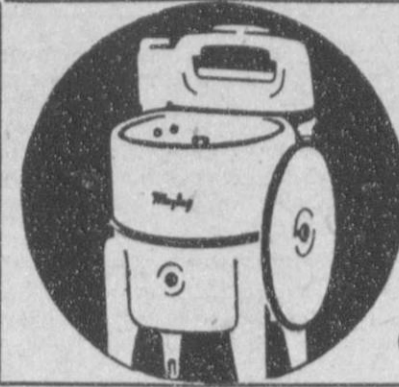

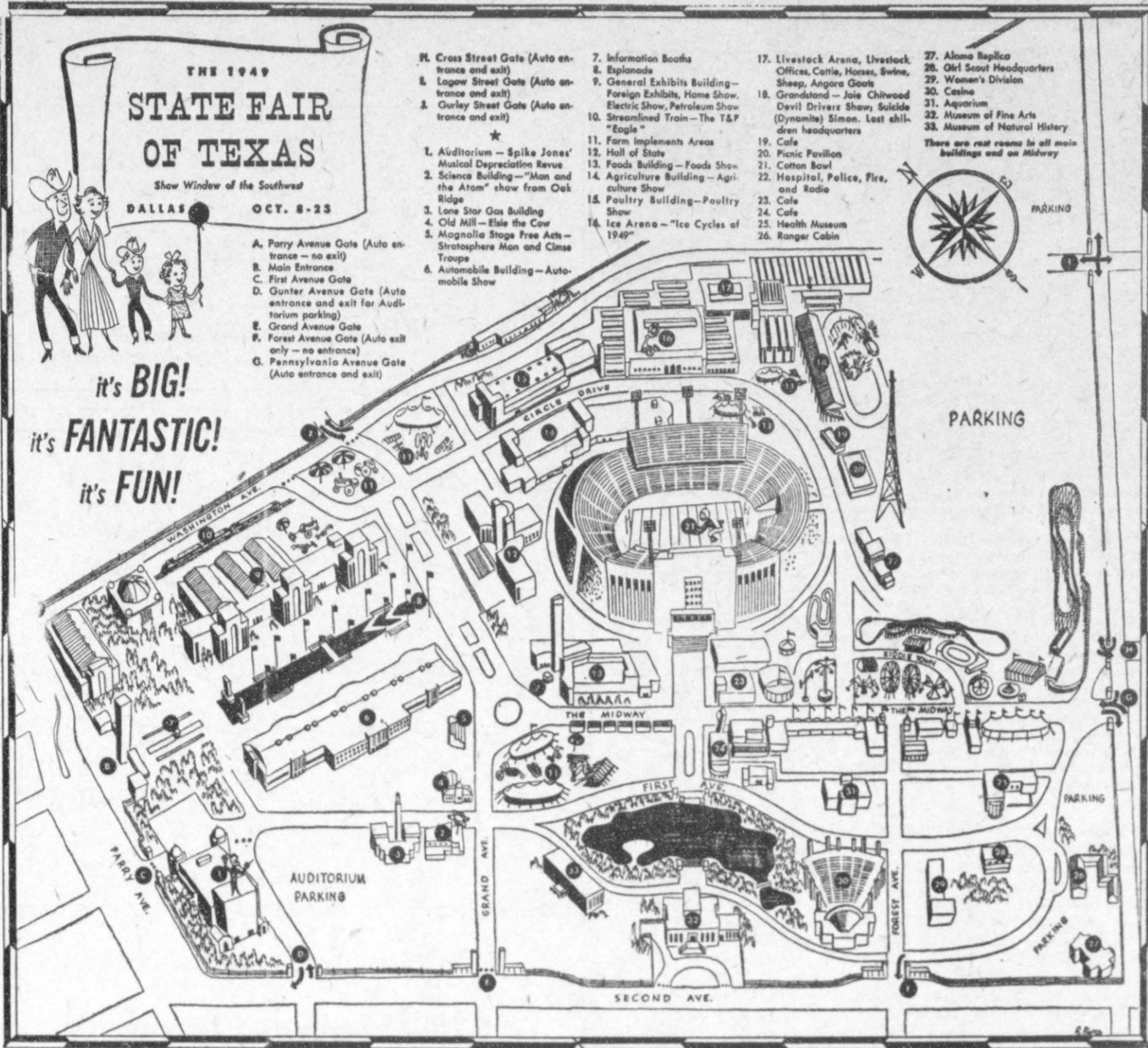

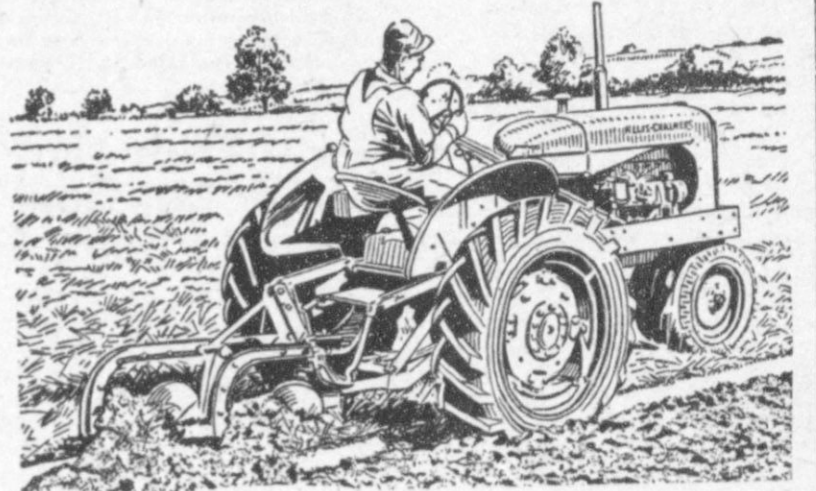

Cancer Is Second High on List of Texas Death Causes

AUSTIN—Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, in speaking of cancer, said that it ranked second as a cause of death in Texas, being exceeded only by heart disease. Last year approximately 6900 Texans died of this disease. One of the reasons so many people die of cancer is because the disease usually exists some time before it is recognized. By then it has progressed from a small local cancer to a large and dangerous one.

In the beginning cancer is not painful so many persons do not consult a doctor. Any lump, especially in the breast, should be looked upon with suspicion. Other suspicious sym-

ptoms are any sore that does not heal about the tongue, mouth or lips; sores caused by broken teeth or ill fitting dental plates should receive attention; irregular bleeding or discharge from any opening of the body is a danger signal. Persistent indigestion with loss of weight is a symptom of cancer of the stomach. With any of these signs one should go immediately to a doctor. Many times the suspicion of cancer will have been unfounded but it is much better to be safe.

It is desirable to treat all diseases in their early stages, but in no case is it more important than cancer. Periodic examinations made with cancer in mind affords the best protection against this disease. Surgery, x-ray and radium are the main weapons which are used to combat cancer.

Extension Service Suggests Method to Test Can Openers

COLLEGE STATION.—One of the "most used" gadgets in the average kitchen is the can opener and it is doubtful, says Gena Thames, acting assistant extension home management specialist of Texas A&M College, if many homemakers ever check by a simple test the quality of the job that is done by the gadgets they use.

For example, cites Miss Thames, many can openers, whether cheap or expensive, permit slivers of tinned steel to fall into the can's contents during the opening process.

Here is a simple check that you can easily make to see if your can opener is working satisfactorily, says Miss Thames. Empty the contents from a can of food. Then

wash and dry the can carefully. Hold the can firmly upon a sheet of white paper — with the opened end down — and open the bottom end of the can with the can opener that you are checking.

Any slivers of metal released by the opener this time will fall upon the paper where they can be seen, says Miss Thames. If more than the barest amount of tinned steel shows on the paper, you'll know the can opener is not cutting as it should.

2 County Labs Give Blood Tests Under New Marriage Law

Only two medical laboratories in Cooke county, both of them in Gainesville, are approved by Texas State Health department to make blood tests which, effective Wednesday, are required of all persons, both men and women, applying for marriage licenses in Texas. County Clerk Tom Blount has received a supply of forms titled "Statement of Standard Laboratory Blood Test". The Department of Health notified him that the approval laboratories in Gainesville are the Gainesville Diagnostic Laboratory at 902 Lindsay street and Dr. J.L. Thomas' Clinic Laboratory at 103 1/2 E. California.

Dr. Thomas said his laboratory would be able to give results of blood tests one day after the specimens are received. The other organization has not determined how quickly it would make test reports.

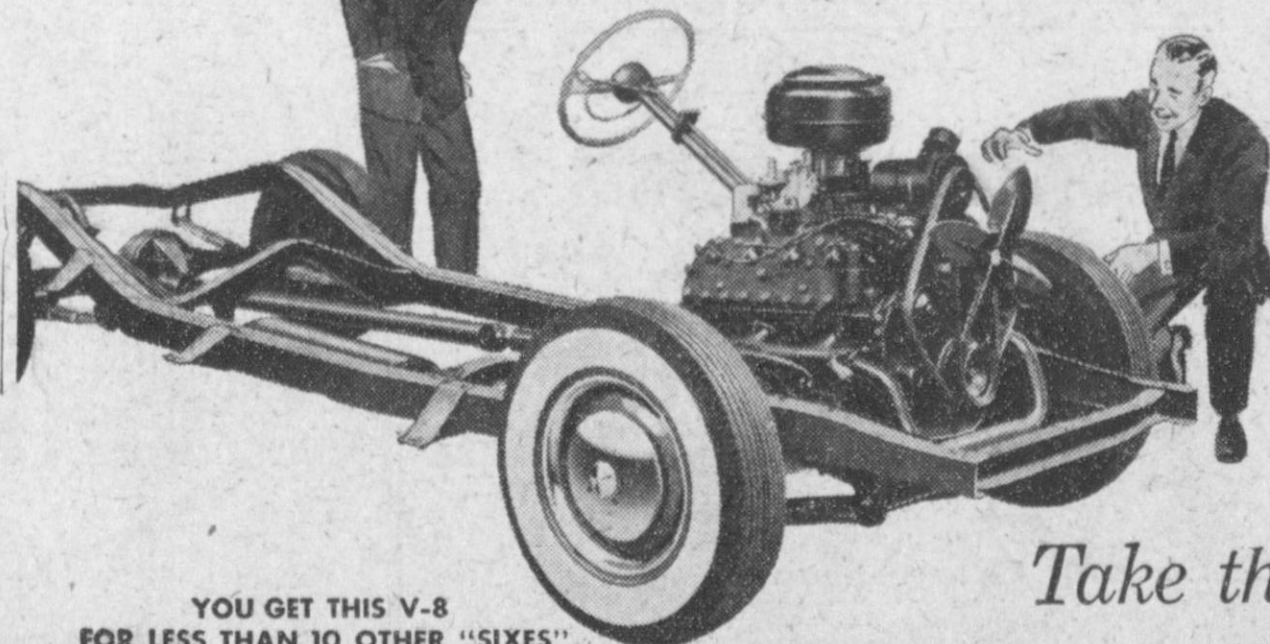

Advance Survey of Census Shows that Women Have Majority of about 300,000

WASHINGTON.—Calling a meeting, men. This is a warning. The women are about to take over.

In fact, the word is out already. The bureau of census which counts noses in the country every 10 years has made an advance survey. We men are going to be outnumbered. The skirts will have an advantage of around 300,000 over the pants.

The last census, in 1940, showed the male of our species had half a million advantage.

Incidentally, taking a census is no cheap task. In 1950 it'll cost \$70,000,000. In 1940 the cost was \$40,000,000, but it wasn't so thorough. Beginning in April, your Uncle Sam wants to know everything: How many kids, what the old man does, how many in-laws, where they live, how many toilets inside and out, how many pigs, calves, lambs and bales of alfalfa.

Expect to Find

When it's all over we expect to find that we have at least 150,000,000 people, a gain of 19,000,000 over the 1940 count. According to the census people that will mean about 50 persons to the square mile. In 1790, when we first took a census, the density was 4.5 persons. In 1940 it was 44.2.

I am old enough to remember when census taking was comparatively simple. As a high school student in Farmer City, Ill., I went from house to house with a little note pad asking the neighbors if they had any kids during the last 10 years. I got

\$1.50 a day. I had to cheat to make the job last a week.

Salaries Higher Now

Now the takers get \$10 a day. The whole business will start April 1. In the cities it is supposed to be completed in two weeks. In the country, a month will be required because of the count of pigs, calves, and the alfalfa bales.

It'll take 150,000 "takers" to do the job. Ten thousand folks will be needed here in Washington to assemble the data and put it into the official record. The 1940 census, for instance, required 40 volumes in fine print and contained four billion facts. It cost a heap of money, too.

The new census asks everything about the family including breeding, schooling, servants, your relatives, their relatives, all addresses, salary last place worked, number of carrots and chickens in the back yard.

Language Included

Also included will be language spoken in the home and that spoken on the street.

Frank Wilson, who is weary over the whole business and who used to be a newspaperman in Iowa, is in charge of public information on the census.

"We figure a census taker should spend about a half hour with each family in the country," Wilson said. "I hope it works out all right."

That might be all right for the simple vital statistics about where born, etc. But when the "taker" turns the three-foot page and starts to working on housing! He's going to run into a little trouble on such questions as: Kitchen sink—exclusive use only? Type of water? Hot and cold piped inside? Only cold piped inside? Piped outside? No piped running water? —Harman W. Nichols

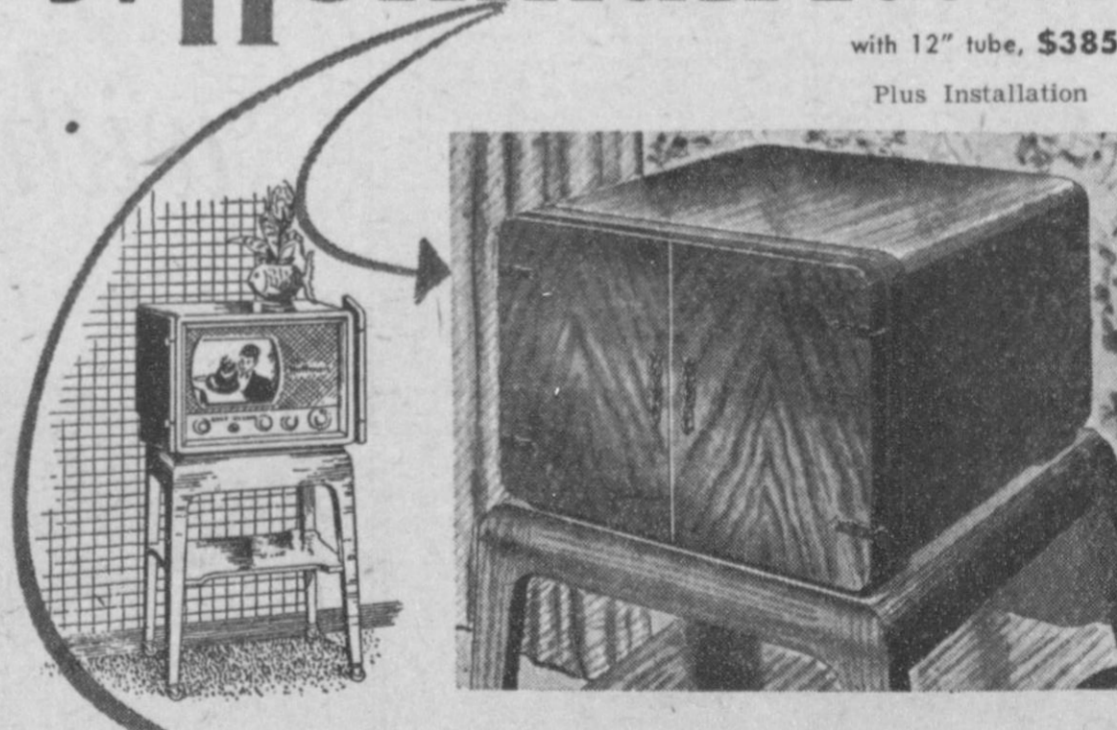

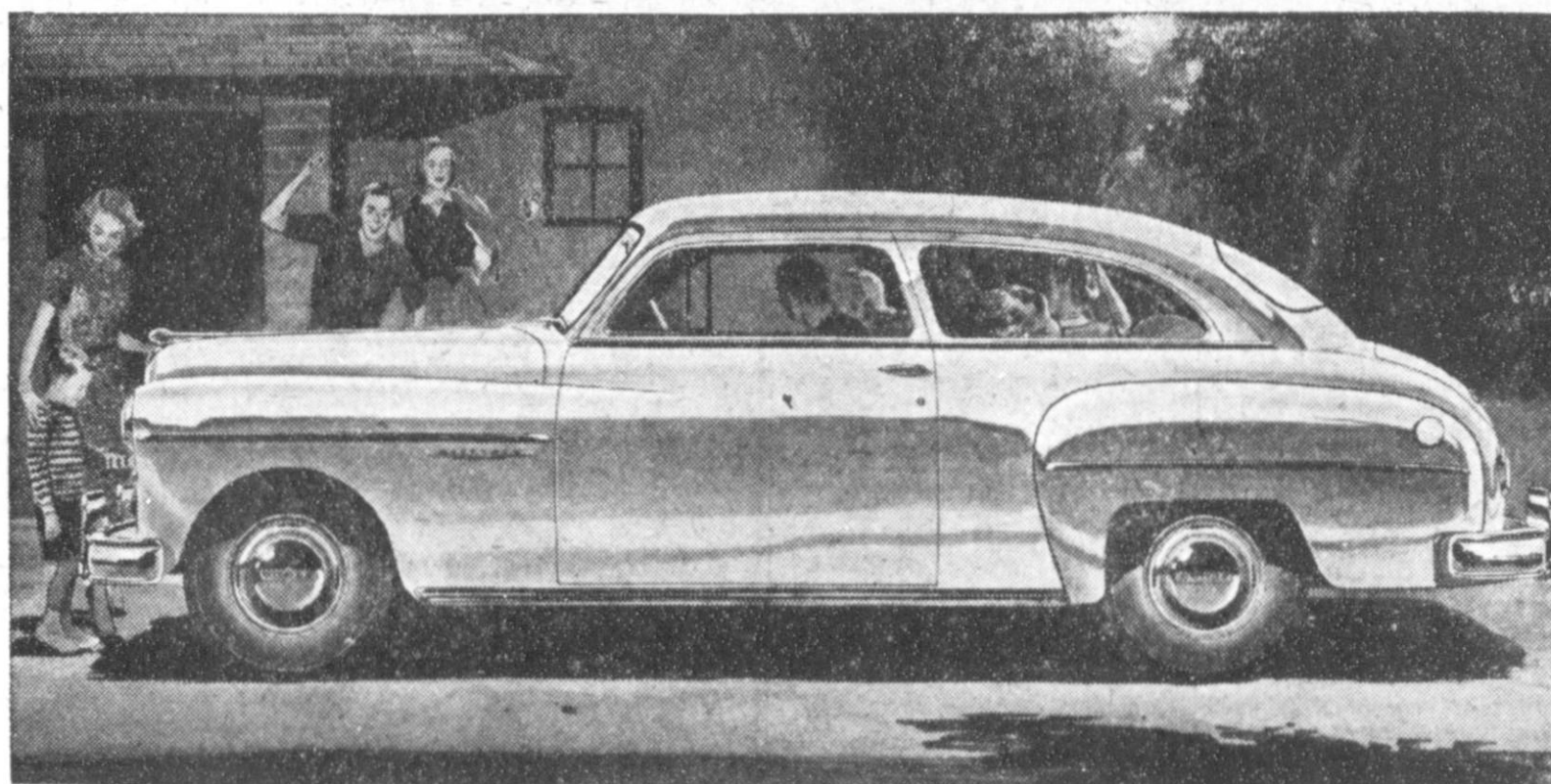
