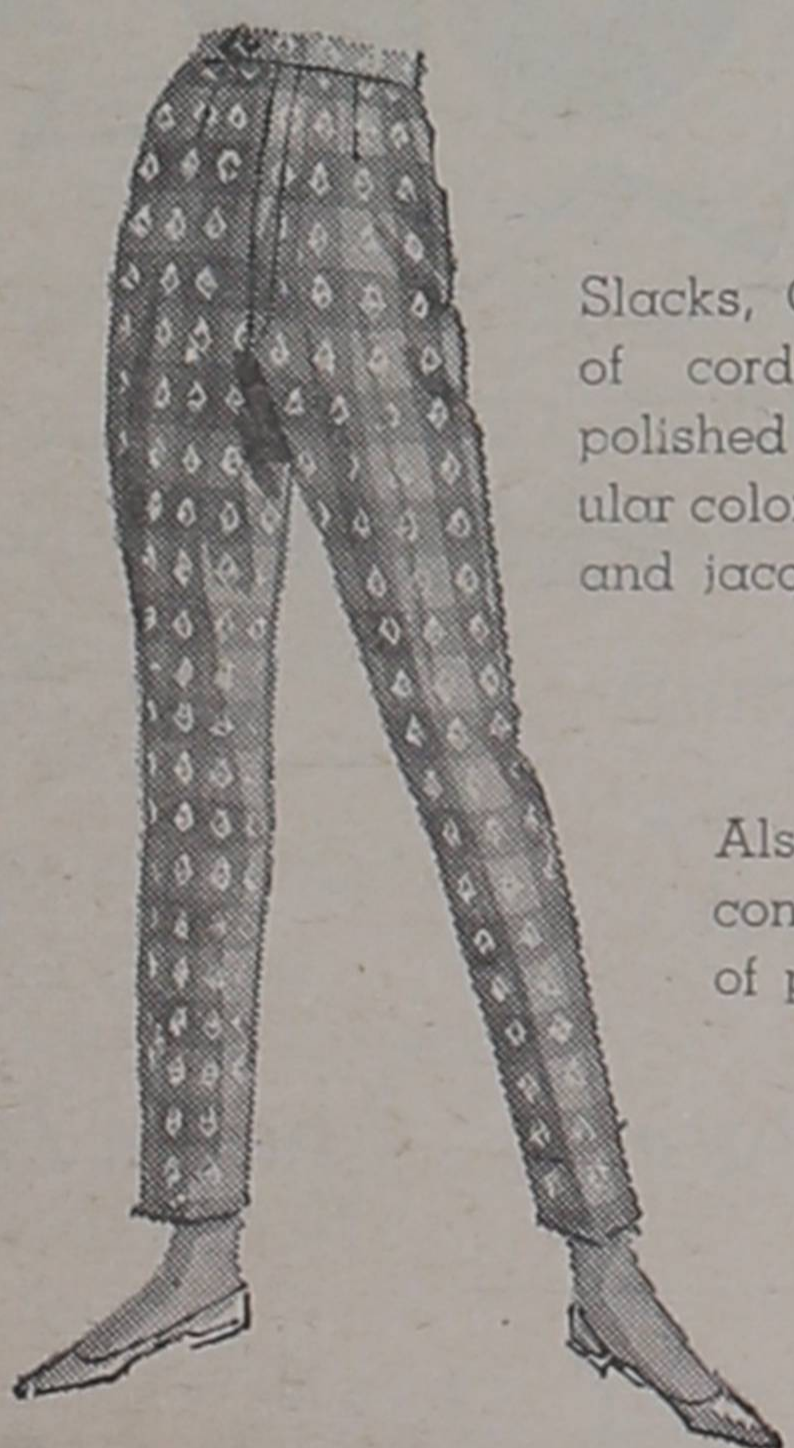

**Christian Unity  
 Themes National  
 CDA Convention**

"Christian Unity" was the theme of the 29th biennial convention of the Catholic Daughters of America held in Denver last month. Dedicated to its national chaplain, Bishop Vincent Waters of Raleigh, N. C., it was attended by more than 700 delegates, visitors and hierarchy. The CDA has 458 courts in United States and Puerto Rico with about 225,000 women dedicated to the vast program of charity and other projects for God and country.

General sessions of the convention were featured by continuation of the organization's charitable record. Project donations approved were \$50,000 toward support of an apostolate in Latin America, \$10,000 to the Catholic Journalism Scholarship Fund, \$10,000 to the Catholic Church Extension Society, and \$10,000 to the NCWC Catholic Relief Services. A report indicated that combined charities through the years of local, state and national units of CDA have topped \$33 million. The average per year is about 1 million dollars.

Included on the convention's list of distinguished speakers were Archbishop Vehr of Denver, Bishop Walters of Raleigh, Bishop Connare of Greensburg, Pa., Bishop Newell of Cheyenne, Bishop Buswell of Pueblo, Auxiliary Bishop Moloney of Denver, Bishop Reed of Oklahoma City-Tulsa, Bishop Federal of Salt Lake City and Father Flaherty of The Denver Register.

The banquet speaker was Dr. Alba Zizzamia, observer for NCWC in the United Nations. She said that to achieve Christian Unity we must forget the myth that Christianity is a Western monopoly, also that our culture lags behind others in such virtues as family solidarity, respect for authority and instilling responsibility in youth.

At the election of officers Miss Margaret Buckley of Chevy Chase, Md., was retained for two more years as supreme regent.

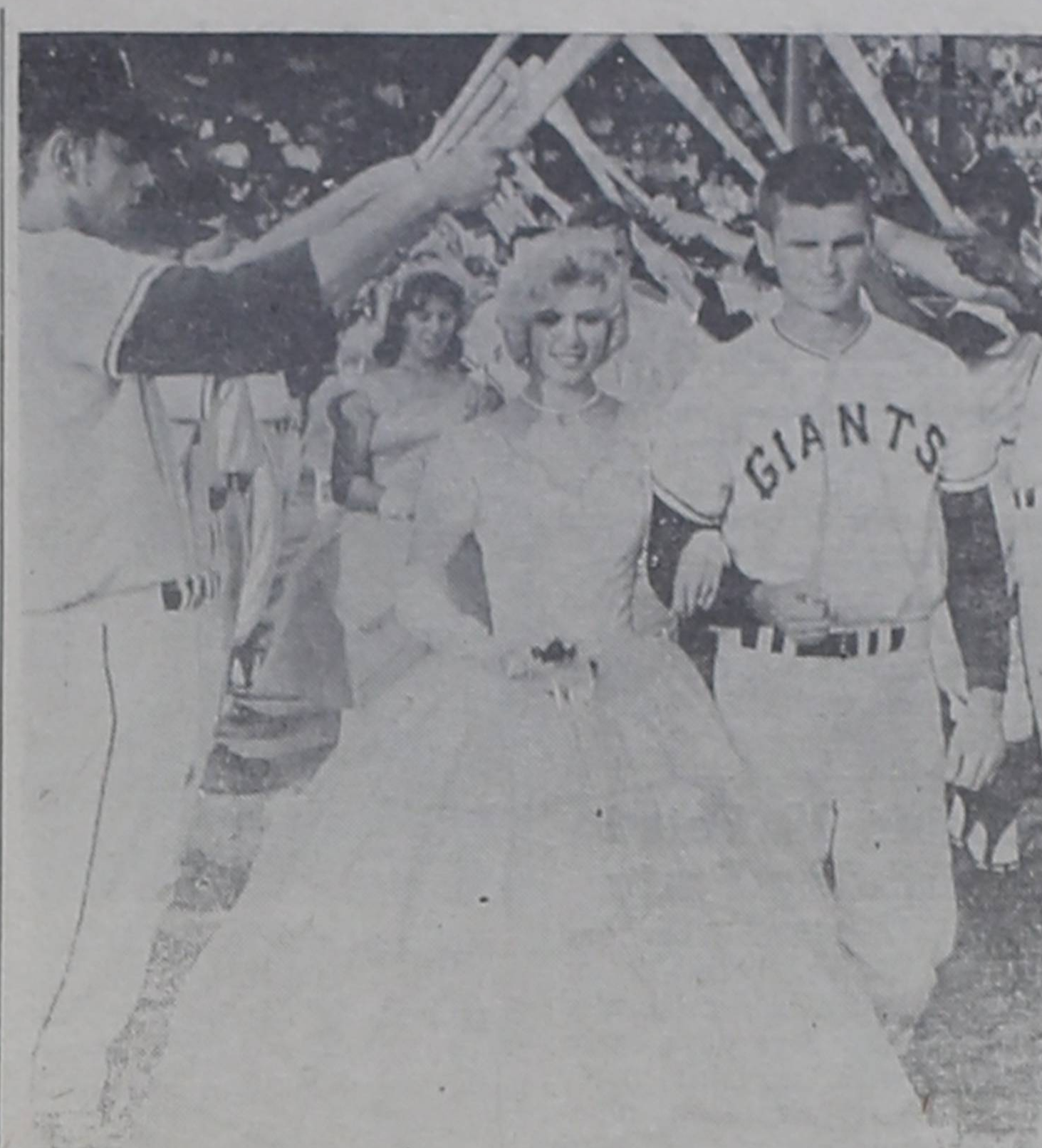

ceiving old age assistance, aid to the needy blind, or aid to dependent children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; and provided further, that not more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of state funds may be paid to any individual recipient; and provided further, that the amount paid to that individual out of federal funds; and provided further, that the amount paid out of state funds for assistance payments shall not exceed Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year.

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to assistance to needy persons totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled, renumbering said Section, and providing that the amount paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled may never exceed Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year.

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1962...

changed, for the payment of principal of and interest on such bonds in the manner permitted by the laws under which such bonds were voted. In those instances where the boundaries of any independent school district are changed by the annexation of, or consolidation with, one or more whole school districts, the taxes to be levied for the purposes hereinabove authorized may be in the amount or not to exceed the rate theretofore voted in the district having at the time of such change the greatest scholastic population according to the latest scholastic census and only the unissued bonds of such district voted prior to such change, may be subsequently sold and delivered and any bonds previously issued in any such school district involved in such annexation or consolidation shall not thereafter be issued.

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding thereto the following: "Section 4-b. No tax for the maintenance of public free schools voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is located in Dallas County, nor any bonds voted in any such district, but unissued, shall be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by change of any kind in the boundaries thereof. After any change in boundaries of the governing body of any such district, without the necessity of an additional election, shall have the power to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property within the boundaries of the district as changed, for the purposes of the maintenance of public free schools and the payment of principal of and interest on all bonded indebtedness outstanding against, or attributable, adjusted or allocated to, such district or any territory therein, in the amount, at the rate, or not to exceed the rate, and in the manner authorized in the district prior to the change in its boundaries, and further in accordance with the laws under which all such bonds, respectively, were voted; and such governing body also shall have the power, without the necessity of an additional election, to sell and deliver any unissued bonds voted in the district prior to any such change in boundaries, and to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the district as

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas to authorize the Legislature to provide for trial de novo on all appeals to the courts from actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions.

Section 1. That the Constitution of Texas be and same is hereby amended by the addition to Article II of a new Section to be known as Section 2, shall read to read as follows: "Section 2. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Constitution, the Legislature shall have the power, by general law, to provide for appeals to the courts from any and all actions, rulings or decisions of administrative agencies and executive departments of the State of Texas or any of its political subdivisions, under such provisions and limitations as the Legislature shall deem necessary and desirable; and the courts of Texas shall have no power or authority to refuse, deny, or change the manner of such appeals, if brought in the manner provided by general law, even though such appeals shall be provided de novo as that term is used in appeals from Justice of the Peace Courts to County Courts; and should the Legislature provide for such appeals to be tried completely de novo and independent of any administrative or executive action, ruling or decision thereon, the courts shall comply with such general law and shall hear and determine such appeals in the manner and under the conditions prescribed by the Legislature, even though such action on the part of the courts involves administrative or executive rather than judicial powers; provided, however, in the absence of legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this amendment, all such appeals shall continue to be prosecuted in the manner now provided by law, as interpreted and applied by the Appellate Courts of Texas on the date of the adoption of this amendment, and no change in the manner of such appeals shall be effected except by legislation enacted subsequent to the adoption of this amendment."
