Electronic Unit Takes over Texaco Pumping-Gauging

Automation is offering to help the pumpers and pipe line gaugers in this area, and is currently being used by the Texaco Inc. Producing Department on the Solomon-Felderhoff field 10.5 miles northwest of Muenster.

Texaco has installed an Odex LACT unit, an automatic control that runs oil into a pipe line without the aid of gauger, according to C. B. Fowler, local representative of

LACT is an electronic device, with confidence a series of valves and switches located 80 feet from the oil tanks. Its use permits reduction of a battery of tanks to only two, and elimination of the

Two float valves in the tank control the dumping of 100 barrels of oil. When oil reaches the level of the upper float it starts the pump, when it reaches the level of the lower float it stops

While pumping is in process a master meter registers the meter for the Railroad Commission. It also has a control ment. LACT is set for the required quality. If the quality fails to hold up the electronic brain stops sending it to the pipe line and sends it instead to the heater-treater, from which it returns to the tank. Texaco's next LACT unit in this area will be insta'led soon

Rural Carriers to Leave Cards for Livestock Survey

Rural mail carriers from the Muenster Post Office will leave some livestock survey cards along their routes beginning November 16.

"Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms," Postmaster Arthur Endres explained.

Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes.

"This means that not every box will get a card," Mr. Endres said. "For this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings."

Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for the Texas and National pig crop report and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and may others use this information in making business decisions.






