

One of the most gratifying events in this state's recent political history is last Satur- Select Memorials day's rejection by a substantial majority of the proposed amendment to eliminate poll tax as a requirement for voting. The result is generally regarded as an indication of a trend toward conservatism, a long awaited public rebuke to liberals both on the national and state level.

That attitude is unmistakable because of the clear cut line-up of support on the two sides of the issue. People knew that liberals were for repeal and conservatives were against it. As they cast their ballots many of them were voting not only on the issue but also on the policies of the factions supporting the two sides.

Another encouraging sign is seen in results of legislative
