The early-day electric systems also had problems of rate uniformity. After TP&L acquired these plants the Company reduced and stablized electric rates. Since its organization, TP&L has reduced electric rates 12 times. Electric rates have been increased only three times, in 1919, 1920 and in 1951 because of the inflationary conditions following World War I and World War II. The average cost per kilowatt hour for TP&L residential electricity is only about one-half what it was 25 years ago. The Company's first large generating station was built in Waco in 1941. This 12,000-kilowatt plant together with the plants located in other towns served by the Company, provided ample capacity for serving the entire system load. By 1923, it was evident that TP&L's load growth would require additional capacity. This led to

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


