

count will show a strong endorsement of the poll tax. As pointed out here several times in the past, it is a good and reasonable arrangement with far more merits than demerits. In fact, its only bad feature is its name, which, regrettably, leads many to believe that it places a price on a person's right to vote. Too few are aware that the name derives not from the intent or use of the tax but from the penalty for non payment.

When first levied in 1877 it was purely a financial measure. Every citizen between 21 went into the permanent school fund the other 50 cents went into the general fund. And it is still applied that way, that is, the \$1.50 which the state receives. Not one cent of it has any relation to voting. Another provision permitted counties to add 25 cents to the tax for their purpose. All but 17 are doing that, hence the charge of \$1.75.

But then came the problem of a penalty for violation of the law. Since the tax was strictly personal the penalty had to be personal. Those who failed to pay were denied their right to vote during the next year.
