Texoma Savings Breaks Ground For New Building

Ground was broken August 2 for construction of a new drive-in facility for the Grayson County State Bank and an office building which will be leased to Texoma Savings Association of Grayson County. The building is to be erected on Crockett Street across from the present Grayson County Bank at an estimated cost of \$60,000.00. The bank drive-in facility will be connected to the present bank by closed circuit TV. Completion is scheduled for early in 1963.

The building will have 2500 square feet of work area in addition to the drive-in bank facilities. Exterior walls and some interior walls will be crushed black marble rubble stone. The flooring for the entire building will be precasted terrazzo tile from Mexico. Portions of the interior walls will be plastered. Most of the cabinet work within the building will be done in walnut.

The outstanding feature of this new construction is its unique design. The irregular shape and rather small size of the lot posed the primary design problem.

The architect, in working up the preliminary design concept for this project, decided that rather than force a conventional rectilinear building onto a rather small irregular site that it would be better to use an irregularly shaped building complementing the area. The sweeping curves of the walls help define certain areas of the interior of the building without having to partition them off completely. This shape also enables the architect to gain some ground on the exterior.

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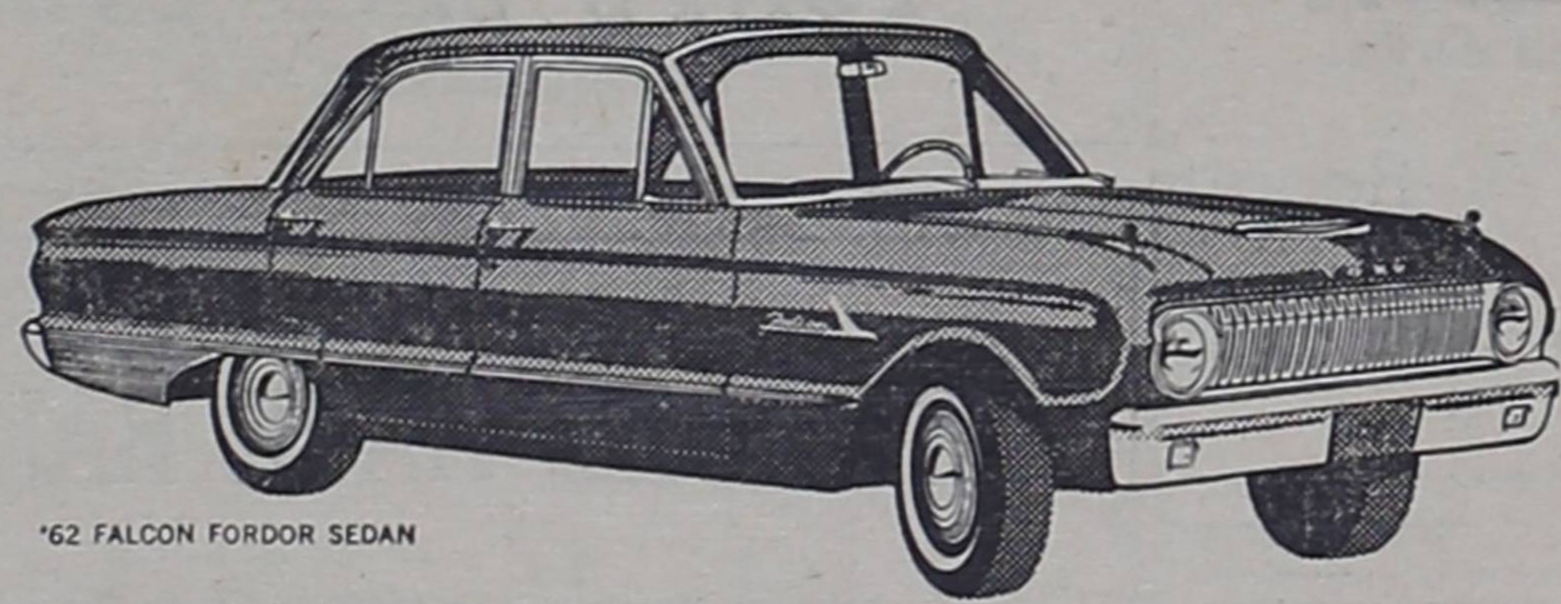

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 61 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 9 to provide that the Legislature may authorize the creation of hospital districts composed of all or part of one or more counties; the assumption by the district of any indebtedness, town or county hospital indebtedness and the transfer of all hospital facilities thereof to the district; the issuance of bonds for hospital purposes and the levy of taxes to pay the district's bonds, assumed indebtedness, and for operating and maintaining the district; providing other terms and conditions for accomplishing the purposes of this Amendment.

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be, and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto the following: "Section 9. The Legislature may, by law, provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the district of any indebtedness to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by such cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district if the same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a pro rata portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessments of the individual cities, towns and counties if less than all the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified electors of the district voting at an election called for the purpose; and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall the support and maintenance of the district be a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall the support and maintenance of the district be a charge against or obligation of any other political subdivision of the State of Texas nor shall the support and maintenance of the district be a charge against or obligation of any individual citizen of the State of Texas." "Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty days of public notice to the district affected, and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the taxpaying voters in the district concerned."

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 7 proposing an Amendment to Section 61-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to assistance to needy persons totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled, renumbering said Section, and providing that the amount paid out of state funds for assistance payments to the totally and permanently disabled may never exceed Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year.

Section 1. That Section 61-b of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, relating to assistance to needy persons totally and permanently physically or mentally disabled be amended and renumbered so as to read as follows: "Section 61-b. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by General Laws, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance to needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but not passing their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation, and who are residents of the State of Texas, who have resided in this state for at least one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the application for assistance; and providing further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving old age assistance, aid to the needy blind, or aid to dependent children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; and provided further, that not more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of state funds may be paid to any individual recipient; and provided further, that the amount paid out of state funds to any individual may never exceed the amount paid to that individual out of federal funds; and provided further, that the amount paid out of state funds for assistance payments shall not exceed Two Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$2,500,000) per year.

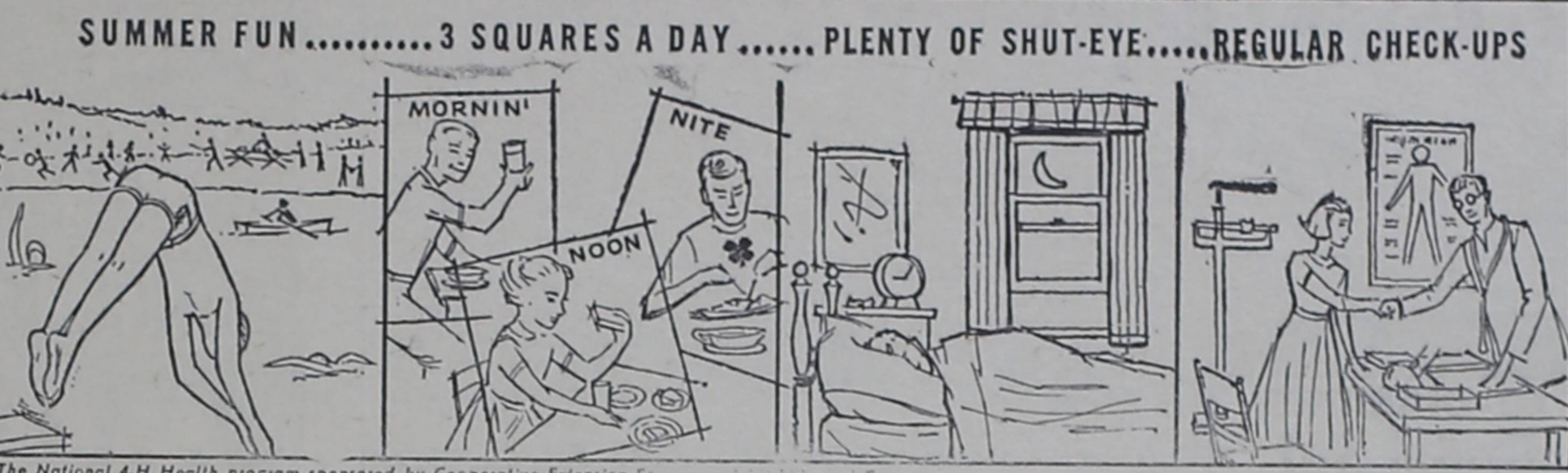
PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1962.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6 proposing an Amendment to Article VII of the Constitution of Texas by adding a Section to be known as Section 3-b, providing that school taxes theretofore voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is within Dallas County, shall not be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by a change in boundaries nor shall bonds voted, but unused, at the time of such change, be invalidated by such change; authorizing the levy of taxes after such change without further election in the district as changed; providing an exception in the case of the annexation or consolidation of whole districts; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

Section 1. That Article VII of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding thereto the following: "Section 3-b. No tax for the maintenance of public free schools voted in any independent school district, the major portion of which is located in Dallas County, nor any bonds voted in any such district, but unused, shall be abrogated, canceled or invalidated by change of any kind in the boundaries thereof. After any change in boundaries the governing body of any such district, without the necessity of an additional election, shall have the power to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property within the boundaries of the district as changed, for the purposes of the maintenance of public free schools and the payment of principal of and interest on all bonded indebtedness outstanding against, or attributable, adjusted or allocated to, such district or any territory therein, in the amount, at the rate, or not to exceed the rate, and in the manner authorized in the district prior to the change in its boundaries, and further in accordance with the laws under which all such bonds, respectively, were voted; and such governing body also shall have the power, without the necessity of an additional election, to sell and deliver any unused bonds voted in the district prior to any such change in boundaries, and to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the district as

changed, for the payment of principal of and interest on such bonds in the amount, at the rate, or not to exceed the rate, and in the manner authorized in the district prior to the change in its boundaries, and further in accordance with the laws under which all such bonds, respectively, were voted; and such governing body also shall have the power, without the necessity of an additional election, to sell and deliver any unused bonds voted in the district prior to any such change in boundaries, and to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the district as

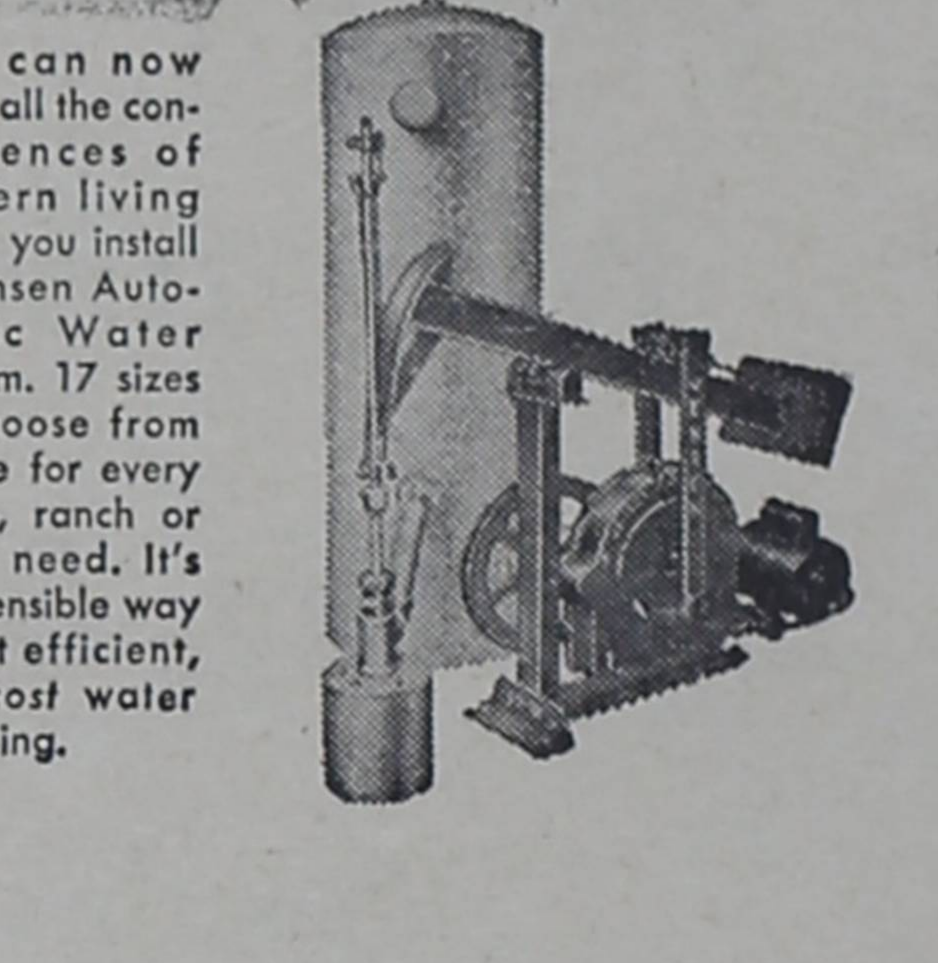
