

In their mad pursuit of the 35-hour-work-week leaders of the AFL-CIO are not only riding roughshod over the public interest but are completely ignoring the advice of some of their best friends.

President Kennedy, Secretary of Labor Wirtz and comes in. They get it from us! Supreme Court Jusice Goldberg (to name but a few) have For several years, we have all attempted to disabuse the union bosses of their fallacious belief that a shortened work week was a panacea for the unemployment problem.

These public officials, in the main, seconded the arguments of industrial management that the pressure-packed drive for the cut in hours could prove extremely detrimental to the country's economic well-being, and actually increase unemployment.

That's because what the unions are after is not so much nam. We are financing a war a lessening in work hours as it is a sharp increase in pay. They want the statutory work-week reduced from 40 hours to-35, with double-time (instead of time and one-half) for ail hours worked over 35. This would mean an increase of 28.5 per cent in the effective wage rate for a 40-hour week. Even a straight 35-hour week at 40-hour pay would boost
