This May Was Driest on Record Here; Only 1.17 in.

May, the month that can normally be depended upon for several nice showers, was disappointing at Muenster this year. It was by far the driest May on local moisture records, with a total of only 1.17 inches.

Practically all of the month's rain came during the last week. Official measures were .46 and .70 following rains of Saturday and Monday nights and the other .01 inch came early in the month.

The year's rain total to date now stands at 10.33, which is slightly below average but still much better than the corresponding period of 1959, when the total was only 6.27 inches.

April's above average rainfall of 5.79 accounts for most of the year's moisture to date. All of the other months were below normal.

... AND ANOTHER THING

We commend to our own Congressman the study recently made by Rep. Paul Findley of Illinois in his district — where you would think the Department was feeling no pain instead of being as hard up as it says it is.

Congressman Findley reveals that eleven post offices in his district have moved within the past year from premises that cost Uncle a total of \$7,874 for rent last year into new quarters that have run the rent bill up to \$27,698 a year — or well

over three times as much. If this is a trend — as we strongly suspect it is — increased rentals combined with the pay hike that has been announced will bring that perennial deficit far above the added income that the proposed rate increases will produce.

The net effect, then, if the Congress is willing to impose this burden on the public and business — notably the publishers of magazines and newspapers — can only be a crippling blow to the press that must be felt throughout the economy as the media of information and advertising are decimated.

Some wag has observed that since the Kennedys have jointly and severally appeared on all the magazine covers, these publications may now be considered expendable. But we doubt whether Rep. Findley, or many other Congressmen, share this view, or can condone or

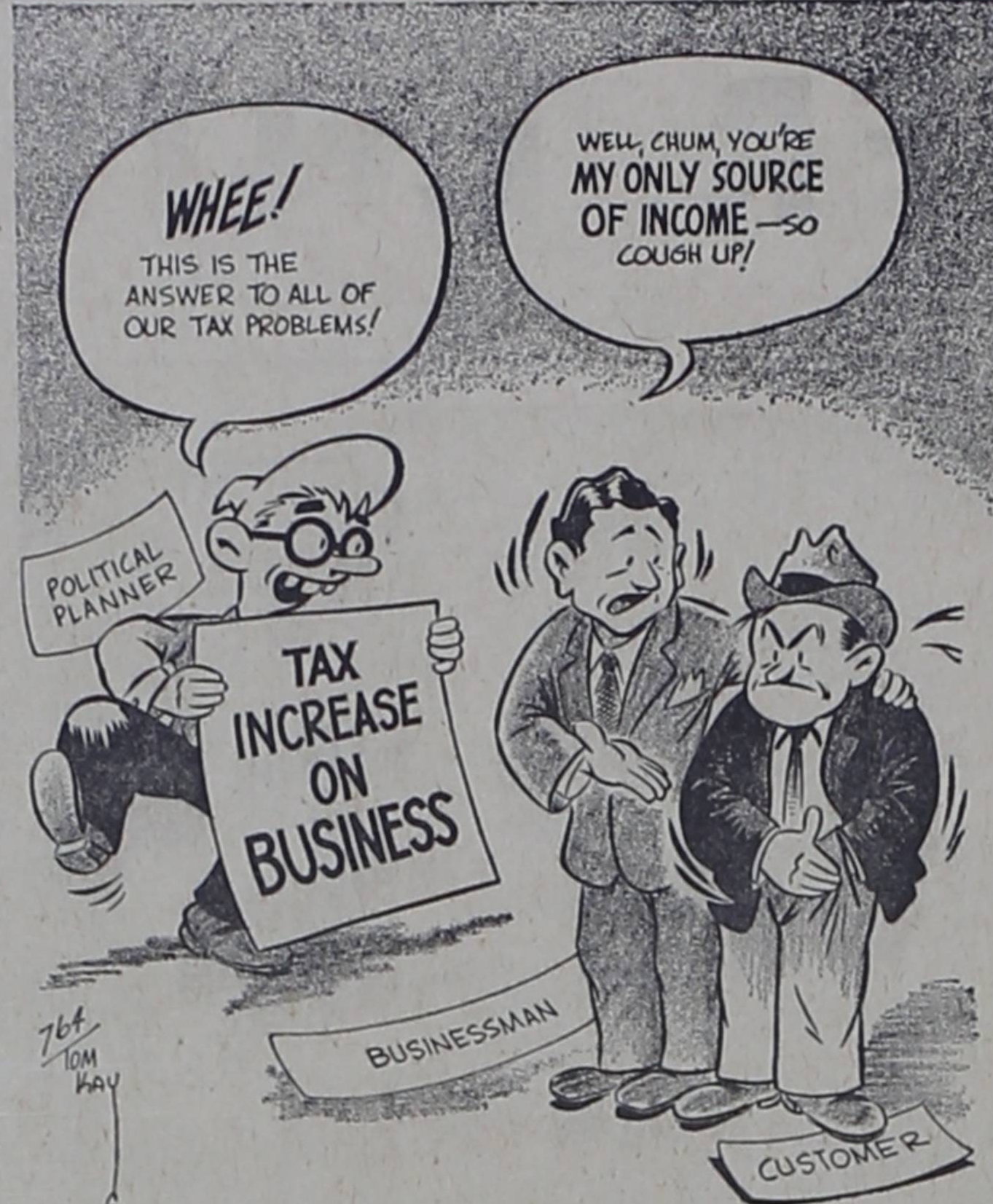

Everyone agrees that the aged need help. But the Kerr-Mills law, adopted only in 1960, appears to be satisfactory in those states which are using it. Why not wait to see if the good results continue? It is at least a selective law, offering help to those who need it.

One thing is clear. If the proposed King-Anderson bill is passed, all working people and all employers will pay still additional taxes to provide medical care for not just the NEEDY aged but for all aged, whether they need financial help or not.

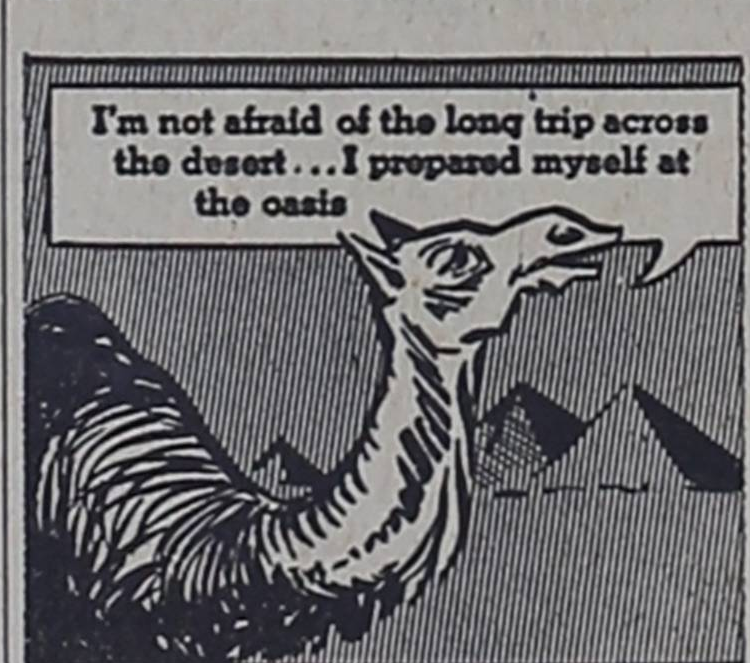

Farm Facts

Thirty years ago the average hen in the United States laid 121 eggs per year. Today the average is 206 eggs. Although the number of laying hens and pullets has been declining, the total output has been increasing. It now exceeds 65 billion annually.

In 1945, egg production totaled more than 56 billion from 369,430,000 hens and pullets. By 1959, the number of hens and pullets had declined to 303,562,000 but their production totaled more than 62 billion eggs valued at more than \$1.6 billion.

In some less fortunate countries of the world, an egg is a rarity on the family menu. In the United States, however, civilian consumption is better than an egg a day, not counting Sundays. It amounted to 334 eggs per person in 1960.

The efficiency of egg production in this country makes it possible for this highly

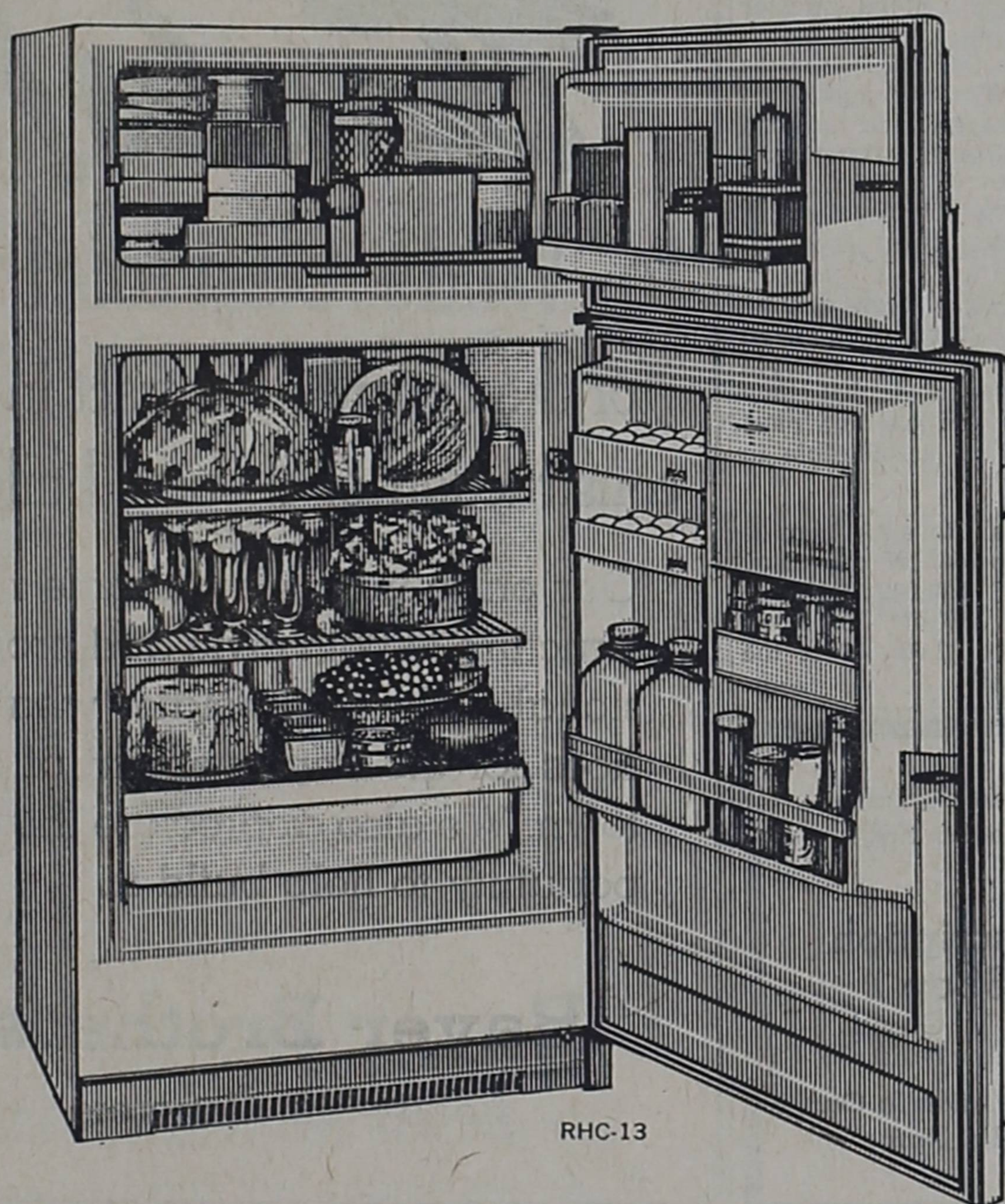

when each of the brothers went into business for himself. H. S. Wilde moved to Gainesville a few years later.

Ray Wilde joined his father after returning from army service in World War II. By last year J. B. had reached retirement age, and facing major surgery, turned the business over to Ray. Since recovery, however, he still spends much of his time being helpful in the business.

Through the years, the Wildes estimate, their agency has sold about 3100 new Chevrolet cars and trucks. Sales were slow at first, about 40 to 50 units a year during their first years and the depression.

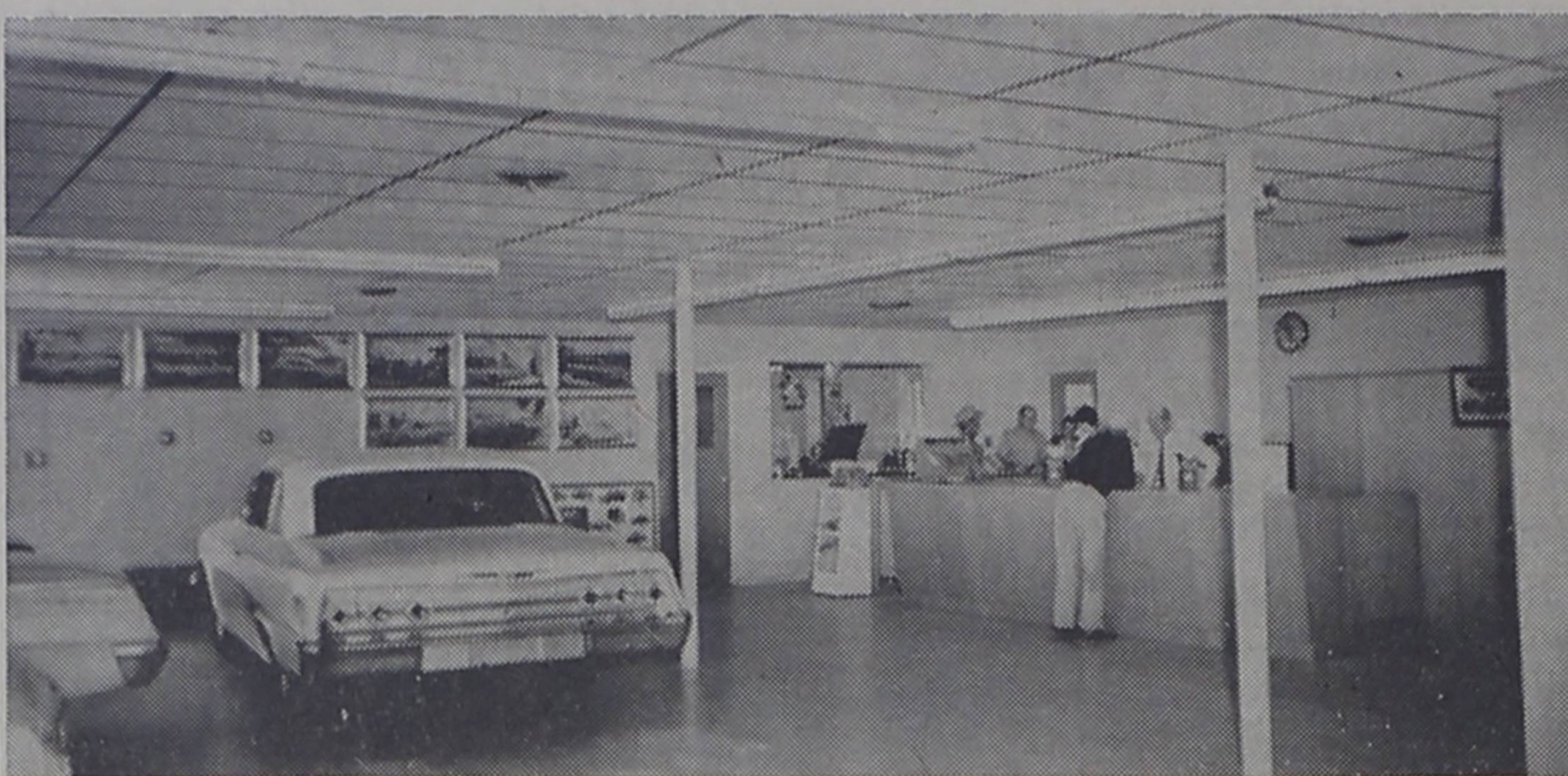
Business started moving faster after the war, when cars again became available to meet the backed up demand. And it has been consistently good ever since. During the past ten years the firm has averaged more than 140 new units a year.

The new Chevy headquarters

is located on the north side of Highway 82 just inside the east city limits. It has a front of plate glass and brick and three walls of block masonry. Office, show room and parts department are air conditioned.

Its general shape is that of two rectangles, the main section measuring 102x106 feet, and the show room, with a 50 foot front, extending 22 feet farther forward at the south-east. The outside walls of the show room are all plate glass, 34 feet on the east, 50 feet on the south and 22 feet on the west. Roof structure over the show room extends 10 feet at the front and 8 feet at the sides. The inside of the show room and offices features terrazo floor, acoustical tile ceiling and fluorescent lighting. Combined area of offices and show room is 50x56.

Two other areas are the shop measuring 72x102 and the parts department, utility room and rest rooms which occupy two floors 52x34.

Value of Chemistry In School Listed By SHH Student

In today's world of modern miracles, a knowledge of chemistry is a wonderful asset. Not only is chemistry an advantage to high-school graduates, but it is fast becoming a necessity. Chemistry enters every phase of our lives and affects every part of our environment. It influences the food we eat, the house we live in, our clothing, transportation, and the books we read. Chemistry provides new and better ways of improving our daily life. Since 1910, chemistry has offered many different vocational opportunities. A student who has completed one year of chemistry can easily find a job in a chemical laboratory, or may be eligible for a higher degree of chemistry study. There are few industries today which do not require the services of a trained chemist. In particular, there is a great demand for chemical engineers. Other fields which depend upon

a foundation of chemistry are nursing, pharmacy, laboratory technical work, and careers in science. Teaching chemistry is also an important vocation. In the laboratory, pupils learn to handle the necessary apparatus for experiments. The tools of a chemist include the Bunsen burner, test tube, flask, ring stand, and glass or rubber tubing. As the student progresses from simple to difficult operations, he quickly learns the purpose of various equipment. Through repeated use, chemical materials become familiar items. Although chemistry is said to be one of the most interesting subjects in high school, it is also considered one of the most difficult. The course is offered to juniors and seniors who have above average ability. However, this does not mean that chemistry is limited to a few. It is usually taken by almost half the number of students in a grade at one time or another. This year at Sacred Heart, the class was composed of nine juniors and seven seniors. The chemistry department of

Sacred Heart is well equipped to accommodate sixteen pupils. Complete student sets contain everything necessary for demonstrations. One of the two handsome tables, used as work tables, was made by the late John Tempel, grandfather of Rosalee Mosler. The other table was made by Shamburger Lumber Company. They provide plenty of area for setting up complicated apparatus. The laboratory is stocked with a large assortment of chemicals, and has ten excellent scales to aid in experiments. An additional feature of the department is its valuable rock collection. It contains approximately eight hundred ores and minerals which were donated over the years. Students have also contributed valuable apparatus during their chemistry course. A mercurial barometer was donated by the present graduating class, and three of the ten scales were student donations. The newest item of interest came from the Atomic Research laboratory in California. It consisted in a package of assorted radioactive substances. Each vial contains an element such as: Cobalt-60, Iron-55, Zinc-65, Sodium-22, and Phosphorus-32. Although potentially dangerous, the amounts are in small quantities of ten microcuries, and are sealed for protection. Of all the demonstrations made during the past school year, the most interesting were probably those which resulted in a useful product. Such is true in the preparation of soap, cold cream, fingernail polish, and nail polish remover. Also of interest in the laboratory was an ultraviolet light demonstration. This light supplies radiation for energizing fluorescent materials, and produced in drab-looking rocks the most beautiful hues of pink and green. Many experiments which are useful to industry included the distillation of water, the bleaching process, and tests for textile fibers. These and many more symbolize the important role chemistry plays in our daily life. Through research, chemistry will become even more valuable in the world of tomorrow. From the above essay, it is evident that chemistry in high school is worthwhile. Nothing keeps a family together as much as owning just one car. "All our friends live ten times better than we do," the housewife often complained to her long-suffering husband. "We simply must move to a more expensive neighborhood." Finally, the relieved husband came home one night with the news, "Well, we won't have to move after all, the landlord just doubled our rent."

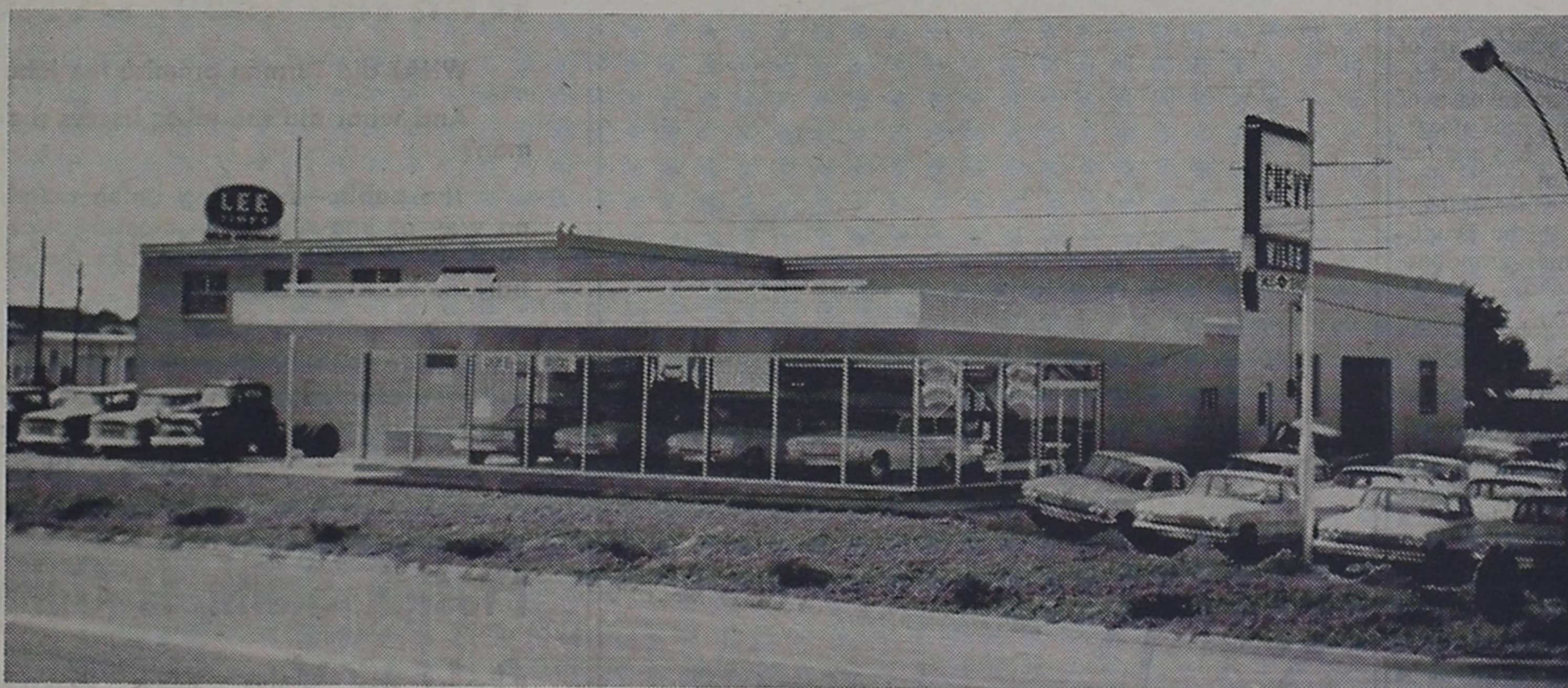

Mrs. Holland said she intended working one day a week but likes it so well she decided to give two days a week. It involves more duty than that of a nurses aid.

She said she'd be seeing friends here sometime in June when she drives over to get her mother, Mrs. Bob Yosten, to spend a part of her vacation in Cleburne with her and her husband.

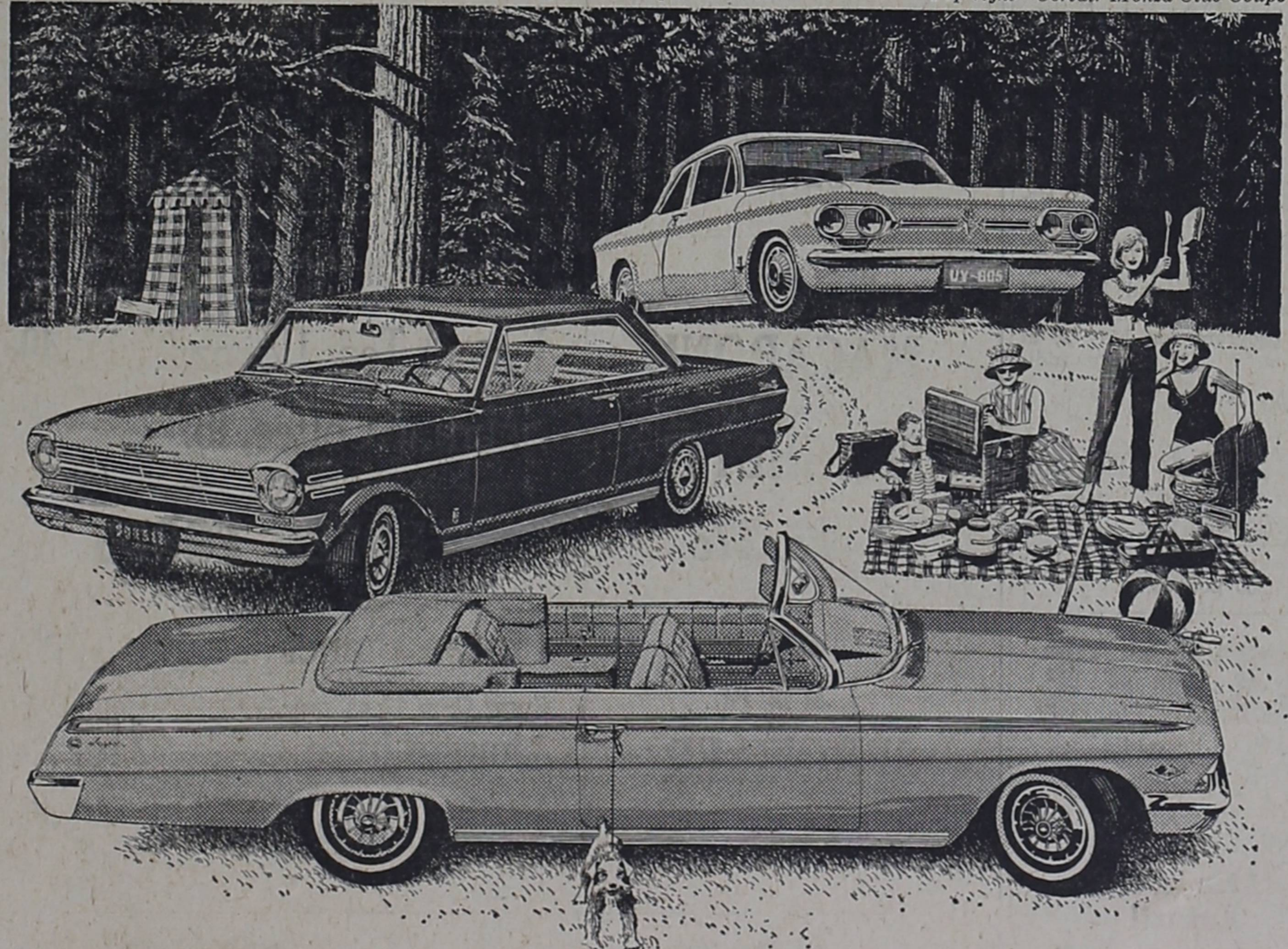
