Muenster was fogged with 100 gallons of DDT solution Monday afternoon.

As polio continues to spread throughout the state of Texas city officials of Muenster are anxious to eradicate flies, mosquitoes and other insect pests which might carry polio and other hot weather infection.

> The machine made a complete tour of the business district and city streets and made two trips to the city's low places, weedy sections, sewage disposal plant and near-by shallow creeks to knock out the breeding places of insect pests.

The drifting fog has a killing effect within a 400-yard radius. By the time the fogging operation was finished a film of DDT solution was covering most of the city.

Present plans of city officials are to have the machine here again for another fogging in about two weeks.

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

This index shows prices rose and fell durng Napoleonic War period of 1812, the Civil War period from 1860 to 1865. the World War I period from 1914 through 1918, and the World War II period from Sep tember 1939, through August, 1945. There is an amazing similarity in the graphs shown The lines of inflation and of deflation run almost parallel durig these four different war periods. However, one cannot help but wonder if the deflation line of this date will continue downward on a comparative basis with deflations following other wars. The tremendous size of our national debt, together with comparatively high wage and salary schedules, may halt the deflation cycle which would normally occur. Following the War of 1812 our national debt was only \$81,488,000. In 1864 our national debt was \$1,815,-813,000. In 1920 our national debt was \$24,299,321,000. On June 30, 1948, our national debt was \$252,308,770,000.


