It's generally known that a sizeable percentage of investments are held by people of modest means to provide extra income in their old age. And the total income of those people, including dividends, is not large enough to make them subject to income tax.

But according to this scheme the Internal Revenue Service would take its specified percentage of tax from the company paying the dividend and the stockholder's dividend would be proportionately less. That imposes on old folks the extra work of filing for a refund. J. A. Hyslop of the U. S. Department of Agriculture in 1938 compiled an estimate of losses caused by some 60 different kinds of insects in the United States, Total damage, including control costs, amounted to more than \$1.6 billion annually.

Hyslop's estimate, however, was based on prices much lower than those of today and did not include all the injurious insects. Even so, these losses would amount to about \$12 for each man, woman, and child in the country-or \$1 per month per person.
