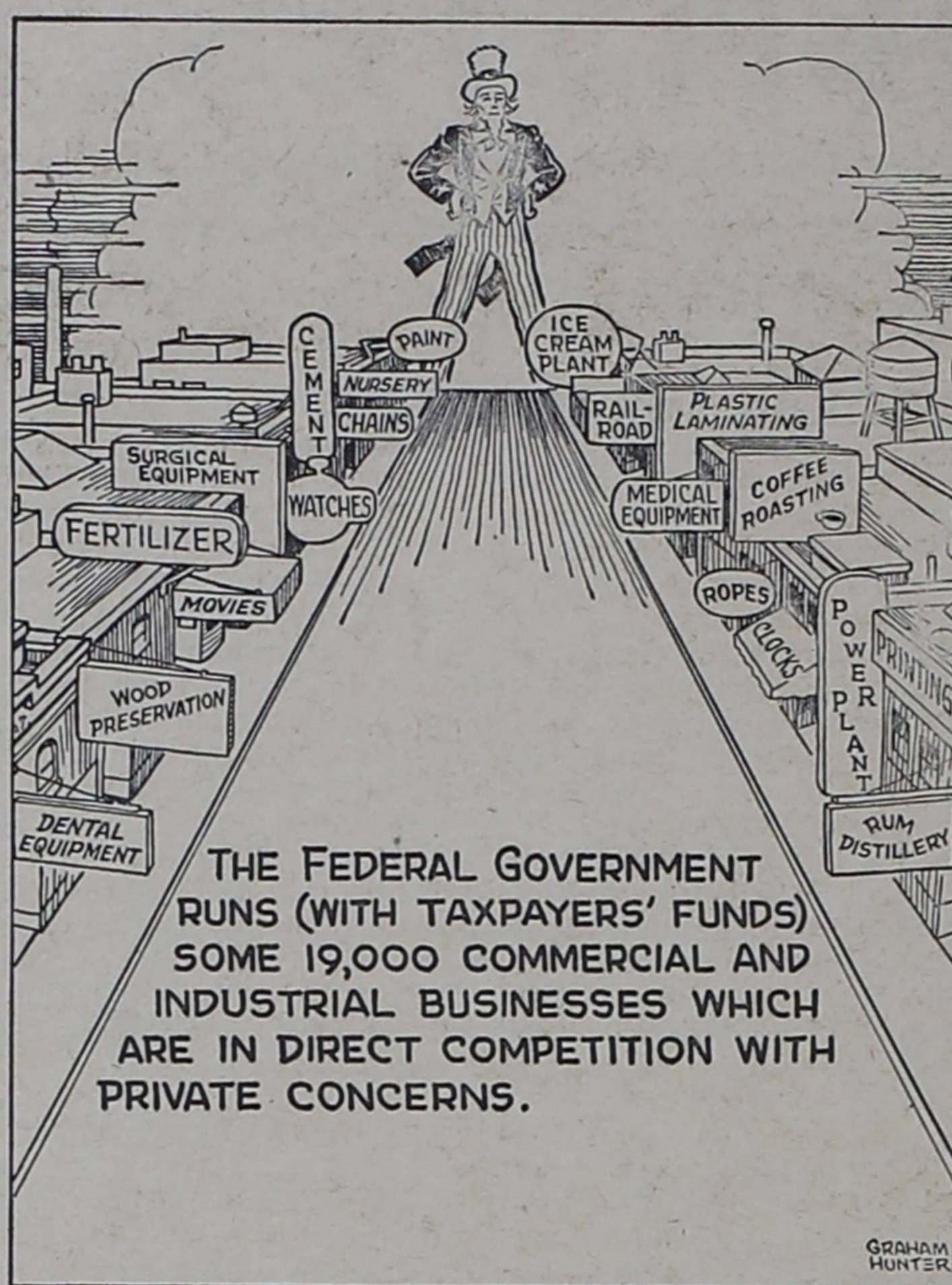
But we must not overlook the fact that American membership in the UN stands in the way of these objectives. Our foreign policy is today created by the Titos, Nkrumahs, and Sukarnos. And the UN's specialized agencies drain our resources to build socialism, not capitalism.

The first big step on the road to peace will be passage of Congressman Utt's bill — H.R. 427 — to get the U.S. out of the UN.

There IS an alternative to the UN — a better alternative. We're anxious to get on with it.

### TOO MANY SIDELINES

Did you know that Uncle Sam has a lot of sidelines? Well, he has. He runs coffee-roasting plants, rum distilleries, printing and power plants. He manufactures scores of different products including surgical, medical and dental equipment, rope, chain, watches, clocks, paints and fertilizers. There's more. Uncle Sam is also in the plastic-laminating business and in cement, railroad and wood-preservation enterprises. He even operates movie theaters and ice cream plants.

All in all, according to Senator J. Glenn Beall (R-Md.), Uncle Sam as the front for the federal government, runs some 19,000 commercial and industrial businesses which are in direct competition with private concerns.

The unfairness of this deplorable situation is further compounded, Sen. Beall points out, by the fact that businessmen and industrialists, who operate the same kinds of establishments as the government, must pay taxes to their competitor and that these are poured back into the government-operated businesses which are damaging to the interests of the privately operated enterprises.

This tops all the "heas-I-win-tails-you-lose" propositions we ever heard about. Uncle Sam has no business in business and the Congress should make it its business to see that he retires.

## TAXES, PAYROLLS AND DIVIDENDS

A world of changes have taken place in this country over a 30 year period.

And one of them has to do with the relationship of the tax collector to a successful business enterprise.

Take, for instance, the typical experience of an oil company.

In 1932 it paid total taxes of \$1.6 million. In the same year it paid its employees \$13 million in wages and salaries, and its stockholders got \$5.2 million in dividends. The tax collector, then, was low man on this totempole.

Thirty years sped by. And in 1962, employee compensation came to \$57 million; stockholders received \$20 million; and taxes amounted to \$34.5 million.

So, in just 30 years, payroll and dividend payment increased four times — where taxes zoomed 21 times.

This isn't the whole story. If the taxes the company was required by law to withhold from its employees' paychecks, along with payroll taxes, and the estimated income taxes stockholders paid on their dividends (figured at the minimum taxable rate of 20 percent) are counted, the tax bill reaches the \$50 million level. That works out more than three times the stockholders' returns after taxes — and more than the employee received after withholding and payroll deductions.

So — who comes out farthest ahead when an oil company does a good job, pleases an army of customers, and makes money? Answer: the tax collector. And this is true of any other enterprise and industry.

Why is there seldom time enough to do a job right, but always enough time to do it over?
