FORT WORTH, Aug. 14.—(AP)—Asserting that he and not J. R. (Bobb) Silver, fired the shot which killed Rosscoe Wilson, Majestic Theatre treasurer, in a hold-up here January 31st, 1927, W. A. Stone, serving a life sentence in connection with the slaying, admitted Tuesday in a letter that he shot the youthful theatre employee.

# LOVE WITHDRAWS HIS CANDIDACY

DALLAS, Aug. 14.—(AP)—State Senator Thomas B. Love of Dallas today announced his withdrawal from the race for Lieutenant Governor of Texas. In announcing his withdrawal he said that he believed it impossible that he could overcome the substantial lead of his opponent, Lieut. Governor Barry E. Miller, and obtain a majority of votes in the run-off primary.

Opposes Smith  
An avowed opponent of Governor Alfred Z. Smith as the Democratic presidential nominee, Senator Love had been the storm center of a political row for several months as the results of the action of six counties in the state removing his name from the ballot in the first Democratic primary.

Senator Love's statement, in part, follows:  
"Because I believe that I can best

serve the cause of good government in Texas by following that course, I have withdrawn my name as a candidate for Lieutenant Governor. Looking squarely at all phases of the situation I do believe it most improbable that I can overcome the substantial lead of my opponent and obtain a majority of the votes in the run-off primary, that to further continue the contest would serve no useful purpose but would result in a waste of time and effort and zeal on the part of my friends throughout the state, which ought to be conserved and utilized in defeating Al Smith in November. I want to see all the forces of good government consolidated and concentrated on this objective as effectively and as speedily as possible."

"The grounds upon which my view of the situation is based are as follows:

"The Democratic state executive committee yesterday changed the rules in the middle of the game. For a quarter of a century the law of Texas, and the Democratic practice has provided, as it still provides, that a qualified voter taking the statutory pledge can vote in a Democratic primary election for state and local officers without pledging himself to support the Democratic presidential nominee. This law passed in the legislature of 1907 was designated to permit those unwilling to support Democratic presidential candidates to vote in Democratic primaries for state and local officers, as E. G. Senter, who wrote the law, has publicly stated and as those of us who were in the legislature and helped to pass it will recall.

Intent of Law  
"It is also the intent and effect of this law, and has been the practice, that each voter in a Democratic primary election taking the pledge for himself, in the light of his own conscience. Our appellate courts have held this to be the law. Yet, on Monday the state executive committee undertook to construe this pledge and to force its construction on the Democratic voters. ### FINE PEACHES ARE BROWN COUNTY FARM EXPERIMENT RESULT

County Farm Demonstration Agent O. P. Griffin brought to The Bulletin office a very fine basket of peaches Friday morning and in addition to this has a very interesting account of an experiment that he believes made it possible for J. H. Busby, a farmer near May, to raise such a fine crop of peaches, while other orchards in the same community are all but fruitless.

Mr. Busby has about 15 acres in his orchard and a greater of same is set with peach trees. There are old and young trees in the orchard and part of the orchard is on high ground and part on low ground. The lower part of the orchard usually suffer most from late frosts and Mr. Busby did a bit of experimenting last spring in an effort to save the crop and the experiment proved successful.

He used home made smudge pots and by losing four nights sleep and burning these from late frosts and nights, he was successful in saving the crop. One gallon syrup cans were filled about half full of crude oil and these pots were placed at regular intervals throughout the orchard. Mr. Busby watched the thermometer three nights in succession but the freezing point was never reached. The fourth night the thermometer had dropped to 34 at midnight and with the help of two others, Mr. Busby fired all his home made smudge pots.

As a result the trees in the lower part of the orchard produced an enormous crop this year, it being estimated that his crop this year will amount to 1,000 bushels, all fine peaches. These are being sold from his orchard at a good price, Mr. Griffin stated.

NATURE GAVE US OUR FIRST CARBONATED DRINK  
As far back as history goes we can find evidence of the esteem in which people held the spas or sparkling water springs. The Guthrie boy was a flaming torch when carried from the fire. His mother was burned slightly in helping extinguish the flames from her boy's clothing.

### Tanker Loses Race Against Death Today

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 16.—(AP)—The British tank steamer Athelcrest from Cuba, lost a race against death today, reaching the U. S. quarantine station at Marcus Hook, Pa., with her skipper, Captain G. T. Williams, dead.

He died during the night from burns and pneumonia, resulting indirectly from a heat stroke suffered in the tropics on August 6, when the thermometer on the bridge registered 129.

A physician from Lewes, Del., went out in a launch and gave the captain emergency treatment when the tanker reached the Delaware breakwater last night. Arrangements were made to take the captain off at quarantine today, and transfer him by ambulance to a Chester, Pa., hospital.

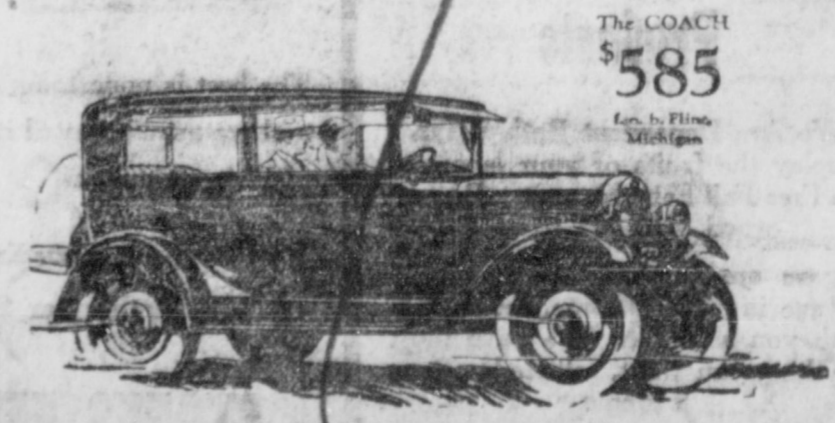
