

If you are one of the millions who think we have a silly way of electing our president you will probably be pleased by present efforts to have it changed.

A group of senators including Mundt (R-S.D.) Thurmond (D-S.C.) Goldwater (R-Ariz.) and McClellan (D-Ark.) are working now for the adoption of a constitutional amendment which would make electoral votes proportional to the popular votes in the presidential election.

As it is now, we vote on a panel of electors representing one party or the other. When the votes are counted the panel with the most votes is accepted as the winner in the state and casts the state's entire electoral strength for its party's candidate. Even though there is a difference of only a few popular

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


