An SOS appeal to Texas livestock producers from heads of the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program explains that a job, estimated as already 75 to 90 percent complete, may go unfinished because of the public's failure to raise its share of the needed funds. The shortage apparently is less than 10 per cent of the total cost.

Figures presented show that the 3-year eradication program initiated last January was to cost an estimated \$12 million. Voluntary donation by the public of Texas was to raise \$3 million which was to be matched by the state government. And that combined fund of \$6 million was to be matched by the federal government. In other words a \$12 million program was available to stockmen of the state if they would give only a fourth of that amount. They have raised \$2 million, but they still need the last million.



And what's the value of the program? The estimate is that losses caused by screwworms in the past cost stockmen an average of \$100 million a year, Three causes account principally for that loss: failure of the infested animals to gain as much weight as they normally should, damage to meat, and damage to hides. Lower prices on less weight when applied to millions of animals runs into big losses.

Since the eradication program is set up for three years, it figures that the proposed cost to Texas stockmen was to be \$1 million a year, which is one per cent of the estimated benefit to come back to them. A p.m.
